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CHAPTER 1

OVERVIEW

As the Nation is celebrating "Amrit Kaal", the State of Goa has all the reasons to celebrate it with grandeur for its impressive socio - economic performance. With the present state of economic progress and achievements, the State's economy is all set to leap forward into a new phase of economic prosperity to be one of the most developed and advanced State in the Country.

The economic progress can be noticed from the Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP) at current prices of the State for the year 2022-23 (Quick Estimates) which is ₹ 93672.38 crore. The economy of the State has grown by 11.16% in 2022-23 as compared to 2021-22. The Primary, Secondary and Tertiary Sector has shown a growth of 2.61%, 8.03% and 18.25 respectively. The Gross State Domestic Product in 2023-24 (Advance Estimates) is expected at ₹ 106532.57 crore which means that economy of the State is expected to grow by 13.73% in the current financial year as compared to 2022-23.

This expected double digit growth is due to the smart initiatives of the State Government. Also, the commissioning of the Manohar International Airport at Mopa has enhanced global connectivity, through new routes to meet the increasing travel demand, to Goa.

Although, Goa ranks 21st among all States and Union Territories, it tops the small States in Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) in manufacturing sector (USD

147.31 million) from October 2019 onwards till December 2023.

The details of FDI in the State during the last 5 years is given in Table No.1.1.

Exports

Goa's total export value for the year 2023-24 (April to December 2023) was USD 1.77 Billion. 51.37% of the total export value was through Drugs and Pharmaceutical Commodity group followed by Engineering Goods Commodity Group. In 2022-23, the total export value stood at USD 2.45 Billion.

Investments

The Goa Investment Promotion Board (G-IPB) has granted in-principle approval to 80 projects in the last 5 years. This comprises of 50 new manufacturing units, 5 new Hospitality projects, 7 new Service sector projects and 18 projects of expansion of the existing manufacturing units. The total investment expected from all these units is ₹ 6297.14 crore and employment potential is 23113 people. During the same period, 48,187 Units are registered under Micro Small Scale Medium Enterprises (MSME). The total investments from these units is expected to be ₹ 3773.98 crore and employment potential is 304812 people. The total employment potential through the Goa IPB projects and MSME Units during the last five years is 3,27,925.

G-IPB has diligently worked with 40 plus Departments/ Directorates to implement 300 plus reform points as mandated by Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT), Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India. Goa-IPB has also precisely studied and decriminalised 59 criminal

provisions spread across 29 acts of 18 Departments.

Public Finance

As per the Budget Estimates for the year 2023-24, the Revenue Receipts are estimated to be ₹ 20227.85 crore and Capital Receipts at ₹ 5640.30 crore. The Revenue Expenditure and Capital Expenditure are estimated at ₹ 19558.38 crore and ₹ 6434.96 crore respectively.

The internal debt of the State is estimated at ₹ 4500.20 crore. The Revenue surplus, Fiscal deficit and Primary surplus is estimated to be ₹ 669.47 crore, ₹ 4183.11 crore and ₹ 2185.48 crore respectively.

The release from Government of India during 2023-24 (upto January 2024) is ₹ 635.60 crore to the consolidated fund of the State and ₹ 3075.31 crore through Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) route.

Institutional Finance

As on 30.09.2023, 47 Banks have setup 774 Bank branches in the State of which 475 are in semi urban areas and 299 in rural areas.

Total deposits as on 30th September 2023 in the banks stands at ₹1,12,130.49 crore while advances given by the banks stands at ₹35,729.39 crore constituting a Credit Deposit Ratio at 31.86. Total outstanding under Priority Sector Advances (PSA) works out to be ₹ 14234.12 crore, which is 42.86% of the total advances.

5417 registered cooperative societies have mobilized deposits amounting to ₹ 7681.43 crore and advances of ₹ 3051.68 crore as on 31st March, 2023.

Sustainable Development Goals

The State has revised State indicator Framework and prepared Goa State Indicator Framework-2.0 (G-SIF 2.0) in 2023 which consist of 16 goals, 132 targets and 272 indicators. The new methodology has been developed in-line with Methodology of NITI Aayog for computation of SDG Index.

The State Government has computed Goa SDG Index-2023 spanning across 16 out of 17 SDGs (leaving out Goal No. 17). The Index tracks the progress of Goa on a set of 131 Indicators under 69 targets. As per the Goa SDG Index-2023, the composite Score stood at 84 and has secured a position in the category of Front Runner. The Index indicates that Goa has performed well in like Water. terms parameters of Sanitation, Clean Energy, Infrastructure, Sustainable Consumption, Climate and Coastal Ecosystem. State achieved full score & secured a position in the category of Achiever in four goals namely "Affordable and Clean Energy, Responsible Consumption and Production, Climate Action and Life below Water.

Aadhaar Generation

Goa ranks 5th in the Country with an impressive Aadhaar generation of over 103% with a network of over 98 Permanent Aadhaar Enrollment Stations throughout the State extending Aadhaar enrollment and update services out of which 24 Aadhaar Enrollment Stations are operated by the State. Home enrollment Stations are operated by the State. Home enrollment facilities are provided to divyangs, constrained senior

citizens and also the ailing and bedridden citizens.

Swayampurna Goa Programme

Swayampurna Goa programme aims at "Last mile Delivery" i.e. to reach out to every individual in the State with minimum Government and maximum Governance and to ensure achieving the vision of Antodaya, Gramodaya and Sarvodaya.

Swayampurna 2.0 Under Goa programme, emphasis is aiven to Skilling, Re-skilling and Up-skilling. Drives/camps have been conducted by various State Government Departments promotion/propagation of schemes under the Swayampurna Goa 2.0 programme. More than 15000 people have benefitted through these drives durina the current financial Government recognized has the contribution of Swayampurna Mitras towards achieving the objective of NO one is left behind. In order to boost the morale of Taluka Nodal Officers and Swayampurna Mitras, those who have performed exemplary work have been felicitated the occasion on Independence Day 2023 and Goa Liberation day 2023.

For the first time, 2.37 lakh students of 1st to 10th standard of all Government & Government aided schools were screened for preliminary eye check-up under Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiatives "Vision for all". The complete process of eye checkup is completed in all talukas and in all 3439 students are found with some refractive defects. These students will be provided spectacles or referred for further treatment if required, free of cost

Empowering Women

The State Government has introduced the scheme "Mukhyamantri Annapurna Yojana" to make Mahila Self Help Groups in the State Self-reliant. Through this scheme, an opportunity has been given to encourage Mahila Self Help Groups to run Canteens in various Government establishments.

For the first time in the country, a Chavath e-Bazaar was organized through online platform to market the home made sweets & decorative items made by the Mahila Self Help Groups on the occasion of Ganesh Chaturthi. Government has gone one step ahead in providing them a permanent e-business platform 'Swayampurna Goa e-Bazaar' (www.swayampurnagoa.com). platform will facilitate the local artisans. Mahilas and Self Help Groups to sell their Home Made & Hand Made products (Eatables and decorative) not only in the State but across the PAN India.

Agriculture & Allied activities

United Nations had declared the year 2023 as the "International Year of Millets (IYoM)". As part of the same, 'Millet Utsav' was organized across the State to create awareness on cultivation practices and Value Addition in Millets, to promote, motivate and encourage farmers for Millets cultivation. This has resulted in the increase of area under Millets from 20 ha. to 50 ha.

Government is supporting agriculture sector at all levels to have substantial returns to the farming community to enhance their income. Being a progressive State, the farmers face tremendous shortage of manual labour this is tackled by mechanising agricultural activities.

Government promotes large scale various crops cultivation of and assistance for the purpose is provided in form of seeds, pesticides and manures besides land preparation. Goan farmers are assured of the price for their produce of Paddy, Coconut, Arecanut, Oil Palm, Sugarcane, etc. which safeguard the farmers against any losses due to collapse in market price to keep farming at its prime level.

Goa has been declared as the first Rabies controlled area in the Country. The Annual Estimated Milk production in the State is 64175.525 tonnes, Egg production is 423.70 Lakh and Meat production is 7293.644 tonnes as per Integrated Sample Survey.

Under Kisan Credit Cards (KCC), 2429 agriculture farmers were sanctioned an amount of ₹2551.64 lakh through various Nationalized Banks, 424 Dairy farmers were sanctioned ₹ 2940.00 lakh and benefit was extended to 885 fishermen in the State during the current financial year.

38 Sagar Mitra were appointed to create awareness among the local fishermen on various schemes, Government policies, programmes and regulations of the Department.

The Government of Goa has submitted 4 Action Plans under Pradhan Mantri Matsya Sampada Yojana with the total project cost amounting to ₹ 11795.79 lakh having Central liability amounting to ₹ 5579.44 lakh. Till date central share amounting to Rs. 3301.59 lakh has been received and ₹ 2774.52 lakh has been utilized. One of the largest projects approved for the State is the construction

of State of Art wholesale fish market at Margao, South Goa.

Centrally Sponsored Scheme "Digitization of Primary Agricultural Cooperative Societies (PACS)" is being implemented, wherein all PACS in the State with upto date audit will be computerized. The Registrar of Cooperative Societies has entered and verified the data of 5439 Cooperative Societies registered with them on National Cooperative Database (NCD) software of Ministry of Co-operation. The process of registering new Multipurpose Primary Agricultural Co-operative Societies (MPACS) and also transferring the already registered Co-operative Societies into MPACS has been started so that the new business activities like Petrol Pump dealership, Jan Aushadhi Kendra, PM Kisan Samriddhi Kendra, etc, can be taken up by these Societies.

02 Primary Agricultural Cooperative Societies (PACS) have registered for the Central Scheme "5 Jan Aushadhi Kendras per District" and 37 Primary Agricultural Cooperative Societies (PACS) have been registered as Common Service Centre in the State.

Rural Development

Under National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM), there are 3674 Self Help Groups (SHGs) registered as on December 2023 having member strength of 47460. 783 SHGs have availed loan amounting to ₹39.34 crore from the banks during 2023-24 till December, 2023.

Under Mahatma Gandhi Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (MGNREGA), 31638 Man-days of wage employment have been generated and 171 Job Cards have been issued during

the current financial year upto December 2023. 856 Enterprises have been supported with business skills, exposure and loans for business during the financial year 2023-24. Home-stay Tourism Pilot Project have started in Talde village of Dharbandora by 7 SHGs involving more than 100 households in the village and also in the neighboring villages so as to provide employment opportunities to the local Mahila Self help Group.

The total grants released to the Village Panchayats under various categories during the last five years is ₹98473.19 lakh. 102 Village Panchayats have constructed the shades and remaining 89 Village Panchayats have identified the land for setting up of Material Recovery Facility (MRF).

Skilling, Reskilling & Upskilling

The Government has implemented PM Vishwakarma Yojana with an intension to boost moral and economic status of local artisans. Under the Scheme the artisans (Shramjeevi) practicing 18 notified trades shall benefit under the scheme. As on **December 2023**, 33000 Shramjeevis have been registered on the PM Vishwakarma portal. Goa has become the first State in the country to start training programmes for the Shramjeevis

Under Goa Chief Minister's Apprenticeship Training Scheme, 8852 youth have been appointed as Apprentice in both the Government and private sector. This scheme aims to enhance the employability and achieve goal of Skilling, Re-skilling and Upskilling of Goan youth.

Various new courses have been started in the ITIs across the State as per the present Industry needs.

OVERVIEW

Infrastructure Development

The New Zuari Bridge, which is Country's second largest cable stayed eight lane bridge is fully in operation since December 2023.

The Public Works Department has undertaken 97 civil projects in the current financial year. 161 projects were completed in 2022-23 which were initiated in 2021-22 and 87 works and 156 works were completed in 2023-24 which were initiated in 2022-23 and 2021-22 or prior respectively.

During the last five years upto December 2023, Goa State Infrastructure Development Corporation has completed 220 works amounting to Rs. 1100.09 crore.

National Cyclone Mitigation Project was completed in September 2023. This project has enhanced the State preparedness and developed cyclone resilent infrastructure and capacity building along the coastline of the State

Under Mhaji Bus scheme, 57 Nos. of private buses are hired by the state-run Kadamba Transport Corporation Limited (KTCL) and are operating on different routes in the State to improve efficiency in public transportation.

The Kadamba Transport Corporation Limited has earned Profit in the year 2022-23 of ₹ 589.02 lakh after incurring losses from 2016-17 to 2021-22. The last time the Corporation had earned profit was in the year 2015-16.

CHAPTER 2

DEMOGRAPHY

Introduction

The characteristics of a population can be viewed through the telescope of demography which covers all vital aspects of life such as gender, births, deaths, age, religion, caste, literacy, etc.

The Office of the Registrar General and Census Commissioner, India, under the Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India, is vested with the responsibility of conducting the Census. The 15th population Census was conducted in the year 2011. However due to outbreak of Covid-19 pandemic, Census has not been conducted in the country in recent times. This chapter covers distribution of population by Taluka, age, gender, religion and caste, projected population, population density, households, sex ratio and literacy as per 2011 Census.

Distribution of Population

The State has been divided into two Districts, namely North Goa which comprises of 6 talukas and South Goa forming the remaining 5 talukas. Population of Goa as per 2011 Census stands at 14,58,545 of which 8,18,008 and 6,40,537 persons were enumerated in North Goa and South Goa Districts respectively. The population of Goa forms 0.12% of India's population as per 2011 Census. The population growth during the decade 2001-2011 works out to 8.23%.

The State, District and Taluka wise distribution of population is given in Table No. 2.1.

Salcete Taluka has the highest population accounting for 20.19% of the total population followed by Bardez

Taluka accounting for 16.28% while Canacona Taluka has the lowest population accounting for 3.10% of the total population as per 2011 Census.

Table No. 2.2 presents Decadal Growth of population from 1960-2011. The State has a total population of 14,58,545 as per 2011 Census which comprises of 7,39,140 (50.68%) males and 7,19,405 (49.32%) females. The State witnessed a huge jump in its decadal growth rate from 7.77 percent in 1960 to 34.77 percent in 1971. Thereafter in the subsequent Censuses the decadal

growth witnessed a reducing trend and in 2011 the decadal growth of the State's population stood at 8.23 percent.

Table No. 2.3 presents the Age wise distribution of population by gender as per 2011 Census. About 21.8% of the population fall into 0-14 Age group, 25.9% fall in 15-29 Age group, 41.0% fall in 30-59 Age group, 11.2% fall in 60 and above Age group. Realizing the fact that youth forms the backbone of any economy, 25.9% of Goa's Population is youth i.e. aged 15 to 29 years.



It is observed from Chart No. 2.1, base of the population pyramid is becoming narrow indicating decline in proportion of population aged under 15 year while the greater proportion of youth at present will result in a greater proportion of elderly in the population in future.

This will create a demand for better health care facilities and development of welfare schemes/ programmes for elderly people.

As can be seen from Table No. 2.4, there are 194 villages in North Goa of which 188 are inhabited whereas 132 Villages are inhabited out of 140 villages in South Goa. Sattari Taluka in North Goa has the highest number of villages followed by Sanguem Taluka in South Goa District. There are 47 Towns in North Goa and 23 Towns in South Goa.

Projected Population

It is observed from Table No. 2.5, that projected population of the State for the vear 2024 is expected to approximate 15,87,000 as per the Population Projections figures released National Commission the Population, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, New Delhi. Population growth has been slowing down from an average annual growth rate of 3.5% in 1971 to 0.4% in 2024 which is projected to further remain flat at an average annual growth rate of 0.4% till 2036. Projected population for the State of Goa for the period from 2012 to 2024 is given in Annexure – 1.

Population Density

Population Density is defined as the number of persons per square kilometer of area and is arrived at by dividing the population by its area. Population density helps to identify the areas of varying population concentration and its pressure on land, which is affected by population growth while the area remaining constant.

The population density of Goa as per 2011 Census is 394 persons per sq.km. which is higher than the national average of 382. The population density has increased from 364 persons per sq.km. in 2001 to 394 persons per sq.km. in 2011. The population density of North Goa is higher than the South Goa. Mormugao Taluka (1391) has the highest population density followed by Salcete Taluka (1309) and Tiswadi Taluka (1266) while Sanguem Taluka (74) has the lowest population density followed by Sattari Taluka (132) and Canacona Taluka (135). 

Households Population

As per 2011 Census, there are total 3,43,611 households in the State, i.e. 1,91,766 (55.81%) households in North Goa and 1,51,845 (44.19%) households in South Goa. During the year 2001, number of households were reported to be 2,94,812 which grew by 16.55 percent during 2011 Census. Census wise household distribution since 1960 to 2011 is given in Chart No. 2.2.

As can be seen from Chart No. 2.2, during 1960 Census, there were 1,26,335 households in the State, which increased to 3,43,611 during 2011. 2,17,276 new households were enumerated during the period from 1960 to 2011, there by registering a growth of 172%.

Distribution of Population by Religion

Religion is an important and one of the basic cultural characteristics of a population. Religion forms an integral part of the Indian Social System. The data on religion has been presented for three major religions, viz. Hindus, Muslims, Christians. Besides, the minor religions have been classified under the category of Others. Religion wise distribution of population as per 2011 Census is given in Table No. 2.7. It is seen from the Table No. 2.7, that percentage share of Hindus is 66.08% followed by Christians i.e. 25.10% and Muslims population share is 8.33% whereas other minority Religions such as Sikh, Buddhist, Jain and others contribute to remaining 0.49%.

Table No.2.8 presents, religion wise percentage of population in the state since 1960 to 2011. The population of Hindus increased to 66.08% in 2011 from 59.92% during 1960 while Christian population has decreased considerably to 25.10% in 2011 from 38.07% during 1960. Population of Muslim has increased significantly to 8.33% in 2011 from 1.95% during 1960.

Scheduled Castes (SC) & Scheduled Tribes (ST) Population

As can be seen from Table No. 2.9, there are 25,449 persons belonging to Scheduled Caste, of which 17,606 are in North Goa and 7,843 in South Goa. Bardez Taluka in the North Goa is highly populated with Scheduled Caste, followed by Tiswadi and Pernem Taluka. Similarly, Salcete Taluka in the South has more Scheduled Goa population followed by Mormugao and Quepem Taluka as per 2011 Census. There was a little growth in the Scheduled Caste population during the 1981 to 2011 Census.

Table No. 2.12 presents Natural increase in population for the last 5 years from the year 2018 to 2022. Year wise Natural increase in population shows decreasing trend. Higher number of deaths in the year 2021 can be attributed to Covid-19 pandemic.



Chart No. 2.3 Birth Rate



Chart No. 2.4 Death Rate





Chart No. 2.5 Infant Mortality Rate



Chart No. 2.6 Maternal Mortality Rate





is reported to be 11,65,487 of which 6,15,823 are males and 5,49,664 are females.

As can be seen from Chart No. 2.7, during 2001 Census, literacy rate of the State was 82.01% which has increased significantly to 88.70% during 2011 Census showing an increase of 6.69% during the decade. The National Family Health Survey (NFHS-5) conducted during 2019-21 has recorded 93.25 percent literate in the State.

Highlights:

- The State has a total population of 14,58,545 as per 2011 Census which comprises of 7,39,140 (50.68%) males and 7,19,405 (49.32%) females.
- Population of North Goa is higher than South Goa. Population of the State is growing at the rate of 0.82% per year as per 2011 Census.
- The sex ratio of the State is 973 females per thousand males which is above the National average of 943 females per thousand males.
- The population density of Goa as per 2011 Census is 394 persons per Sq.km. which is higher than the

- national average of 382 persons per Sq.km.
- Out of 194 villages in North Goa,188 villages are inhabited and out of 140 villages in South Goa, 132 villages are inhabited. There are 47 Towns in North Goa and 23 Towns in South Goa.
- As per 2011 Census, there are 3,43,611 households in the State, i.e. 1,91,766 (55.81%) households in North Goa and 1,51,845 (44.19%) households in South Goa. the Households in State are showing significant increase from 1960 to 2011 Census, there by registering a growth of 172%.
- Major religion in the State is Hindu which constitute 66.08% of total population followed by Christians with 25.10% and Muslims with 8.33% whereas other minority Religions contribute to 0.49% in total.
- As per 2011 Census, number of literates in Goa is reported to be 11,65,487 of which 6,15,823 are males and 5,49,664 are females. The total literacy rate of the State works out be 88.70%. Goa stands at 4th position in respect to literacy in the country. The National Family Health Survey (NFHS-5) 2019-21, has recorded 93.25 percent literates in the State.

- The Birth rate in the State during the year 2021 was reported to be 9.72 per thousand population which has increased to 10.87 per thousand population during the year 2022.
- The Death rate in the State during the year 2021 was reported to be 11.59 per thousand population which has decreased to 9.4 per thousand population during the year 2022.
- The Infant Mortality Rate of the State is showing a decreasing trend. The State recorded 8.83 infant deaths per thousand live births in the year 2022, as compared to 9.09 infant deaths per thousand live births in the year 2021.
- The Maternal Mortality Rate (MMR) of Goa during the year 2022 is 57.72 per 1,00,000 live Births as compared to 123 per 1,00,000 live Births during the year 2021 which shows a decrease during the year 2022 as compared to year 2021.
- Total fertility rate as per National Family Health Survey 2015-16 (NFHS-4) conducted by Ministry of Health and Family Welfare is 1.7 which has decreased to 1.3 as per NFHS-5, 2019-20.

CHAPTER 3

STATE INCOME

Introduction

The Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP), commonly referred as State Income, measures the value of the all goods and services produced in an economy within the geographical boundaries of the State, in monetary terms during a fiscal year, without duplication. lt provides comprehensive, conceptual accounting frame work for analyzing and evaluating the performance of an economy.

State Income is one of the important indicators used to assess the economic health of the State. The estimates of State Domestic Product over a period, depict the extent and direction of changes in the level of economic development of the State.

The structure of economic activities change over time due to changes in structure of production and demand in the economy. On the production side, the production patterns change with the in technology advancement innovations in the system and in the production process some obsolete while other becomes production comes in vogue. On demand side too, the consumption pattern changes over time.

Analysis of the State Income estimates by Sectors, helps to locate the zones of weakness or stagnation of a certain economy and thereby helps in formulating appropriate plans to overcome it.

The changes in relative prices stimulate changes in the consumption production choices. Therefore. account for these structural changes and to update the prices, re-basing exercise is needed after a certain The exercise of re-basing period. National Accounts brings up a fresh lot of information about the changes in the economic structure of the State, along with switching over to new base prices. This also helps in judging the size of the economy, correction of biases and looking afresh at the relative importance of sectors in the economy. The National Statistics Office (NSO), Ministry of **Statistics** and Programme Implementation, Government of India revises the base year of the national accounts periodically to account for the structural changes in the economy.

The NSO has revised the base year of the national accounts from 2004-05 to 2011-12, revised the methodology of compilation and included new and recent data sources. It also brings up some change in the methods evaluation and the approaches accounting economic activities. introduces new concepts and incorporates new classifications.

In the revised series, Gross Value Added (GVA) at basic prices can be referred to as GVA at producer's price and GDP at market price as GDP at buyer's price. Estimates of GVA at factor cost (earlier called GDP at factor cost) can be compiled by using the estimates of GVA at basic prices and production taxes less subsidies. It would affect the size of GVA as compared to

GDP at factor cost, which may be different for different sectors.GDP at market prices, which is henceforth referred as GDP, can be computed by adding net of product taxes and product subsidies to GVA at basic prices.

Gross Value Added (GVA) at basic prices = compensation of employees + operating surplus/mixed income + consumption of fixed capital (CFC) or depreciation + production taxes - production subsidies.

GVA at factor cost (earlier referred to as GDP at factor cost) = GVA at basic prices + production taxes - production subsidies.

Gross Domestic Product (GDP) = Σ GVA at basic prices + product taxes - product subsidies.

Gross State Domestic Product (State Income) estimates have undergone a significant change with respect to the shift in the base year from 2004-05 to 2011-12 following the method adopted by the National Statistics Office. As such, statistical comparisons between the old and new base year cannot be drawn for GSDP from 2011-12 onwards. The methodology for compilation of the GSDP in the revised base year i.e. 2011-12 is given in Box 3.1.

Box 3.1

Methodology for compilation of the GSDP in the revised base year

- 1. The estimates of GVA, prepared at factor cost in the earlier series, are presently being prepared at Market Prices in the new series.
- Enterprise approach has replaced Establishment approach in the Annual Survey of Industries (ASI) from 2012-13 and post manufacturing activity has also been included in the estimation of GVA. GSDP (GSDP at Market Prices) = Gross State Value Added at Basic Prices + Product Taxes Product Subsidies
- 3. In the new series, MCA -21 (Ministry of Corporate Affairs) data has been involved in the estimation of Private Corporate Sector GVA.
- 4. The estimates of Computer related services was based on the proportion of private corporate workforce as revealed from Employment and

- Unemployment Survey of NSSO in the 2004-05 series. However, in the 2011-12 series these allocations are based on the proportion of software exports made by the State.
- Similarly, in manufacturing sector, All India Corporate estimates are allocated to the States based on State ASI ratios.
- 6. In the new series, the estimates of Agriculture and Livestock sector, Trade, Hotel and Restaurants sector are calculated separately. Transport sector estimates have been individualized as Road Transport, Water Transport, Air Transport and Services Incidental to Transport.
- 7. Further, the following results of latest surveys and censuses have also been incorporated

Population Census, 2011; All India Livestock Census, 2012; NSS 68th round (2011-12) – Survey on Employment & Unemployment and Household Consumption Expenditure:

- i) NSS 67th round (2010-11) Survey on Unincorporated Non-agricultural Enterprises;
- ii) NSS 70th round (2013) All India Debt and Investment Survey and Situation Assessment Survey.

The methodological changes include change in approach, better coverage, use of new valuation methods and introduction of new concepts. Some of them are as follows:

- The shift from Establishment approach to Enterprise approach: The Establishment approach used in Annual Survey of Industries (ASI) did not capture the activities of units other than manufacturing. However, an enterprise along with its manufacturing activities also is engaged in activities other than manufacturing such as ancillary activities etc. In the new approach, the activities of a manufacturing company other than manufacturing accounted in manufacturing sector only. These changes possibly have increased the coverage of the registered sector of manufacturing.
- Incorporation of the findings of NSSO Surveys: The details of new National Sample Surveys (NSS) viz. unorganized Enterprises Survey 2010-11 and Employment & Unemployment Survey 2011-12 are

now available and therefore incorporated in the new series. The updates are an improvement representing the activities in the unorganized manufacturing sector.

- The change in Labour Input Method: The new series has switched over to "Effective Labour Input Method" Unincorporated for Manufacturing Services and Enterprises. The earlier method had assigned equal weights to all types of workers, while the new method assigns different weights for workers as per their productivity.
- The inclusion of production tax less subsidies: The net production tax and production subsidies is positive in 'manufacturing', whereas it is interalia negative in 'agriculture and allied' and 'electricity, gas etc'. Therefore, the positive net production tax would increase the size of GVA in the in absolute terms and sector relative to other sectors. Moreover, any change, including change in alters the lump-sum policies, production tax and subsidies, it may also reflect in the growth rates in the sector.

To summarize, it can be concluded that, the vast difference in the new series' figures is not just because of updating of the database or change in methodology but also because of the change in data sources. The new GDP numbers will be liable to change in the future, based on change in the base year of Index of Industrial Production (IIP), Wholesale Price Index (WPI) and Consumer Price Index (CPI) series. These are important indices which play a pivotal role when computing GDP at Constant and Current Prices. Based on revisions of base year of these indices, GDP growth rates may change.

Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP) at Current Prices

The GSDP at Current Prices for the year 2022-23 (Quick Estimates) is ₹93672.38 crore as against ₹ 84266.24 crore (Provisional) for the year 2021-22 thereby registering a growth of 11.16 per cent for the year 2022-23. Sector and sub-sector wise composition of GSDP at Current Prices for the period from 2018-19 to 2022-23 (Q) is given in Annexure - 2.

As per the Advance Estimates (AE), the anticipated GSDP at Current Market Prices in the State during 2023-24 is expected to reach ₹ 106532.57 crore with a 13.73 percent growth.

The growth rates of GSDP and GDP at Current Prices from 2018-19 to 2022-23 are presented in Table No. 3.2.



Prices




The Quick Estimates of sector-wise percentage distribution of GSDP at Current Prices for the year 2022-23 reveal that, Primary Sector accounts for 6.41 per cent, Secondary Sector 51.97 per cent and tertiary sector 41.62 per cent of the GSDP.

It can be seen from the above table, that the contribution of the Primary Sector witnessed an increase of 7.64 per cent in 2019-20 and 7.83 per cent in 2020-21. However, the contribution decreased to 6.98 per cent in 2021-22 and in 2022-23(Q) it is expected to drop further down to 6.41 percent.

The contribution of Secondary Sector to GSDP which accounted for around 54.25 per cent in 2018-19 witnessed downward trend in 2019-20 of 52.88 percent but increased to 53.17 percent in 2020-21 and 53.72 in 2021-22. In 2022-23 (Q) the contribution of Secondary Sector was on lower side of 51.97 per cent.

Sector-wise percentage distribution of GSVA at Current Prices and the percentage growth over the previous year in respect of GSDP at Current

Prices during the period from 2018-19 to 2022-23 (Q) are given in Annexure – 4 and Annexure - 6 respectively.

It is observed from Annexure-6, that during the year 2020-21, the State witnessed a negative growth rate of (-) 0.62 percent in the tertiary sector. The sudden decline of (-) 1.17 per cent in GSDP at Current Prices was due to outbreak of Covid-19 pandemic in 2020-21 which led to a total lockdown in the Country. The GSDP at Current Prices for the year 2021-22 shows a positive growth of 13.63 per cent and in 2022-23 (Q), it is estimated to register a growth of 11.16 per cent.

2022-23 (Q) is estimated at ₹ 59866.75 crore as against ₹ 55342.45 crore during the year 2021-22 (P) thereby reflecting a growth of 8.18 percent in 2022-23 (Q) as against 5.35 percent in 2021-22 (P).

There is a possibility of the growth rate being revised in subsequent revisions carried out. The growth rates of GSDP and GDP at Constant Prices (2011-12) from 2018-19 to 2022-23 (Q) are presented in Table No. 3.5.

Sector-wise growth of GSDP at Current Prices is given in Table No. 3.4. As per the Quick Estimates for the year 2022-23, primary and secondary sectors registered a growth of 2.61 percent and 8.03 percent respectively over the previous year while tertiary sector registered a growth of 18.25 percent.

From the table it is seen that the growth rate in GSDP increased from 0.78 percent in 2018-19 to (-) 4.16 percent in 2020-21. However, the growth rate for the year 2021-22 and 2022-23 (Q) rose to 5.35 percent and 8.18 percent respectively.



Sectoral Composition

The sector-wise composition of GSDP at Constant Prices (2011-12) from 2018-19 to 2022-23 (Q) is given in Table No. 3.6. During the year 2022-23 (Q), primary sector accounted for 5.51 per cent, secondary sector for 57.72 per cent and tertiary sector accounted for 36.77 per cent.

The Primary Sector which accounted for 5.55 percent during the year 2018-19 increased to 5.70 percent during the year 2019-20. However, during the year 2020-21 & 2021-22 the contribution

dropped to 5.62 percent & 5.43 percent respectively. It is expected to contribute 5.51 per cent during the year 2022-23 (Q). But, the composition of Secondary Sector which was about 58.57 percent during 2018-19 decreased to 57.78 percent during the year 2019-20 and in the year 2022-23 Its contribution is expected to be 57.72 percent. Also, during the years 2019-20, 2020-21, 2021-22 and 2022-23 the contribution of the Secondary Sector varies within the range of 57 to 58 percent.

However, the composition of Tertiary Sector increased from 35.88 percent in 2018-19 to 36.77 percent during 2022-23 (Q). Sector-wise percentage distribution of GSVA at constant (2011-12) prices is given in Annexure-5.



The growth in Primary Sector dipped to (-)32.11 percent during year 2018-19 but increased to 4.54 percent for year 2019-20. During 2019-20, the growth rate was 4.54 percent due to the e-auction of mining ore. It declined to (-)4.35 percent in the year 2020-21. However, the growth rate increased to 8.42 percent for the year 2022-23 (Q).

Similarly, the growth rate under Tertiary Sector which was 2.15 percent in the year 2018-19 increased total 3.77 per cent in the year 2019-20, and is expected to increase to 8.37 per cent during the year 2022-23 (Q). The sectoral growth rate of GSDP at Constant Prices (2011-12) is given in Table No. 3.7.

Per Capita Income / Per Capita GSDP

Per Capita Income is calculated by dividing GSDP at Current Prices with mid-financial year projected population (as on 1st October). Per Capita Income/Per Capita GSDP over the period from 2018-19 to 2022-23 (Q) is given in Table No. 3.8. It is seen from the table that per capita income depicts an upward trend from ₹ 467795 in the year 2018-19 to ₹ 539131 in the year 2021-22 (P) and ₹ 596260 in the year 2022-23 (Q).

Net State Domestic Product (NSDP) measures the value of all goods and services produced within the boundaries of the State during a given period of time after deducting the depreciation from the Gross State Domestic Product. The Net State Domestic Product (NSDP) at

Net State Domestic Product (NSDP) at Current Prices

The NSDP at Current Prices for the year 2022-23 (Q) stood at ₹ 83711.36 crore as against ₹ 74305.22 crore during the year 2021-22 (P) indicating a growth of 12.66 percent during the year as compared to a growth of 12.95 percent in the year 2021-22 over the previous year. Sector and sub sector-wise NSDP at Current Prices for the period from 2018-19 to 2022-23 is given in Annexure - 8.

The sector-wise composition of Net State Value Added (NSVA) at Current Prices during the year 2022-23 (Q) shows that the Secondary Sector accounts for 51.82 per cent of NSDP followed by the Tertiary and Primary Sectors which accounts for 41.38 per cent and 6.80 percent respectively. Sector-wise percentage distribution of NSDP at Current Prices for the period

from 2018-19 to 2022-23 (Q) is given in Annexure -10.

Sector-wise growth of NSDP for the year 2022-23 (Q) shows that the Primary Sector registered a growth rate of 2.79 percent which is quite higher than the growth rate reported during the year 2021-22 (-0.20 per cent). On the other hand, the Secondary and Tertiary Sectors grew at 9.21 percent and 21.31 percent respectively during the year 2022-23 (Q) as against 12.05 percent and 13.27 per cent during the year 2021-22 (P).

Under the Primary Sector, 'Fishing & Aquaculture' sub-sector is expected to attain a higher growth rate of 30 per cent followed by 'Mining & Quarrying and 'Livestock' registering growth rates of 4.45 and 1.20 per cent respectively. The sub-sector of Forestry & Logging' is expected to show a negative growth rate of (-) 45.07 percent during the year 2022-23 (Q).

In the Secondary Sector, 'Construction sub-sector' is expected to record a growth of about 29.05 percent. While 'Electricity, Gas, Water Supply and Other Utility Services' and 'Manufacturing' are expected to register a growth of 18.74 percent and 5.02 percent respectively.

Further, under the Tertiary Sector, 'Financial Services' 'Transport, Storage, Communication & Services related to Broadcasting' may record a higher growth rate of 44.94 percent followed by 'Trade, Repair, Hotels and Restaurants' (28.07 percent), 'Real Estate, Ownership of Dwelling and Professional Services' (20.09)percent), and **Public** Administration (17.82 percent). percentage growth in respect of NSDP Current **Prices** at given Annexure -12.

Net State Domestic Product (NSDP) at Constant Prices (2011-12)

The NSDP at Constant Prices (2011-12) for the year 2022-23 (Q) stood at ₹ 52425.76 crore as against ₹ 47901.46 crore for the year 2021-22 (P), reflecting a growth of 9.44 percent over the year 2021-22. The sector and sub-sector wise composition of NSDP at Constant Prices (2011-12) over the period from 2018-19 to 2022-23 (Q) is given in Annexure - 9.

The sector-wise composition of NSDP at Constant Prices (2011-12) reveals that during the year 2022-23 (Q), the Primary, Secondary and Tertiary sectors accounted for 5.89 percent, 58.27 per cent and 35.84 percent respectively.

The contribution of Primary Sector which was 5.80 percent in 2018-19 increased to 6.02 percent in 2019-20 and is expected to be pegged around 5.89 percent in 2022-23 (Q).

The contribution of Secondary Sector to NSDP ranged from 59.48 percent to 58.55 percent during 2018-19 to 2021-22(P). The contribution of Secondary Sector to NSDP stood at 58.27 per cent during 2022-23 (Q).

The share of Tertiary Sector in NSDP shows an upward trend over the years from 34.72 percent during the year 2018-19 to 35.43 percent in the year 2019-20. It declined marginally in the year 2020-21 to 34.42 and thereafter its share increased to 35.18 per cent and 35.84 per cent in 2021-22 (P) and 2022-23 (Q) respectively.

Sector-wise percentage distribution of NSDP at Constant Prices for the period from 2018-19 to 2022-23 (Q) is given in Annexure -11.

The percentage growth in respect of NSDP at Constant Prices (2011-12) over the previous years is given in Annexure- 13.

Sector wise growth of NSDP for the year 2022-23 (Q) shows that the Primary Sector registered a positive growth of 9.19 percent, while the Secondary Sector recorded a growth of 6.80 percent and the Tertiary Sector grew by 10.12 percent.

Under the Primary Sector, 'Mining and Quarrying' is expected to register huge decrease in its growth rate as compared to the previous year 2021-22 (P). On the other hand, 'Crops', 'Livestock' and 'Forestry and Logging have shown a marginal increase in its growth rate. Whereas, 'Fishing & Aquaculture' is expected to grow at 25.30 percent.

Under Secondary the Sector. Construction, a growth rate of 27.38 percent is expected. Electricity, Gas, Water Supply & Other Utility Services may witness a growth of 7.24, whereas a growth of 4.97 percent is anticipated under Manufacturing. Under Tertiary Sector, Transport, Storage, Communication & Services related to Broad casting are expected to register an increase in the growth rate of 26.96 percent followed by Trade, Repairs, Hotels and Restaurant' (22.71 percent).

Per Capita Income NSDP and NDP – Comparison

Per Capita Income is estimated by dividing NSDP at Current Prices with mid-financial year projected population (as on 1st October).

The per capita income under NSDP and NDP at Current and Constant Prices (2011-12) from 2018-19 to 2022-23 (Q) is depicted in Table No. 3.10.

GSDP and **GDP**- Comparison

A comparison of GSDP and GDP at Current and Constant Prices (2011-12) is given in Table No. 3.11. It is seen from the table that during the year 2021-22 (P) GSDP growth rate at Constant Prices (2011-12) increased to 5.35 percent from 0.78 percent during 2018-19 and is expected to rise to 8.18 percent for the year 2022-23 (Q).

During 2018-19 GDP growth rate at Constant Prices (2011-12) was around 6.50 percent. However, in subsequent years i.e. 2019-20 declined to 3.90 percent & further to (-) 5.80 percent during the year 2020-21 (2nd RE) due to outbreak of Covid-19 pandemic only to recover in 2021-22 by 9.10 percent. GDP at Constant Prices (2011-12) is expected to show a growth rate of 7.20 per cent during the year 2022-23 (Provisional Estimate).

The growth rate of GSDP at Current Prices in the State during 2018-19 stood at 3.61 percent and thereafter increased to 4.42 percent in 2019-20. It decreased drastically to (-) 1.17 percent in 2020-21 owing to Covid-19 pandemic only to rise by 13.63 percent in 2021-22. During 2022-23 (Q) GSDP growth is estimated at 11.16 percent.

CHAPTER 4

PUBLIC FINANCE

STATE FINANCES

The Public Finance depicts the current status on the part of Government in the economy. It accounts for the government revenue and expenditure of its jurisdiction. In order to emerge the economy of the country, Public finances are influential in efficient utilization of Capital. It contributes to the holistic development and well-being of the macroeconomics of the general public.

The revenue receipts are estimated to be ₹ 20,227.85 crore, as per Budget Estimates for the year 2023-24.

As per Budget Estimates, the Revenue surplus is ₹ 669.47 crore (BE 2023-24) and the fiscal deficit is estimated to be ₹ 4,183.11 crore.

The Capital Receipts are estimated at ₹ 5640.30 crore for the year 2023-24 (BE) showing an absolute increase of 17.71% i.e. ₹ 848.75 crore over previous year i.e. 2022-23 (RE). The internal debt of the State for the year 2023-24 is estimated at ₹ 4500.20 crore.

BUDGET AT A GLANCE

An abstract of Budget 2023-24 is given in Table No. 4.1.

As seen from Table No. 4.1 the total receipts is estimated at ₹ 25868.15 crore as against ₹ 20743.09 crore (RE 2022-23) showing an increase of 24.70% and total expenditure is estimated at ₹ 25993.34 crore as against ₹ 21580.01 crore (RE 2022-23) registering an increase of 20.45% over the previous year 2022-23 (RE).

I. REVENUE ACCOUNT

Revenue Account comprises of Current Receipts and Payments of the State.

1. Revenue Receipts

Revenue receipts of the State covers four main sources (i) Tax Revenue, (ii) Non-tax Revenue, (iii) Grants-in-aid from Central Government and (iv) Share in Central taxes.

The revenue receipts for the State during the last 5 years from 2019-20 to 2023-24 (BE) is given in the Table 4.2. Year wise break-up of revenue receipts in terms of percentage is shown in Chart No. 4.1.




% Wise Break- up of the Revenue Receipts for last 5 years



As per the budget, revenue receipts for 2023-24 (BE) is estimated at ₹ 20227.85 crore as against to ₹ 15951.54 crore in 2022-23 (RE) which signifies an increase of 26.80% from the Revised Estimate of 2022-23.

Chart No. 4.2 shows the percentage share of revenue receipts for the year 2023-24 (BE). There are four broad categories of revenue receipts i.e. tax revenue, non-tax revenue, Grant-in-aid from Central Government and share in Central taxes.

State's own tax revenue forms the highest share in revenue receipts (44%) followed by share in Central taxes (23%), State's own non-tax revenue (19%) and Grants-in-aid from Central Government (14%).

1. Tax Revenue


The tax revenue of State from 2019-20 to 2023-24 (BE) is given in Table No. 4.2 and shown in Chart No. 4.3. It comprises of (i) State's own Tax Revenue, and (ii) States Share in Central Taxes.

The State's own Tax revenue is expected to increase from ₹ 6331.17 crore in 2022-23 (RE) to ₹ 8588.79 crore in 2023-24 (BE), whereas State's Share

in Central Tax is expected to increase from ₹ 3508.51 crore in 2022-23 (RE) to ₹ 3942.78 crore in 2023-24 (BE). The total tax of the State including both Own Tax Revenue and Share in Central Tax is expected to increase from ₹ 9839.68 crore in 2022-23(RE) to ₹ 12531.57 crore in 2023-24 (BE).

Receipts under broad components of tax revenue from 2019-20 to 2023-24 (BE)




a) State's Own Tax Revenue

The total State's Own Tax Revenue was ₹ 6331.17 crore in 2022-23 (RE) and ₹ 8588.79 crore in 2023-24(BE), which increased by 35.66% from 2022-23 (RE).

The composition of individual components of State's Own Tax Revenue for the year 2023-24 (BE) is shown in Chart No. 4.4. A major composition of State's Own Tax Revenue comes from State Goods and Service Tax i.e.₹ 3835.50 crore which contributes around (44.66%) during the year 2023-24 (BE) followed by Taxes on Sales, Trade, etc (24.94%), Stamp and registration fees (12.78%), State Excise (9.79%) and Taxes on Vehicle (5.81%), Land revenue (1.11%), and Others Taxes and Duties on Commodities and Services Goods (0.48%)Taxes on and Passengers (0.44%).

Percentage wise break-up of State's own tax revenue for 2023-24 (BE)




b) Share in Central taxes

Resources flow from the Centre are estimated to be ₹ 3942.78 crore in 2023-24 (BE).

Major share of resources from the Centre attributed to allocation of Central GST amounting to ₹ 1274.91 crore, i.e. 32.34%.

Other share in central resources comprise of Corporation Tax (32.01%), Taxes on Income other than Corporation Tax (31.14%), Customs (3.17%), Service Tax (2%) and Union Excise duties (1.33%). Details are elaborated in Chart No. 4.5.



2. Non-Tax Revenue

The receipts under non tax revenue for the year 2023-24 (BE) is given in Table 4.2 and shown in Chart No. 4.6. The total non-tax revenue comprise of (i) State own non tax revenue and (ii) Grants-in-aid from Government of India. Total non-tax revenue is estimated at ₹ 7696.28 crore which is 25.92% higher as compared to 2022-23 (RE).

a) State's Own Non-Tax revenue

In 2023-24 (BE), the State is estimated to earn ₹ 6025.88 crore in the form of State's own non-tax revenue, an increase of 118.29% over the Revised Estimates of 2022-23.

b) Grants-in-Aid from Central Government

The Central Government provides Grants-in-aid to the State Government for the implementation of various Central Sector and Centrally Sponsored Schemes. The allocation of Grants-in-aid from 2019-20to 2023-24 (BE) is given in Table No. 4.2.

Total receipt from the Grants-in-aid from Central Government for the year 2023-24(BE) is Estimated to be ₹ 1670.40 crore, a decrease of 50.16% as against Revised Estimate of 2022-23.





II. CAPITAL ACCOUNT

A. Capital Receipts

The Capital receipts consist of four parts (i) Internal Debt, (ii) Loans and Advances from Central Government, (iii) Non-Debt Capital Receipts and (iv) Others (Public Account – Net).

The Capital Receipts are estimated at ₹ 5640.30 crore in 2023-24 (BE) as against ₹ 4791.55 crore in 2022-23 (RE) showing an increase of 17.71% over 2023-24 (BE). Year wise break up of Capital Receipts is shown in Table No. 4.4. The percentage share of Capital receipts for the year 2023-24 (BE) is shown in Chart No. 4.9.

Break up of Capital Receipts 2023-24 (BE)



B. Capital Expenditure

The capital expenditure consist of Capital outlay, lending and repayment of debts. This includes expenditure on construction of schools, hospitals, roads and bridges.

Capital expenditure in 2023-24 is estimated at ₹ 6434.96 crore (BE), which is only 4.23% increase over the Revised Estimate of 2022-23. The Capital expenditure from the year 2019-20 to 2023-24 (BE) is given in Table No. 4.5. The comparison between Capital Receipts & Capital Expenditure can be seen in Chart No. 4.10.





In 2023-24, State is expected to observe a revenue surplus of ₹ 669.47 crore. The fiscal deficit is estimated to be ₹4183.11 crore and primary surplus is estimated to be ₹ 2185.48 crore.

Revenue Collected from major Departments

CHAPTER 5

INSTITUTIONAL FINANCE

Banking Industry

Banking in India forms the base for the economic development of the country. Banking system and management have witnessed huge change over the last few years with the advancement in technology, digitization and mobile & Internet banking which has helped people to fulfill their needs.

The banking sector provides financial stability to the Indian economy. It also offers safe, secure & authentic financial facilities to cater various services to the people.

Banks in Goa have shown a tremendous growth with an excellent banking network spread across the State.

As on 30.09.2023 there are 774 Bank branches in the State serving 15 lakh population of which 475 are in semi urban areas and 299 in rural areas. Approximately 2047 individuals are covered per Bank Branch.

Banking Scenario in the State

As on 30.09.2023 there are 47 banks operating in the State of which 12 are Public Sector Banks, 17 Private Sector, 13 Cooperative and 5 Small Finance Banks.

Category wise number of banks along with the branches are given in Table No. 5.1.



As can be seen from the Table No.5.1, 56.72 percent of the banks in Goa are coming under the Public sector (439), followed by Private Sector Banks (200) with 25.84 percent and 15.76 percent coming under Cooperative sector (122). Out of 439 branches of Public Sector Banks, 214 are in North Goa and 225 in South Goa. There are 200 branches of Private sector banks in the State of which 106 branches are in North Goa and 94 in South Goa.


As can be seen from Chart No. 5.1, there are 475 branches in semi urban area and 299 branches in rural areas. Public Sector banks have 236 branches in semi urban and 203 branches in rural areas. Private Sector Banks have 136 branches in semi urban areas and 64 in rural areas.

Business Correspondents / Customer Service Point (BC/CSP)

A Business Correspondent (BC) is a person who acts as an intermediary between financial institutions and its customers. The BC model has been implemented in many countries provide financial services to rural and remote areas where it not economically viable for financial institutions to maintain its physical presence.

To fulfill the needs of the rural customers and to make it convenient for the village people to access the financial system, Banks have adopted BC model rural areas which is gradually attaining momentum. As on 30.09.2023 banks have initiated with 70 Business Correspondents (BC) Customer Service Points (CSP) in the State. Bank wise **Business** Correspondents / Customer Service Point (BC/CSP) is given in Chart No.5.2.



It is seen from the Table No. 5.2, Public Sector deposits stands at ₹ 77, 323.58 crore accounting to 68.96% of the total deposits, followed by Private Sector with 25.67% which is ₹ 28,784 crore and Cooperative Sector & Small Finances with 5.11% and 0.26% respectively accumulating to ₹ 6022.91 crore from the remaining portion.

Advances

Total advances given by the banks stands at ₹35,729.39 crore as on 30th September 2023. Total advances given by the Public Sector Banks is ₹21,071.52 crore followed by Private Sector bank with ₹10,866.66 crore. As can be seen from Table No. 5.3, comparison of advances given by the banks during the last two financial years as on 30th September. During the current financial year advances given by the banks increased by 16.12% i.e. by ₹4959.47 crore over previous year. Advances of Small Finances increased by 53.40% followed by Private Sector and Public Sector banks with 28.48 % & 12.50% respectively during the current financial year up to 30th September 2023.

Credit Deposit (CD) Ratio

It is an important financial measure which gives an insight about the bank's lending practices and risk exposure. As on 30th September 2023, Credit Deposit Ratio of the State stands at 31.86 as compared to 30.23 during the previous year.

The Credit Deposit Ratio increased by 1.63% during the current financial year up to 30th September 2023 over previous year due to the disbursements of more loans. Bank wise total Deposits, Advances and Credit Deposit Ratio of the State as on 30th September 2023 is given in Annexure - 18 Sector wise Credit Deposit Ratio during last two financial years up to 30th September are shown in Table No.5.4.

As can be seen from Table No. 5.5, Ancillary Activities have achieved 116.09 % of their target followed by Crop loans with 100.91%. The disbursement under Crop loans was ₹ 454.21 crore against their annual target of ₹ 450.10 crore.

Disbursement under Agri. term loans works out to be ₹ 280.33 crore which is 50.97% of their annual target. The total disbursement under Agriculture sector up to September 2023 is ₹ 953.52 crore which works out to be 78.47 % of their annual target. Total disbursements under the other sector works out to be ₹ 4132.11 crore, of which ₹ 3843.03 crore is under Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) sector followed by Housing with ₹ 203.57 crore and others.

As can be seen from the Table No. 5.6, as on 30th September 2023 total outstanding under Priority Sector Advances (PSA) works out to ₹ 14234.12 crore, which is 42.86% of the total advances.

Total outstanding advances under PSA has increased by ₹ 1064.98 crore in the current financial year compared to previous year during the same period.

The total advances under Differential Interest Rate (DIR) as on 30th September 2023 is ₹ 0.81 crore which has increased marginally as compared to previous year. The total advances under SC/ST is ₹ 170.34 crore which has increased by ₹ 36.98 crore over previous year during the same period.

National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD)

NABARD an apex development bank owned by the Government of India set up under an Act of Parliament for supporting and promoting agriculture and rural development.

NABARD has been playing a crucial role in the development of various activities in the farm and non-farm sector in the country.

NABARD is already engaged in providing capacity building support in agriculture and rural development to the officials of Rural Financial Institutions (RFIs), Non Government Organizations (NGO), Microfinance institutions (MFIs), etc.

Refinance to Goa State Cooperative Bank

- NABARD has released ₹50 crore to Goa State Cooperative Bank for the first time under long term refinance to cater the credit needs of Agriculture and allied activities.
- NABARD has also released ₹ 4 crore under short term Agriculture lending to Goa State Cooperative Bank for onward distribution of Agri Loans to farmers at nominal rate.

Rural Infrastructure Development Fund

- NABARD provides loans to State Government for creation of rural infrastructure under Rural Infrastructure Development Fund (RIDF).
- Cumulative sanctions as on December 2023 under RIDF (including sanctions during the current year) stood at ₹ 3562.93 crore, and Cumulative disbursement at ₹ 2161.17 crore, representing 61% of the sanctions.
- Under RIDF, State Government has created rural infrastructure under Agriculture and Allied sector, Rural connectivity and Social infrastructure.

Farm and Off Farm Sector Development

 NABARD extends grant assistance for pilot projects on experimental basis to create sustainable and successful agriculture, entrepreneurship development and skill development models.

- grant NABARD has provided assistance to **ICAR-CCARI** for implementation of Farm sector pilot projects such as promotion of ornamental fisheries, innovative technologies in agriculture, reclamation of khazan land. development of market intelligence app for horticulture crops, etc.
- NABARD has sanctioned Nine Rural Marts in the State to provide marketing avenues for SHG products.
- NABARD has also supported in sponsoring stalls for exhibitions, Chavath Bazar, Diwali Bazar, SARAS Goa to Women SHG groups, Village Organisations etc..
- NABARD has supported 07 Skill training programme including AC technician, Assistant electrician, plumbing general, nursing assistanceship etc.
- NABARD has provided grant support for implementing the Watershed project in Sattari Block through VANARAI, a NGO. This activitiy will ensure soil & water conservation through community participation.

Promotion of Farmer Producers Organisation (FPO)

- As part of the Central Sector Scheme, Government of India, on Farmer Producers Organisation (CSS on FPOs), NABARD is promoting 05 FPOs in North Goa district (01 in each block).
 - These FPOs are registered under Companies Act as Farmer Producers Company (FPC) and

- mobilised over 1000 members, as on December 2023.
- A grant assistance of ₹90 lakh is sanctioned to these FPOs for the period of 03 years. Cumulatively, grant assistance of ₹ 18.10 lakh has been released to the FPCs.
- Besides, NABARD is also promoting one Dairy Producer Organisation in Pedne through its own fund.



Launch of Bicholim FPO

Promotion of Off-Farm Producer Organization (OFPO)

- NABARD under Off-farm sector development initiaitves has promoted the Off-farm Farmer Producers Company OFPO to revive the kunbi handloom.
- Grant assistance of ₹48.90 lakh has been sanctioned by NABARD through its own funds for 3 years for revival of Kunbi weave native to Goa.
- The OFPO has 60 women weaver members producing Kunbi-saree, Shawls, towels etc.

Climate Change Initiatives

- Recently, NABARD Consultancy Services (NABCONS), a wholly owned subsidiary of NABARD has entered into an MoA with the Goa State Biodiversity Board (GSBB) for implementation of Carbon Credit Framework.
- The project envisages to incentivize farmers by promotion of horticulture to help in reducing carbon emission and ensuring carbon sequestration.

CHAPTER 6

SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOAL

Introduction

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) lays out an unique ambitious and comprehensive agenda for global development by 2030 which embraces economic. environmental and social aspects of the wellbeing of the society. The SDGs are a bold universal set of 17 Goals and 169 targets to help organize and streamline development action for greater achievements of human wellbeing, while leaving no one behind by **Developments** 2030. in all dimensions include all people, everywhere, and should be built through the participation of everyone, especially the most vulnerable and marginalized section society. of the comprehensive agenda recognizes that it is no longer sufficient just to focus on economic growth, but on fairer and more equal societies, and a safer and more prosperous planet.

At the UN Sustainable Development Summit in 2015, Hon'ble Prime Minister of India in his statement, strongly affirmed India's commitment to Agenda 2030 and SDGs. NITI Aayog is the nodal institution for achieving SDGs in the country. NITI Aayog has the twin mandate to oversee the adoption and monitoring of the SDGs in the country promote competitive and cooperative federalism among States and The Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI) has been entrusted with responsibility of developing the National Indicator Framework (NIF) which will help in monitoring the progress of the SDGs and associated targets.

State Governments are key to India's progress on the SDGs as they are best placed to 'put people first' and ensure that 'no one is left behind'. The UN Country Team in India supports NITI Aayog, Union Ministries and State Governments in their efforts to address the inter-connectedness of the goals, to ensure that no one is left behind and to advocate for adequate financing to achieve the SDGs.

Government of Goa is fully committed to the dynamic agenda of SDGs and ensured that all efforts shall be made in its accomplishment. It has been a continuous stride of the Government on improving the performance of SDGs and collaborating them to the National agenda. The Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI) in collaboration with Directorate of Planning. Statistics and Evaluation, Government of Goa, Two-days organized Regional а Workshop on Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Gender Statistics" at Goa from 11th to 12th December 2023. Representatives from MoSPI, NITI Aayog, UNDP and representatives from States such as Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Gujarat, Goa and Union Territory Dadra and Nagar Haveli attended the workshop.



The SDGs were adopted in the State in align with the Central Government agenda towards its implementation. The Government of Goa designated Directorate of Planning, Statistics & Evaluation as State Nodal Department for implementation & monitoring of SDGs at the State level and also relevant **Departments** appointed concerned against each SDG as a Nodal Department.

As emphasized by the Government of India for achieving SDGs, the State has developed its own Indicator framework under each SDG in consultation with all the Nodal Departments for proper monitoring of SDGs. State has prepared published Goa-State Indicator Framework (Goa-SIF) Version 1.0 in 2022 which consist of 16 goals, 132 targets and 280 indicators. Further, State has prepared Goa-SIF version 2.0 in 2023 which consist of 16 goals, 132 targets and 272 indicators. Goa-SIF has been prepared in-line with National Indicator framework (NIF) prepared by Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation. summary The number of Targets, indicators and the Nodal Department against each SDGs are provided at Annexure – 20.

Goa SDG Index

The performance of the State is measured through the SDG Index. The NITI Aayog has published SDG India Index at National level to provide impetus to the State to nurture cooperative federalism. The first baseline report was published in 2018 and thereafter for two consecutive years in 2019-20 and 2020-21. As per SDG India Index 2019-20, the State was ranked at 7th position by securing a composite index score of 65 and as per SDG India Index 2020-21, the State of Goa has emerged to secure 4th position by securing composite Index score of 72.

As the report from NITI Aayog was awaited, an idea was inculcated to compute the State's own SDG Index hence it has been decided to estimate progress through а measurable Index that would serve as an advocacy tool and trigger action at the State level. New methodology for computation of SDG Index has been developed by the Directorate Planning, Statistics and Evaluation inline with NITI Aayog Methodology and Index-2023 Goa SDG has been computed spanning across 16 out of 17 SDGs (excluding out Goal 17).

The Index tracks the progress of Goa on a set of 131 Priority Indicators under 69 targets, measuring their progress on the outcomes of the interventions and schemes of the Government of Goa. The Goa SDG Index is an aggregate measure which can be understood and used by everyone viz. policymakers, economists, businesses, civil society and the general public. It has been designed to provide an aggregate assessment of the performance of Goa State and to help leaders and policy makers to evaluate their performance on social, economic and environmental parameters. It aims to measure the State progress towards SDGs targets and highlights the progress made by the State so far in the journey of SDGs. The Goa SDG Index tells us where the State currently stands on each of the goals considered, and serves as a benchmark.

A composite score is computed based on the aggregate performance across 16 SDGs. The value of the score indicates the average performance of the State towards achieving the 16 SDGs and their respective targets. The score signifies the position between the worst possible outcome 0 and the best, or target outcome 100. Accordingly the classified based on four score is (0-49).categories **Aspirant** viz.

Performer (50-64), Front runner (65-99) and Achiever (100).

As per the Goa SDG Index 2023, the composite score of Goa is 84 and it bagged a position in the category of Front Runner. The Index indicates that Goa has performed well in terms of water. parameters like sanitation. clean energy, infrastructure, sustainable consumption, climate and coastal ecosystem. As per the Goa SDG Index, the State got full score & bagged a position in the category of Achiever in four goals namely "Affordable and Clean Energy, Responsible Consumption and Production, Climate Action and Life below Water.

However, in two goals namely Gender Equality and Life on Land, the State received a score of 58 and 62 respectively and bagged a position in the category of Performer.

The State's score ranges between 72 and 98 in ten goals such as No Poverty, Zero Hunger, Good Health, Quality Education, Clean water & Sanitation, Decent Work and Economic Growth, Industry, Innovation & Infrastructure, Reduced Inequalities, Sustainable Cities & Communities, Life on Land and Peace, Justice & Strong institutions and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner.

As per NITI Aayog SDG Index 2020-21, Composite score of Goa is 72 while it is significantly increased to 84 as per Goa SDG Index 2023 and has secured a position in the category of Front Runner.



Goal 1: No Poverty

Goal 1 aims to end poverty everywhere. The implementing State is comprehensive development strategy to end poverty in all its forms. The strategy encompasses focusing on economic growth, supporting poverty alleviation programmes, providing gainful employment, strengthening livelihood opportunities and improving access to basic services, particularly for the socioeconomically disadvantaged vulnerable sections of the population.

Important policy initiatives have been taken up and a number of outcomebased and well-targeted programmes and schemes are being executed such as Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM), Har Ghar Jal, Mahatma Gandhi National **Employment Generation** Rural Act (MGNREGA), Pradhan Mantri Matritva Vandana Yojana (PMMVY), Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana of Pradhan Mantri National Rural & Urban Livelihood Mission and manv more have contributed significantly in enhancing overall quality of life of people.

The Index Score for SDG 1 'No Poverty' is 86 and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner

Goal 2: Zero Hunger

Goal 2 aims to end all forms of hunger and malnutrition, ensuring that all people, especially children have access to sufficient and nutritious food all year round.

The State Government envisages to provide high nutritious food to the school children through the Mid-Day Meal Scheme, as one of the initiative in hunger reduction. Under the Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS), supplementary nutrition is provided to pregnant women, lactating mothers and children below 6 years of age. The implementation of a revamped Public Distribution System under the National Food Security Act (NFSA), 2013 is a paradigm shift in the approach towards the issue of food security at the household level, from welfare to a rightsbased approach.

The nutritional programmes such as Anemia Mukt Bharat and Poshan Abhiyaan made a concrete attack on under-nutrition, stunting, and anemia.

The Index Score for SDG 2 'Zero Hunger' is 72 and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner.

Goal 3: Good health and well-being

Goal 3 aims to ensure that people enjoy health levels that enable them to lead a socially and economically productive life.

The State ensures to address the various emerging health issues of the ever-changing world and to provide world class facilities related to health by its existing infrastructure and also foresee the enhanced requirements in health.

The emphasis on water and sanitation, primarily through the Swachh Bharat Mission, has a considerable impact on the control of communicable diseases.

The implementation of the "Reproductive, Maternal, Newborn, Child and Adolescent Health strategy" has a profound impact on the maternal health situation. Ayushman Bharat and POSHAN Abhiyan are two of the most comprehensive and recent programmes of the Government in promoting good health.

The Index Score for SDG 3 'Good Health and Well-Being' is 73 and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner

Goal 4: Quality Education

Goal 4 aims to ensure inclusive, equitable and quality education for all, including technical and vocational training by providing lifelong learning opportunities, so as to achieve substantial adult literacy and numeracy.

State Government has various schemes and programmes to ensure that children from the vulnerable sections of the societies enroll in and attend schools. Two of the many schemes, namely Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan and the Mid-day Meal scheme have made a huge impact and success.

The Mid-day Meal scheme is also aimed at increasing enrolment in primary school children while Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan, on the other hand, aims to universalize elementary education across the State. As a measure for quality education, State is devoted in implementing the New Education Policy at all levels of education.

The Index Score for SDG 4 'Good Quality Education' is 80 and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner.

Goal 5: Gender Equality

Goal 5 aims to achieve gender equality by ending all forms of discrimination, violence and harmful practices, including trafficking and sexual exploitation against women and girls.

Concrete efforts are being made towards eliminating gender inequality by focusing on education of the girl child, providing access to health care facilities to girls and women, and ensuring access to livelihood opportunities.

participation of The women in Panchayati Raj Institutions is having a positive impact on decision making opportunities for women in public sphere. Schemes and Programmes, such as Laadli Laxmi Scheme, Mamta Scheme, Griha Aadhar Scheme, Beti Beti Padhao campaign, Sukanya Samridhi Yojana are all steps in the right direction to eliminate gender inequality.

The Index Score for SDG 5 'Gender Equality' is 58 and bagged a position in the category of Performer.

Goal 6: Clean Water & Sanitation

Goal 6 on Clean Water and Sanitation aims to improve water quality by reducing pollution, substantially increasing water-use efficiency across all sectors and supporting and strengthening the participation of local communities in improving water and sanitation management.

The State ensures availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all. Initiatives like the Swachh Bharat Mission and Har Ghar Jal have provided the necessary thrust to State's commitment on providing access to clean water and sanitation to all. 100% of Goa's population receives safe and adequate drinking water within premises through piped water supply. The flagship initiative of the Swachh Bharat Mission covering all rural and urban areas has successfully achieved the target of making Goa open-defecation-free (ODF).

The Index Score for SDG 6 'Clean Water & Sanitation' is 97 and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner.

Goal 7: Affordable & Clean Energy

Goal 7 aims to ensure universal access to affordable, reliable, and modern energy services.

Goa has achieved the milestone of providing electricity and LPG connections to all eligible households. State Government is under formalising a new solar and renewable energy policy ensure 100% to renewable energy usage.

The Index Score for SDG 7 'Affordable & Clean Energy' is 100 and bagged a position in the category of Achiever.

SDG 8: Decent work & Economic Growth

The Goal of Decent Work and Economic Growth aims to achieve higher levels of productivity through economic technological diversification and promote up-gradation also and development-oriented policies that support decent job creation. entrepreneurship and creativity innovation.

Government Programmes like Goa Start-up Policy, Chief Minister Rojgar Yojana, Make in India, Digital India, Skill India, among others are all directed towards promoting and encouraging entrepreneurship, creativity, innovation, and inclusive business. The Index Score for SDG 8 'Decent Work and Economic Growth' is 72 and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner.

SDG 9: Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure

The Goal on Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure aims at building quality, reliable and resilient infrastructure.

Focus on the digital revolution, internet penetration and financial inclusion are contributing towards growth and investment. Programmes like Goa Start-up Policy, Chief Minister Rojgar Yojana, Make in India, Digital India and Skill India, have been playing an essential role in augmenting the collective growth impact.

These reforms are fast creating a highly conducive ecosystem accelerating the growth of innovation, creativity, entrepreneurship and business within a fast growing formal economy.

The Index Score for SDG 9 'Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure' is 98 and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner.

SDG 10: Reduced Inequalities

Goal 10 on Reduced Inequalities calls for progressively reducing not only income inequalities but also inequalities of outcome by ensuring access to equal opportunities and promoting social, economic and political inclusion of all, irrespective of age, sex, disability, race, ethnicity, religion or other status relevant within a society.

The State on implementation of this Goal, believes that inequality is not only a barrier to progress but also deprives people from opportunities and ultimately leads extreme poverty. Schemes like Pradhan Mantri Jan Dhan Yojana, Gandhi National Rural Mahatma **Employment** Generation PMVishwakarma Yojana and Chief Minister Rojgar Yojana are aimed at reducing social, economic and political gaps and progressively achieving greater equality in the country.

The Index Score for SDG 10 'Reduced Inequalities' is 82 and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner.

SDG 11: Sustainable Cities & Communities

Goal 11 on Sustainable Cities and Communities aims to promote inclusive and sustainable urbanization by providing access to safe and affordable housing, public transport, basic services and green public spaces through improved urban planning and management.

The Smart Cities Mission (SCM), aims in building up sustainable and inclusive cities that provide core infrastructure, a clean and sustainable environment and a decent quality of life to its citizens. Goa have achieved the target of 100% door to door waste collection.

The Index Score for SDG 11 'Sustainable Cities & Communities' is 88 and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner.

SDG 12: Responsible Consumption & Production

Goal 12 on Sustainable Consumption and Production emphasizes on "doing more with less" thereby ensuring that the needs of the present generation are fulfilled without compromising the needs of the future generation.

The efficient management of natural resources and the method of disposal of toxic waste and pollutants are important targets to achieve this Goal. Government's policies like the National Policy on Bio-fuels aim to achieve sustainable consumption and production.

The Index Score for SDG 12 'Responsible Consumption & Production' is 100 and bagged a position in the category of Achiever.

SDG 13: Climate Action

The Goal 13 on Climate Change aims to integrate climate change measures, disaster risk measures and sustainable

natural resource management into national development strategies.

The State as a stepping stone towards the Climate Action has introduced "Goa Electric Mobility Promotion Policy-2021".

The Index Score for SDG 13 'Climate Action' is 100 and bagged a position in the category of Achiever.

SDG 14: Life Below Water

SDG 14 aims to protect and ensure the sustainable use of seas, including reducing marine pollution, acidification, end overfishing and conserve marine and coastal ecosystems.

State Government supports research and development activities with an emphasis on mangrove bio diversity. There has been a net increase of 1.34 square km in the mangrove cover of the State as compared to the previous assessment.

The Index Score for SDG 14 'Life Below Water' is 100 and bagged a position in the category of Achiever.

SDG 15: Life on Land

Goal 15 aims to protect, restore and promote sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems, sustainable management of forests, combat desertification, and halt and reverse land degradation, while also integrating ecosystem and biodiversity into national and local planning, developmental processes, poverty reduction strategies and national accounts.

The State of Goa got its first and only Ramsar site in August, 2022 at Curchorem. With an area of 42 hectares, it is one of Goa's largest wetlands. State Government have taken initiatives to promote Nature Education & Ecotourism in protected areas.

The Index Score for SDG 15 'Life on Land' is 62 and bagged a position in the category of Performer.

SDG 16: Peace, Justice & Strong Institutions

Goal 16 primarily focuses on reducing all forms of violence, and promoting the rule of law at the national and international levels to ensure equal access to justice for all.

Government's Unique Identity Number (Aadhaar) along with the Right to Information Act, 2005, are key steps to strengthen institutions for effective and non-discriminatory public services and empower citizens with access to information.

Legal framework for protection against child abuse has been made more stringent.

The Index Score for SDG 16 'Peace, Justice & Strong Institutions' is 81 and bagged a position in the category of Front Runner.

Multi-Dimensional Poverty Index (MPI)

The Multi-Dimensional Poverty Index (MPI) is based on the three pillars of health, education and standard of living.

For the MPI, data from National Family Health Survey-4 and 5 was taken into account on the parameters of nutrition, child and adolescent mortality, maternal health, years of schooling, school attendance, cooking fuel, sanitation, drinking water, electricity, housing, assets, and bank accounts.

As per the NITI Aayog Report on National Multidimensional Poverty Index, 45,564 people i.e. 0.11% of Goa's population have exited multidimensional poverty. The headcount ratio has drastically declined from 3.76% to 0.84%, i.e. a drop of 2.92%. These figures signify that the proportion of its population living below the poverty line has declined over a period of time.

The Index is seen as а major towards contribution achieving Sustainable Development Goals which aims to reduce "at least by half the proportion of men, women and children of all ages living in poverty in all its dimensions according to national definitions". The report demonstrates that the Government is committed to ensure sustainable and development and eradicate poverty by 2030. The Government's focus on improving access to sanitation, nutrition, cooking fuel, financial inclusion, drinking and electricity has led significant advancements in these areas in Goa.

CHAPTER 7

SWAYAMPURNA GOA PROGRAMME

"Mission with Vision"

Introduction

"Swayampurna Goa Programme", an innovative idea of the Hon'ble Chief Minister and of the one most appreciated programme across the Nation has completed 3 years on 2nd October. 2023. to attain Self Sustainability in all aspects of Human development with a *vision*:

"Transforming Goa into Self-reliant, Self-Sustainable State with minimum Government and maximum Governance and to ensure last mile delivery"

Empowering villages, and reviving rural economy is the sole purpose of this programme. 237 Swayampurna Mitras and 25 Taluka Nodal Officers have been appointed to reach out to the unreached. Swayampurna Goa programme during its I phase revolved around following ten Focal points

- 1. Toilet for all
- 2. Electricity for all
- 3. Tap water connection to all
- 4. Housing for all
- 5. Eligible persons under Dayanand Social Security Scheme
- 6. Eligible persons under Deen Dayal Swasthya Seva Yojana
- 7. Eligible persons under Griha Aadhar
- 8. PM Kisan, Krishi Card, Kisan Credit card to all farmers (Agriculture /Horticulture/ Dairy/ Fisheries/ Poultry)
- 9. Aids to divyangs & senior citizens
- Financial Inclusion (Bank account & Insurance – PM Jeevan Jyoti & PM Suraksha Bima Yojana.

During this stage, more than 24,000 Goan Citizens benefited under beneficiary oriented schemes of the Government also the State achieved status of Har Ghar Certified State. As a results of this, Government launched "Swayampurna Goa 2.0, Mission with vision to give more emphasis on "Skilling- Reskilling-Up skilling" and Women empowerment with emphasis on the following 16 points addition to 10 Focal **Points** emphasized in Phase 1.0.

- 1. Skill Development for gainful employment
- 2. Encouraging Startups
- 3. Regular training of Self Help Group (SHG)
- 4. Strengthening cold storage chain
- 5. Bridging gap between Academic and industry
- 6. Creating Awareness of Health Issues
- 7. Boosting confidence and handholding of local artisans
- Incorporation of latest technologies such as Artificial Intelligence (AI), Coding and Robotics in Educational curriculum
- 9. Enhance employment opportunities
- Effective Waste Management
- Strengthening the database of Skilled Labour on e-Shram Portal
- 12. Promotion of Minimum Support Price for Horticulture produce
- 13. Promotion of Entrepreneurship
- 14. Career Counseling
- Completion of Unique Disability ID Card backlog
- Expanding compass of Millet Mission

Swayampurna Goa programme in its spherical structure covers every segment of the society with emphasis on Women empowerment, Youth Empowerment, Krishi and Garib kalyan. In addition, to this special attention is also given for Divyangs and Senior citizens of the State.

During the adventurous journey of Swayampurna Goa 2.0 programme several milestones have been achieved.

Swayampurna Goa programme aims at "Last mile Delivery" i.e to reach out to every individual in the State. For this purpose theme based webinars are conducted month, wherein every concerned Hon'ble Minister. Heads of Department have interaction with Swayampurna Mitras, Taluka Nodal Officers, elected representatives and general public to promote and propagate Government's new initiatives. In this year till January 2024, 10 such live interactions / webinars have been conducted as shown in Table 7.1.

The Government has undertaken the following activities under the flagship of Swayampurna Goa Programme during the current year.

Swayampurna Goa e Bazaar

With an aim to inculcate entrepreneurship qualities among the rural youth, rural women and to create employment self opportunities. Swayampurna Chaturthi bazaar was organized on the occasion of Ganesh Chaturthi during the month September 2022. 22 different at locations in physical mode for 10 days to creating opportunities for local Mahila Self Help Groups, youth and Individuals to market their homemade sweets and other decorative items. This initiative received notable response across the State. As a result the Government went a step ahead and organized Chavath Bazaar through online platform as "Chavath e Bazaar" from 16th - 18th September 2023. It was the 1st time in the country, that such e Bazaar was organized on the occasion of Ganesh Chaturthi, wherein locally produced items by locals from remote villages were made available at the door steps across the State through e-commerce of the consumers network.

Buoyed by the success of "Chavath e Bazaar" the Government decided to platform create Bazaar i.e. 21st www.swayampurnagoa.com. On October. 2023 the Hon'ble Chief inaugurated this special Minister e Commerce platform on the lines of e commerce giants such as Amazon, Flipkart etc. for the Benefit of Local Artisans, Mahilas and Self Help Groups to sell their home made and hand made products not only in the State but also across the PAN India.

The Directorate of Planning, Statistics and Evaluation has conducted 06

training programmes for various Self Help Groups. More than 500 women have been trained about branding & packaging of homemade and hand made products to make them competent and on-board them on Swayampurna Goa e-Bazaar portal.

Swayampurna Goa reporting Portal

The Government has developed Swayampurna Goa reporting portal to monitor and evaluate the progress of Swayampurna Goa Programme.

This portal helps the Swayampurna Mitras to update their achievements in real time bases so that current status of the programme can be reported to the Office of the Hon'ble Chief Minister.

In order to creat awareness about the portal for swayampurna Mitras training programmes were conducted on 15th December 2023 and 4th January 2024.

Scheme Saturation

There are 13 Flagship Programmes/ Schemes which have been directly monitored by the Office of the Hon'ble Prime Minister. The State has achieved 100% saturation in 07 schemes namely PM Awas Yojana- Urban, Jal Jeevan Mission, Ayushman Bharat Scheme, PM Sadak Gramin Yojana, Swamitva. Bharat Net, Kisan Credit Card (Fisheries). However, the 4 flagship programmes viz Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojanan- Gramin, Pradhan Mantri Kisan Saman Nidhi, Kisan Credit card (Animal) & Kisan Credit card (Agriculture) have attained saturation ranging from 85% to 90%. The remaining 03 flagship programmes / schemes that are PM-SV Anidhi, Atal Pension Yojana & PM Jeevan Jyoti Bima Yojana have attained saturation ranging from 54% to 74%.

Visits of Other State Governments / Agencies

Swayampurna Goa programme, has over a period of time has transform up to a movement. This unique programme has been appreciated by the Hon'ble Prime Minister many a times. As a result delegations of senior Officers from the States of Rajasthan, Gujarat, Uttarakhand, Maharashtra, Assam and Manipur have visited the State during the year 2023-24 to understand the Swayampurna Goa Programme.

During this year, a team of NITI Aayog visited the State especially understand the Swayampurna Goa Programme on 11-12th May 2023. Also, a delegation of the Government of Uttarakhand visited the State understand in detail the implementation of Swayampurna Goa Programme on 1st & 2nd June 2023.

Vision For all Programme

The Hon'ble Chief Minister launched "Vision for All" programme for the benefit of Students of class I to X of all Government and Government aided Schools. Under the program free eye checkup camps were conducted to detect students with refractive error and provide corrective glasses free of cost. Students detected with any other eye disorders were provided proper medical treatment with free of cost.

Under "Vision for All", eye checkup of 2.37 lakh students of Standard I to X of all Government and Government aided Schools in Goa was organised.

The complete process of eye checkup is completed in all the Talukas and 3439 students are found with refractive defects. These students will be provided spectacles or referred for further treatment if required, free of cost.

Farmers Training in Bicholim Taluka

The Directorate of Planning Statistics and Evaluation in collaboration with Bicholim Progressive Farmers Producer Company Limited organized training programme on 27th October, 2023 for Swayampurna Mitras and Taluka Nodal Officers of Bicholim Taluka in order to

identify farmers who have not been cultivating the land and have not been trained in appropriate cropping pattern. Also, farmers who are dealing in dairy sector were encouraged to make use of green fodder cultivation to ensure improvement in dairy sector.

Viksit Bharat SankalpYatra (VBSY)

The Information Education and Communication (IEC) vans visited every Village Panchayat across the State from 15th November, 2023 in order to create awareness about various Central Government welfare schemes.









Special Drives conducted by various Departments under Swayampurna Goa Programme across the State

- Directorate of Social Welfare Drives on Unique Disability Identity Card for Persons with Disabilities; were organized benefiting 532 persons.
- Department of Animal Husbandry Veterinary Services - Drives to promote schemes implemented by Department was organised 692 people benefited.

- Water Resource Department Drives on Nital Goem Nital Baim, Irrigation well subsidy, Rain water harvesting; organised which were attended by persons 2224.
- District Rural Development Agency (South Goa) - Awareness Camps on MGNREGA and NRLM Scheme; 3415 public attended the awareness camps.
- Directorate of Fisheries Organised Drive to promote all schemes implemented by the Department; 45 persons benefited.
- Department of Transport 2937 persons issued learners license.
- Directorate of Planning, Statistics and Evaluation – Aadhaar Enrolment/ Updation camps organized wherein 8269 persons benefited.
- Directorate of Agriculture Drive on Department schemes organised wherein 3393 persons benefited.

- Cleanliness Drive conducted by Goa Waste Management Corporation across the State.
- Awareness drives conducted by Directorate of Fire and Emergency Services across the State.
- Training programme on Honey Bee keeping organized by ICAR Goa.
- Ayushman Bharat Health Account (ABHA) Card registration drives organised by Directorate of Health Department.

Altogether, 1164 field camps have been conducted by various Governments Departments, which were attended by 29219 persons and 21507 people benefitted during the current year till December 2023.

CHAPTER 8

Unique Identification (UID) / Aadhaar

Introduction

The Aadhaar system provides a single source identity verification for the residents across the country. Once enrolled for Aadhaar, residents can use their Aadhaar number to authenticate and establish their identity multiple times using electronic means or through offline verification, as the case may be.

Aadhaar/Unique Identification (UID) is the first nationally acceptable unique identity number which enables residents to validate their identity and address. Ghost entries and duplicate entries can be checked by linking other documents with Aadhaar. The Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI), under the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY), Government of India is mandated to issue UID number called Aadhaar to all eligible residents of India as well as NRIs on their arrival in the Country. UIDAI has also introduced voluntary linking of Aadhaar with the EPIC card, thus preventing duplication of voters across different constituencies.

Aadhaar is not mandatory and cannot be forced upon the residents by the concerned authority. Hence, there is a constant need to create a product whose benefits are strong enough to create a demand for enrolment.

The UID approach is designed on an online system i.e. data is stored centrally and authentication is done on-line which eliminates the hassles associated with producing different ID cards for different schemes.

Vision

- To empower the residents of India with a unique identity and a digital platform to authenticate anytime anywhere.
- To ensure security and confidentiality of identity information and authentication records of individuals.
- To ensure compliance of Aadhaar Act 2016 by all individuals and agencies in letter and spirit.

The Central Aadhaar Act 2016

The Aadhaar Targeted Delivery of Financial and Other Subsidies, Benefits and Services Act 2016 (generally referred as the Aadhaar Act 2016) was notified in the Gazette of India dated 26th March 2016 and came into force w.e.f. 12th July, 2016.

MeitY has framed several Rules and Regulations consistent with the Aadhaar Act, for carrying out the provisions of the Aadhaar Act.

Section 7 of the Aadhaar Act 2016 stipulates that as a condition for receipt of a subsidy, benefit or service for which the expenditure is incurred from the Consolidated Fund of India, the Central or the State Government as the case may be, may require an individual to undergo Aadhaar authentication or furnish proof of possessing an Aadhaar number or in case an individual does not possess an Aadhaar number, such individual makes an application for Aadhaar enrollment, and till such time an Aadhaar number assigned to him, the individual shall be offered alternate

and viable means of identification for receipt of a subsidy, benefit or service.

Further, on 24th July, 2019, the Aadhaar and Other Laws (Amendment) Act 2019 has been notified which includes an amendment to Section 7 as under:

"In Section 7 of the Principle Act, after the words "the Consolidated Fund of India", the words "or the Consolidated Fund of State" are inserted.

Hence, as per the provisions in the Aadhaar and Other Laws (Amendment) Act 2019, the States can mandate use of Aadhaar authentication for the beneficiaries under Section 7 of the Aadhaar Act 2016 for those schemes which are funded out Consolidated Fund of the State. In order to do so, the State Governments are required to notify all such beneficiary schemes under Section 7 of the Aadhaar Act 2016 to ensure that all these schemes are made Aadhaar compliant to bring in total transparency in the implementation of Government programmes.

Regulation 12 of the Aadhaar (Enrollment and Update) Regulations 2016, stipulates that the scheme implementing department is required to offer Aadhaar enrollment facilities to the beneficiaries who have not yet enrolled for Aadhaar in coordination with the existing Registrars in the State or by becoming a UIDAI Registrar itself.

Till time such that the individual/beneficiary gets an Aadhaar, alternate and viable means of identification be offered shall for extending the subsidy/ service/benefit to the beneficiary. If the beneficiary has enrolled for Aadhaar, Enrollment Identification (EID) slip and any of the identity documents such as Bank or Post Office Passbook with photo.

Passport, Ration Card, Voter Identity Card, MGNREGA Card, Kisan Photo Passbook, Driving License issued by the Licensing Authority under the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988 (59 of 1988), Certificate of Identity having photo of such person issued by a Gazetted Officer or a Tehsildar on an official letter head or any other document as specified by the department can be used.

Section 9 of the Aadhaar Act states that possession of Aadhaar or the authentication thereof by itself does not confer any right of or proof of citizenship or domicile of the Aadhaar holder.

The Goa Aadhaar Act 2017

The State has also enacted the Goa Aadhaar (Targeted Delivery of Financial and Other Subsidies, Benefits and Services) Act 2017 (generally referred as the Goa Aadhaar Act 2017) parallel to the Central Act 2016. The same was notified in the Gazette of Goa dated 22nd August, 2017 and came into force w.e.f. 19th October, 2017.

Initiatives by UIDAI to upgrade and strengthen the Aadhaar eco-system

An Individual can verify Aadhaar Authentication History of up-to 50 authentications in past 6 months with date and time of authentication, to enable him in case of an unintended entry.

All Aadhaar enrollment Centres are shifted from private and unsecured locations to secure Government premises where direct supervision by the Government can be ensured.

The Government of India has already issued more than 136 crore Aadhaar numbers as on July 2023 covering more than 94% of overall population and

nearly 100% of adult population. The requirement for new enrollment is mainly for the children in the age group of 0-18 years due to new births.

In view of the above and considering the importance of Aadhaar as Proof of Identity (Pol), there has been a growing concern on possible ramifications on national security due to fraudulent enrolment activities. Therefore, in order to minimize the chances of providing Aadhaar to any illegal resident, UIDAI has restricted new enrollments of Aadhaar of residents in the age group of over 18 years to (i) all UIDAI Aadhaar Seva Kendras-ASKs (ii) designated Aadhaar centres run by India Posts/Indian Railways or any Central Government Ministries (iii) designated Aadhaar centres run by State Government Registrars at District/Sub-District/Tehsil Head Quarters decided by the respective UIDAI Regional Office in consultation with the State Government Registrar.

In Goa, 14 Aadhaar Centres operated by the State Registrar have been designated by UIDAI for carrying out new Aadhaar Enrollments in the age group of above 18 years are as follows:

Further, in order to facilitate the States to carry out online verification of the residential status, demographic information and supporting documents submitted by an adult (above 18 years) seeking new enrollment, the UIDAI has developed the "State Government Portal" with access given to designated Nodal Officers at Taluka, District and State level.

In Goa, the state Portal has gone live with effect from 28th February, 2023. The Mamlatdars at the taluka level, the Dy. Collectors at the respective North Goa and South Goa districts and the Statistical Officer (Administration DPSE Head Quarters) at the State level have been designated as Nodal Officers for verification of documents submitted for new Aadhaar enrollments of residents above 18 years of age. As on 21st December 2023, 1440 packets have been processed.

Facility for Child Enrollment and update of Mobile Number in Aadhaar

In order to cater to the expected demand of child enrollment in the age group 0-5 years and updation of mobile number in Aadhaar, UIDAI has onboarded India Post Payment Bank (IPPB) of Department of Posts through its network of postmen and Gramin Dak Sevaks to provide doorstep services of child enrollment and linking of mobile phone to Aadhaar by using smartphones and biometric devices.

Aadhaar Enrollment for Persons with special needs and disabilities

In line with the Government's commitment to ensure inclusion of persons with special needs and disabilities for digital enabled access to

benefits and services, UIDAI has made special provision in Regulation 6 of the Aadhaar Enrolment and Update Regulations 2016 and has issued biometric exception enrolment guidelines for persons who are unable and cannot provide fingerprints or whose irises cannot be captured due to any reason. Such persons can enroll for Aadhaar by submitting documents of proof of address/identity/date and year of birth along with available biometrics while highlighting the missing ones in the enrolment software.

Aadhaar Document Update service (every 10 years)

Since Aadhaar has emerged as an universally accepted proof of identity for residents in India, in the interest of the general public and to enable accurate authentication, the UIDAI vide 09/11/2022, Notification dated has amended the Aadhaar Enrolment and (Tenth Update Regulations 2016 Amendment) of the Aadhaar Act 2016 whereby residents should update their Aadhaar on completion of every 10 years from the date of enrollment for Aadhaar, at least once, by submitting proof of identity (PoI) and proof of address (PoA) documents to ensure continued accuracy of their information in the Central Identities Data Repository (CIDR).

The Aadhaar Document Update service is available at any Aadhaar Centre at a nominal charge of Rs.50/- approved by the UIDAI. Under ease of living, the UIDAI has provided the facility of updating documents online through myAadhaar portal (https://myaadhaar.uidai.gov.in) at service charge of Rs.25/-. However, in order to encourage more residents to update their documents in Aadhaar, the service was provided free of cost from 15.03.2023 to 14.06.2023. Based on the

positive response from the residents, the free service facility has been extended up to 14.03.2024. Although, Aadhaar Document Update is not mandatory, it is a preferred procedure in order to keep the Aadhaar updated.

In Goa, the Aadhaar Document Update facility is available at 98 Aadhaar Centres, out of which 24 Centres are operated by the State Registrar. Besides, press releases have also been circulated widely read Marathi and English local newspapers to create public awareness and encourage people to get their Aadhaar updated.

Aadhaar at Doorstep Facility:

Home enrollment facility is provided to constrained senior citizens, infirm and bedridden residents, divyangjan (physically and mentally challenged residents) the basis on applications/requests made to the State Registrar or directly to the UIDAI. 151 residents have availed this facility during the year 2023 (upto December 2023).

Pensioners can submit digital Annual Life Certificate online from the comfort of physically their home (without presenting oneself) through Jeevan Pramaan Portal. UIDAI has provided details of all biometric devices which are permissible for capturing biometrics of a person its official website www.uidai.gov.in for Aadhaar authentication.

Aadhaar Grievances

Grievances related Aadhaar to enrollment and updates received by the State Registrar or referred by Aadhaar Centres operating in the State are promptly addressed by the State Registrar in coordination with UIDAI, Regional Office, Mumbai (ROM). Cases UIDAI interventions requiring referred to the UIDAI, Regional Office,

Mumbai. During the year, Directorate of Planning, Statistics and Evaluation has settled approximately 27 public grievances in consultation with UIDAI Regional Office Mumbai during the .

Status of Aadhaar saturation and Aadhaar Enrolment Centres in Goa

Goa has achieved saturation point with an overall Aadhaar generation of over 103% through a network Permanent Aadhaar Enrolment Stations (PESs) throughout the State, as on November 2023. Out of these, 24 PESs are operated by the State Registrar through Government Departments implementing beneficiary oriented schemes (12 nos.) and through M/s Goa Electronics Limited (6 nos.), the agency on-boarded by the State Registrar to extend Aadhaar services. The remaining PESs are established by India Posts (02 nos.), India Post Payment Bank (35 nos.), CSC (14 nos.) UTITSL (01 no.) and various Banks (22 nos.) The updated details of these Stations are UIDAI available on the website appointments.uidai.gov.in\easearchinter nal.aspx.

New Initiatives to extend Aadhaar Services in Goa

In view of various new beneficiary oriented schemes being implemented by the Government and Aadhaar being a mandatory document for availing benefits under these schemes, the demand for Aadhaar updates (demographic as well as biometric) has increased manifold. Hence, in order to ensure that no resident in Goa is denied the benefit of any eligible scheme due to want of Aadhaar, the Directorate of Planning, Statistics and Evaluation has implemented the following initiatives.

 M/s Info Tech Corporation of Goa Ltd.(ITG) has been newly onboarded as an Enrollment Agency with EA code 4071. Necessary

- hands-on training has been provided to the operators. The agency is in the process of setting up Aadhaar Centres at different locations in Goa.
- Directorate of Planning, Statistics and Evaluation is in the process of Common on-boarding Service (CSC) Center e-Governance Services India Ltd., a Special Vehicle (SPV) of the Purpose Ministry of Electronics & Information Technology (MeitY) for setting up of Aadhaar enrollment and update Centres Village in Goa at Panchayats, Municipalities, Corporation of the City of Panaji and Goa Medical College (GMC). The services of the CSC will be also requisitioned for conduct of Aadhaar camps as and when required.
- 3. The State Registrar organizes Aadhaar enrollment/update drives in camp mode in various Villages with special emphasis on coverage of Women's Shelter Homes. Charity Old Age Homes, Street Homes, Providence Orphanages and Children's Homes, NGOs, Tribal Communities. **Patients** from Psychiatric Hospital, AIDs patients, Sex workers and Transgenders etc. 84 such camps have been conducted during the year.
- 4. During the year, Village Panchayatwise special Aadhaar enrollment drives have been undertaken from January 2023 so as to cover the entire State in camp mode spanning 1 to 7 days duration. 79 Villages have been covered upto December 2023 and the Talukas of Sanguem in South Goa district and Bicholim in North Goa District have been fully covered.

Aadhaar drives are in progress in the Village Panchayats of Quepem and Salcete Talukas. Such drives

are also planned in Canacona, Ponda and other Talukas will be taken up shortly.

Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT)

DBT, a major reform initiative of the Government of India which envisions transfer of benefits (cash) accruing from various beneficiary oriented Government directly into preferably schemes Aadhaar seeded bank accounts of the beneficiaries. It is also expanded to include in-kind benefits to individuals/group beneficiaries and transfers of collective benefits such as honorarium, incentives etc. made to various enablers of Government schemes based on Aadhaar for better service delivery.

The implementation of Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) is monitored by the DBT Mission, Cabinet Secretariat, Government of India.

The Central Plan Scheme Monitoring System (CPSMS), the earlier system of Public Financial Management System (PFMS), of the Office of Controller General of Accounts, was selected to act as the common platform for routing of the Direct Benefit Transfer. Services of CPSMS were engaged for preparation of beneficiary list, the digitally signing the same and processing of payments in the bank accounts of the beneficiary using the Aadhaar Payment Bridge of National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI), enabling digital payments and

settlements systems in India. initiative of Reserve Bank of India (RBI) and Indian Bank's Association (IBA). Since the first payment made in Puducherry for the Janani Suraksha Yojana in January 2013, DBT emerged as a high priority and focus area of the Government in reforming Government delivery system by re-engineering the existing process in welfare schemes for simpler faster and flow of information/funds ensuring accurate beneficiaries, of the duplication and reduction of fraud. In the past several years, DBT has emerged as the accepted way of delivering of over 450 development schemes to more than 900 million people across the country.

Components of DBT

Primary components in the implementation of DBT schemes include Beneficiary Account Validation System, a robust payment and reconciliation platform integrated with RBI, NCPI, Public and Private Sector Banks, Regional Rural Banks and Cooperative Banks (core banking solutions of banks, settlement systems of RBI, Aadhaar Payment Bridge of NPCI) etc.

workflow These systems constitute systems Social based for Sector, Central Sector, Centrally Sponsored and State schemes and include functionalities such as application for schemes by the beneficiary with details of bank account/Aadhaar, examination by scheme owners for eligibility of the beneficiary under scheme guidelines, initiate verification of account/Aadhaar, initiate payment through Fund Transfer Order and other MIS related functions. MNREGA, PM-AWAS, PM-KISAN, DBT-PAHAL are some examples of such systems. While in many of the schemes, the payments are linked to Aadhaar, cases are processed with bank account number, in case Aadhaar is not available.

Payment and Reconciliation

On the selection of beneficiaries, IT systems initiate the payment through payment instructions to PFMS which in turn is routed to banks after necessary validation of beneficiaries. PFMS has evolved as a robust payment and reconciliation platform integrated with more than 500 banks for verification of bank accounts of beneficiaries and for verification of Aadhaar seeding of bank accounts of beneficiary with NPCI. The pre-validation of benefit Aadhaar linked bank, drastically brings down the failure of payments as the delays in amount being available in the hands of benefit core Banking Solutions Banks, being the last mile delivery channels play a very vital role in the DBT process flow. As all account based payments are routed through the core bank channels, processing efficiency at this stage coupled with flow of a reverse MIS impart desired momentum to the DBT programme.

Key Stakeholders in DBT:

The key stakeholders in the implementation of DBT are Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI), Public Financial Management System (PFMS), National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI), State Level Bankers' Committees (SLBCs), National Informatics Centre (NIC) etc.

Scope of DBT

All welfare/subsidy schemes or components of schemes operated by the Central and State Governments involving cash/in kind benefit transfers to individuals come under the purview of the DBT framework.

For example Public Distribution System (PDS), Food Corporation of India (FCI) is the Government agency responsible for procurement, movement, storage and distribution of food grains to Fair Price Shops. FCI issues the food grains at subsidized rates as fixed by the Government. The rates so fixed do not cover the full economic cost incurred by the Corporation. The difference represents the consumer subsidy for the PDS, and is paid to the Corporation by the Government of India.

The transfer of cash benefits from Ministry/Department to beneficiaries happens through different routes, as given below.

- Directly to beneficiaries
- Through State Treasury Account to beneficiaries
- Through any implementing Agency as appointed
- Centre/State Government to beneficiaries

Pre-requisites for DBT

- Identification of Beneficiaries and Digitization of Beneficiary Database
- Opening of Bank Accounts
- Aadhaar Enrolment
- Seeding of Aadhaar in Beneficiary Database and Bank Accounts
- Last mile Connectivity/ Service Delivery

The success of the DBT initiative depends on the above factors to achieve smooth rollout of the programme.

Business Correspondents (BC) Infrastructure

Reserve Bank of India has introduced Business Correspondents/ Banking Correspondents (BC) as an alternative infrastructure to offer services such as cash transactions in villages lacking

bank branches. Business Correspondents/ Bank Mitras shall play a vital role in operationalizing the programme and ensuring the last mile connectivity, as this will ensure that payments are disbursed to the beneficiaries on time at their doorstep and of full value.

Payment Banks

A payment bank is like any other bank but operates on a smaller scale and can carry out most banking operations like transfers and remittances through a mobile phone but cannot advance loans or issue credit cards. The main objective of payment bank is to widen the horizon of payment and financial services to small businesses. low income households, migrant labour workforce in secured technology driven environment across the country. As on 15th February, 2023, the Reserve Bank of India has accorded in-principle approval to 32 entities to launch Payments Banks. With **Payments** Banks, RBI seeks to increase the penetration level of financial services in the remote areas of the country.

Mobile Money

Mobile money is a quick way of payment and is helpful in providing solution to last mile issue for better accessibility of DBT. There is a need to develop a comprehensive eco-system for carrying out cashless transactions over mobile platform using Aadhaar as an identifier. This will revolutionize the drive for financial inclusion.

Aadhaar based Direct Benefit Transfer/Aadhaar Payment Bridge System (APBS)

Aadhaar Payment Bridge System (APBS) is an unique payment system of Direct Benefit Transfer. The National

Payment Corporation of India (NPCI) uses Aadhaar Number as a central key electronically channelizing Government benefits and subsidies in the Aadhaar Enabled Bank Accounts (AEBA) of the intended beneficiaries. NPCI creates an Aadhaar mapper in order to facilitate the transfer of funds. Aadhaar mapper is the backbone of Aadhaar Payments Bridge (APB) where information pertaining to the banks seeded with the Aadhaar number is maintained in the mapper based on which, NPCI routes payments to the destination Bank and credit is accorded to the DBT beneficiaries.

Based on APBS and the property of 'uniqueness' of Aadhaar, Direct Benefit Transfer is the largest and most impactful of all the applications launched till date. Crores of transactions have been carried out covering various major schemes such as PAHAL, MGNREGA and Pensions etc. This is a significant governance reform to ensure greater transparency and accountability in public service delivery through effective use of technology. Aadhaar as an identity proof ensures correct identification of intended beneficiaries and eliminates fake/ghost beneficiaries through de-duplication of beneficiary database. The process of de-duplication seeks deletion of nonexistent beneficiaries from the database and leads to tangible savings to the Government and other stakeholders.

DBT Project in Goa

The Directorate of Planning, Statistics and Evaluation (DPSE) is the Nodal Department for monitoring the implementation of the DBT Project in Goa. DPSE acts as a link between the DBT Mission, New Delhi and the DBT Government Departments to convey various initiatives taken up by the DBT Mission to the DBT Departments for compliance. Even before the

Government of India had conceived the DBT initiative, the State of Goa had initiated DBT in 2002 for payment of salaries of Government employees through the ECS mode. Goa is the foremost State in implementing DBT since the year 2012 and all cash beneficiary under benefits oriented implemented bγ schemes Government are disbursed directly into the bank accounts of the beneficiaries. through the electronic mode such as ECS, NEFT, NACH etc.

As on December 2023, the State has identified 16 departments implementing 165 DBT schemes (61 Centrally sponsored schemes and 104 State schemes).

State DBT Portal

The State National Informatics Centre (NIC) is the Technical partner for implementation of DBT. The Goa DBT Portal (https://dbtgoa.gov.in) has been designed, developed and maintained by the NIC State Unit. It has been live since 9th February, 2018. It is integrated with DBT Bharat Portal and the expenditure incurred from the Consolidated Fund of the State is reported by the DBT scheme implementing departments on monthly basis through web services.

All the DBT schemes pertaining to Goa are on-board the Goa DBT Portal and Bharat Portal. All the 104 State schemes are notified under Section 7 of Aadhaar Act 2016 (Aadhaar and Other Laws (Amendment) Act 2019).

Aadhaar Payment Bridge System and Savings accrued on account of DBT

The flagship scheme of the State Government viz. Griha Aadaar implemented by the Directorate of Women and Child Development under which financial assistance of ₹1500/- per

month is disbursed to housewives/beneficiaries is the only DBT scheme in the State on the Aadhaar Bridge Bayment System (ABPS).

During the year 2023-24, upto November 2023, out of 1,34,200 beneficiaries, 52,357 beneficiaries were paid through ABPS. An amount of ₹47.35 lakh was saved through recoveries account of various on reasons such as ineligibility, beneficiary double benefit. expired. missina beneficiaries, migrated beneficiaries, duplication of beneficiaries etc.

Under the 2nd flagship scheme of the State Government viz. Dayanand Social Security Scheme implemented by Directorate of Social Welfare, the State provides ₹2000/- per month to the senior citizens/persons with disabilities/single women/HIV+ve patient and orphans and ₹2500/- is provided to children with disabilities (90% and above).

During the financial year 2022-23 upto November 2023, cash benefits were disbursed to 1,39178 beneficiaries through the ECS/NEFT/ACH mode. Savings to the tune of ₹72.61 lakh were accrued due to ineligibility, beneficiary expired. double benefit, missing beneficiaries, migration of beneficiaries, duplications etc. It is the endeavor of the Government to bring all DBT schemes under the purview of the Aadhaar Bridge Payment System at the earliest.

CHAPTER 9

AGRICULTURE & ALLIED ACTIVITIES

AGRICULTURE

Government is providing assistance to agriculture at all levels to provide substantial returns to the farmers. Being a progressive State, the farmers face tremendous shortage of manual labour. The dependence on machines for agricultural activities is the emerging trend. The land holding of farmers of Goa is small and nearly 80% of farmers own less than 1 ha. of land.

Government promotes large scale cultivation of various crops for which pesticides. assistance for seed, manures besides land preparation is provided. Goa is perhaps the only State where the farmers are assured of the price for their produce. The State provides assurance of support price in case of Paddy, Coconut, Arecanut, Oil Palm, Sugarcane, etc. which safeguard the farmers against any losses due to collapse in market price to keep farming at its prime level. Marketing of the agriculture produce is also done in the Yards. Co-operative Govt. Market Societies, Private Dealers, local market etc. The cultivation of horticultural crops is gaining importance due to better returns, lower risk and tolerance of these crops for part time farming.

International Year of Millets (IYoM)

United Nations had declared the year 2023 as the "International Year of Millets (IYoM)". As part of the same, 'Millet Utsav' was organized by the Agriculture department, wherein various activities were conducted to create awareness on cultivation practices and Value Addition in Millets, to promote, motivate and

encourage farmers for Millets cultivation. This has resulted in the increase of area under Millets from 20 ha to 50 ha.



Achievements

Assured price for Agriculture Produce

The scheme envisages the minimum price assured by Government for sale of produce by a farmer to encourage them venture into investments agriculture with full confidence so that farming community could maintain traditional plantation that support rural economy of Goa. Moreover, younger generation would step forward to take up agriculture as an economically viable activity. Produce covered under the scheme are Paddy. Alsando, Arecanut. Sugarcane, Oilpalm. Cashewnut and Coconut.

Kisan Credit Card

Kisan Credit Cards (KCC) are issued to the farmers on the basis of their holdings for uniform adoption by the banks, so that farmers may use them to readily purchase agriculture inputs such as seeds, fertilizers, pesticides etc. and draw cash for their production needs. KRISHI CARD

Krishi Card uniquely identifies each farmer and creates a central repository of all his farming assets and land holdings. Additionally, a unified scheme management framework ensures that the data about the farmer is seamlessly shared across schemes/subsidies and gives an efficient central monitoring mechanism to the department as well. Upto 31st December, 2023, 49533 Krishi Cards have been issued in the State.

Goa College of Agriculture

The Don Bosco College of Agriculture, Sulcorna. Goa, affiliated to Goa University and established in the year 2015-16 has been academically merged with the Goa College of Agriculture in 2022. College offers a December, professional 04 years B. Sc. (Hons.) Agriculture degree for the students from Goa and different States of India. The College adopts Vth Deans' syllabus provided bγ Indian Council Agricultural Research, Government of India.

The campus has sprawled to over 50 acres area comprising College building, Laboratories, boys and girls hostels, Poly houses and experimental fields as well as Sports facilities.

College has projects on production of mushroom, spawn, bio-control agents, composting, vermi-composting, apiary, seed production, organic farming, scientific research etc. The college has collaborative projects with private and government organizations.





Soil Health Improvement in the State of Goa

Government of Goa, through Directorate of Agriculture continuously work towards maintaining the health of Goan Soils for more than three decades. Moreover, recently Government has announced plans to cover whole of Goa under Organic farming. The status of soils is continuously analyzed through two static soil testing laboratories under the department one at Ela Farm, Old-Goa in North-Goa and another at Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Margao in South Goa.

Total 12 parameters (ph, Electrical Conductivity, Organic Carbon, Nitrogen, Phosphorus, Potassium, Sulphur, Iron, Manganese, Copper, Zinc and Boron) are analyzed in each laboratory. Soil Health Cards are issued to the farmers and on the basis of Soil Testing Report, farmers are advised to use appropriate nutrients.

Other Activities

- A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), has been signed with Infotech Corporation, Goa, under the M-Krishi Project with Design, Development, Implementation, Training Maintenance and "Schemes and Agriculture Related Information under RKVY" on behalf of Agriculture. of Directorate the The prototype of mobile application M-Krishi is rolled out for testing.
- A State Level Exhibition was held to create an impact on farming community about the achievement and dissemination of new technology in agriculture and for creating awareness about Government Schemes.
- Special Drives were conducted to create awareness about the "Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana" among the farmers to increase the coverage under the scheme.
- One day Training Programme under the "Western Ghat Development Programme" was conducted to create awarness among the farmers regarding Soil and Water Conservation.

GOA STATE HORTICULTURE CORPORATION LIMITED (GSHCL)

The GSHCL, a Government of Goa undertaking was incorporated in 1993, with a main objective to carry on business in Goa for promoting, cultivating and marketing all types of horticulture and plantation crops.

GSHCL purchases vegetables and fruits from Belgavi and Maharashtra, and also procures locally produced vegetables and fruits at its 16 Procurement Centres at different locations in each taluka and sells it to the consumers through their registered vendor outlets.

These vendor outlets have been provided a Unique Registration Number to track the details of the outlet and also for digital payments.

To meet the above objectives, GSHCL implements the following schemes/initiatives:

Government Intervention for Control of Price rise Scheme

GSHCL is implementing this scheme since June 2008. The GSHCL, purchases and sells notified vegetables items and fruits at subsidized rates to

the consumers through its 1214 registered Vendor outlets and grocery items at each Village Panchayat through 12 Mobile Vans, across the State.

ANIMAL HUSBANDARY

The Department of Animal Husbandry & Veterinary Services has been primarily entrusted with the responsibility of providing "Veterinary Animal Health Care Welfare" to all the livestock, to improve the production potentialities of livestock and poultry reared in the State:

It also plays a major role in milk production by incentivizing the milk producers through the organized sector, alongwith the health, safety and welfare of all the animals. It provides assistance in animal rescue, animal accidents, care for animals in distress, guidance for veterinary schemes & services and for taking actions to prevent animal cruelty.

However, the ultimate mission is to improve the socio - economic condition by improving milk, meat and poultry production in the State.

MukhyamantriSudharit Kamdhenu Scheme

Other information

- The State has been successful in controlling the Outbreak of Lumpy Skin Disease (LSD) by undertaking immediate preventive vaccination and by purchase of necessary medicines for treatment and control of LSD. Total 21,895 LSD vaccinations were carried out in the State.
- The State has successfully implemented Brucellosis Vaccination for 1195 Calves under 1st round in the year 2022-23, 1200 vaccinations under 2nd round have been carried out and during 3rd round - 398 Vaccination have been done this year till date.
- Goa has been declared as the first Rabies controlled area in the Country.
- The Department has conducted 1,35,737 Vaccinations to animals and 1,17,103 different animals were treated throughout the State. Also 7,682 Artificial Insemination (A.I.) were carried out in Cattles and She Buffaloes and 3,363 Calves were born through A.I.
- The Annual Estimated Milk production in the State is 64175.525 tonnes, Egg production is 423.70 Lakh and Meat production is 7293.644 tonnes as per Integrated Sample Survey.
- Total 4946 applications for Kisan Credit Cards (KCC) have been submitted by the Department to the Banks out of which, 2429 number of KCC issued to farmers through various Nationalized Banks and an amount of ₹2551.64 lakh has been sanctioned. Every effort is being done to achieve maximum coverage.

- Mukhyamantri Pashuseva Yojana with 24x7 animal ambulatory services has been approved and tendering process is on for selection of Implementing Agency.
- Government has reviewed and revised the policy "Policy for Street and Pet Dog Care giving in the form of Guidelines" considering several dog bite cases occurring in the State.
- Vetereinary Hospital at Sonsodo, Raia, has been completed at a cost of ₹3.81 Crores.
- "Dudh Utpadak Melava" was organized by the Directorate of Animal Husbandry & Veterinary Services at Kadamba Transpot Corporation Hall, Valpoi, to listen and resolve the grievances of the farmers of Sattari Taluka on 12/12/2023.

Success Stories

Shri. Anant Prabhakar Malik has been conferred the "Gopal Ratna" Award constituting Certificate of Appreciation, Memento and ₹1.00 lakh for the highest Milk production in the State and pouring the milk in the Dairy Society for two consecutive years i.e. financial year 2021-22 and 2022-23.

This success in dairy farming has been achieved with his diligence, hard work and dedication. He continues to excel in his dairy farming, inspiring the aspiring farmers and youth of Goa to take up dairy farming in a professional and scientific way, by availing various departmental schemes. Notably, he has also increased his milk production from 1, 36,025 litres during the FY 2021-22 to 1,43,812 litres in 2022-23.



Goa Meat Complex Ltd.

Goa Meat Complex Ltd., a State Govt. Undertaking, has a modern and mechanized integrated Abattoir Complex at Marvasada, Usgao, Ponda – Goa. The large animals (bovine) are slaughtered under the most hygienic and scientific conditions and further clean and hygienic meat (beef) is supplied to the consumers. Regular services of slaughter have started from 21/07/2021, to the registered meat traders.

In this regard, an agreement has been signed with M/S. SunfaceAgro Foods Pvt. Ltd. for a period of ten years, for slaughtering minimum 50 animals per day @ ₹500/-.

FISHERIES

Fish assumes greater significance to the people of Goa and it forms an integral part of Goan life and culture as it forms the most important food item for more than 90% per cent of the population. Goa is the State with a coastline of 104

kms. with numerous bays headlands. The contribution of marine fisheries to the economy is very significant which is shown by the huge employment opportunities that it creates secondary and tertiary in primary, sectors, foreign exchange and meeting the food security. Fisheries industry including fishing, marketing and processing forms the significant industry, both in terms of employment and income.

In order to improve the socio-economic condition of fishermen and lessen their dependence on middleman, a number of schemes for the development of the Fisheries Co-operative have been framed, under which financial assistance in the shape of grant of Managerial Subsidy, short and medium term loans and Government contribution towards share capital of the society is given.

Pradhan Mantri Matsya Sampada Yojana

The PMMSY is designated to address critical gaps in fish production and productivity, quality, technology, post-harvest infrastructure and management, modernization and strengthening of value chain, traceability, establishing a robust fisheries management framework and fishers' welfare.

The Department of Fisheries, Government of Goa has submitted 4 Action Plans, as per the requirement of the fishermen/fish farmers in the State, with the total project cost amounting to 11795.79 lakh having Central Rs. liability amounting to Rs. 5579.44 lakh. Till date central share amounting to Rs. 3301.59 lakh has been received and Rs. 2774.52 lakh has been utilized under non-beneficiary oriented and beneficiary orientated sub- components.

Under Non-beneficiary oriented component of PMMSY, 38 Sagar Mitra

were appointed to create awareness among the local fishermen on various schemes, government policies, programmes and regulations of the Department.

Similarly, one of the largest projects approved for the State is the construction of State of Art wholesale fish market at Margao, South Goa.

Through PMMSY, Department of Fisheries, Government of Goa successfully benefits provided to beneficiaries under 31 beneficiary oriented sub-components such as 12 nos. of Motor cycle with Ice Box, 40 nos. of 3 Wheelers with ice box including erickshaw for fish vending, 29 nos. of Insulated vehicles, 26 nos. of gradation of existing fishing vessels for Competency, 87 Providing boats (Replacement) and nets for traditional fishermen, 12 nos. of Construction of fish kiosks including kiosks of aquarium/ ornamental fish, 25 of installation of cades reservoirs, 60 nos. of Bivalve cultivation (mussels, clams, pearl etc.) units etc. A total of about 326 nos. of beneficiaries has been benefited under the same.

Achievements

- Under the scheme, "Financial Assistance to Brackish Water Aquaculture Farms", subsidy of ₹4.06 has been provided to 09 beneficiaries
- Under the scheme, "Financial Assistance for construction of Wooden / FRP Canoe", subsidy has been provided to 58 beneficiaries amounting to ₹24.30 lakh.
- Under the scheme, "Financial Assistance to Fishermen For Purchase of Fisheries Requisites (Gill Nets With Accessories)", subsidy has

been provided to 89 beneficiaries amounting to ₹26.10 lakh

- Under the scheme, "Financial Assistance for Purchase of Fuel (Petrol) to the Fishermen for operation of Out Board Motors", a subsidy of ₹345.09 lakh has been provided to 1138 beneficiaries.
- Under the scheme, "Financial Assistance to Purchase/ Construct New Fishing Craft less than 26 Feet for Fishing in Inland Waters of Goa", subsidy has been provided to 33 beneficiaries amounting to ₹9.85 lakh.
- The benefits of Kisan Credit Card have been extended to 885 fishermen in the State.
- QR code based Aadhaar Card have been made mandatory to the fishermen venturing into the Sea. The Coastal Security Agencies verify the identity of the fishermen based on these cards.
- Solar Drier has been installed and commissioned at Fisheries Training Center, Ela – Dhauji, Old Goa, exclusively for drying of fish, with a capacity of approx. 500-600 kg of fish, at a time.
- Mussel farming has been initiated as a pilot project at Akhada, St. Estevam Island, Old Goa. The species selected for mussel culture is (Perna Viridis) Green mussel.
- An Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) has been signed with Central Marine Fisheries Research Institute (CMFRI), Kochi, to provide technical services for pre-operational activities of a proposed multi-species fish hatchery at Benaulim-Goa. CMFRI has submitted the Draft Project



Trend of Fish Catch in Goa



Other Activities

- Awareness camps were conducted on 'Swatchh Sagar Surakshit Sagar' involving the local fishermen and their Societies and Associations creating awareness on Marine Pollution, Waste Management of ghost gears.
- The 'Sagar Parikrama' programme was held on 19th May, 2023, wherein the dignitaries including the Hon'ble Union Minister for Fisheries, Govt. of India, had an interaction with fishermen from both Traditional and Mechanized Sector, who put forth their grievances/issues like illegal fishing activities,

- issues related to jetties, led lights, and welfare schemes of the department.
- In a bid to promote Goa's fishing industry and to create awareness among the public about Pisciculture, the State Government organized the 6th edition of the Agua Goa Mega Fish Festival from 10th to 12th February, 2023 at the SAG Ground, Campal, Panaji. The showcased Aquarium Fish Gallery, Live Fish Pond, Exhibition on various subjects connected to Fisheries. etc. Also, Resource Persons from renowned institutes delivered lectures showcasing latest techniques/technologies available and this immensely benefited the student community.

COOPERATION

Government has implemented various schemes to different types of Cooperative Societies in the State of Goa in the form of Grants, Loans and Subsidies for their development/smooth functioning of business and other allied activities.

The Department has also launched e-Cooperative Management System to facilitate Ease of Doing Business by online registration of Cooperative Societies under the Goa Cooperative Societies Act, 2001 and Rules, 2003.

Under the Goa (Right of Citizen to Time Bound Delivery of Public Service) Act, 2013, for the "Registration of the Society u/s 8 of Goa Co-operative Societies Act,2001", the Registrar, shall communicate his decision with the reasons therefore, to the person making the application, within 45 days of receipt of the application.

Achievements

- Under the Centrally Sponsored Scheme "Digitalization of Primary Agricultural Cooperative Societies", 44 Primary Agricultural Cooperative Societies (PACS) are in process for computerization and additional 14 PACS will be computerized in the 2nd phase.
- Grant-in-aid of ₹61.10 lakh has been released to 56 Cooperative Societies in the State.
- 02 Primary Agricultural Cooperative Societies (PACS) have registered for the Central Scheme " 5 Jan Aushadhi Kendras per District"
- 37 Primary Agricultural Cooperative Societies (PACS) have been registered as Common Service Centre in Goa.
- Expenditure amounting to ₹35.90 lakh has been incurred under Infrastructure Development Scheme, benefiting 66 Dairy Cooperative Societies.
- An amount of ₹11.10 lakh has been provided as Grants to 13 Dairy Co-operative Societies under Scheduled Tribe Development Scheme.
- Grants of ₹11.35 lakh has been provided to the Goa Rajya Sahakar Sangh.
- Loan of ₹0.50 lakh has been provided to the PACS/Urban Credit Cooperative Societies for computerization.
- An amount of ₹200.00 lakh has been contributed as Share Capital to the Apex Cooperative Bank.

Success Stories

The process of implementing 54 major initiatives of the Ministry of Cooperation. Govt. of India, such as Strengthening of Agricultural Primary Cooperative Societies (PACS) through computerization, World's largest decentralized grain storage program to ensure food security, LPG dealership, Service Centers. Common Aushadhi Kendra for access to generic medicines at rural level etc. for all PACS in the State, has already been started, so as to increase the income of PACS and meet new employment opportunities the sectors like Dairy/ Fisheries/Storage etc. by getting new possibilities for the economic development and expansion of PACS.

Other Activities

The 70th All India Cooperative Week was organized by the Department of Cooperation, in collaboration with various Cooperative Societies spread all over Goa from 14th -20th November, 2023. main theme was "Role Cooperatives in \$5 Trillion Economy and SDGs" and to commemorate cooperative week. weeklong programmes were organized at the Taluka level, through the subordinate offices to disseminate the cooperative message to a large number of people.

CHAPTER 10

RURAL DEVELOPMENT

Introduction

Rural Development plays a significant role in a sustainable society. The Government is committed to uplift living standards of every Goan living in rural areas. The Rural Development Agency is implementing various beneficiary oriented schemes to fulfill Government's objective of Antyodaya, Gramodaya and Sarvodaya.

Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana-Gramin (PMAY-G)

This scheme is one of the "13 Flagship Schemes" of the Government of India which is regularly monitored by Office of the Hon'ble Prime Minister. This scheme is being implemented under the vision of "Housing for all". An amount of ₹1,20,000/- as assistance is provided for construction of house only for persons whose names appear in the Socio-Caste Census Economic 2011 beneficiaries from rural areas. The assistance is disbursed the beneficiary in 3 installments i.e. 1st installment of ₹50,000/- at the time of sanctioning, 2nd installment of ₹50,000/at Plinth level and final disbursement of ₹20,000/- at Roof cast level. The State Government has completed its target of sanctioning 257 new houses and has achieved 100% saturation under the scheme. Out of 257 sanctioned new houses, construction of 226 houses is completed as on December 2023.

During the current financial year upto December 2023, construction of 63 houses have been completed. The unfinished houses will be completed by March 2024. Besides this, 53 beneficiaries were released final

installment on completion of house under earlier Indira Awaas Yojana (IAY). The total number of houses completed under PMAY-G during the last five years is given in Table No 10.1

National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM)

National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM) is a poverty alleviation project focused on promoting selfemployment. The basic idea behind this programme is to organize the poor into Self Help Groups (SHGs) and make them capable for self-employment and skilled wage employment opportunities, resulting in appreciable increase in their incomes, on a sustainable basis. It is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme. There are 3674 SHG registered under NRLM as on December 2023 having member strength of 47460. The number of SHGs in North Goa are 2263 having member strength of 29576 and in South Goa 1411 SHGs with member strength of 17884.

783 SHGs have availed loan amounting to ₹39.34 crore during 2023-24 (upto December, 2023). As on December 2023, 2245 have an outstanding bank loan to the tune of ₹71.58 crore in the State. The achievement under the

scheme during the current financial year upto December, 2023 is given in Table No. 10.2 and during the last five years is given in Annexure - 22. The expenditure incurred under the various components of the scheme during the last five years is ₹ 3048.72 lakh.

Mukhyamantri Annapurna Yojana

This scheme is launched with the major objective of enhancing self-employment opportunities for Mahila Self Help Groups. The scheme offers a path to independence & reliable source of income. The scheme is initiated with an inspiring concept of assisting Self Help becoming economically Groups, in strengthened by allowing them to operate food canteens. To sustainable livelihood opportunities for the Self Help Groups (SHGs), the Government has introduced the Mukhyamantri Annapurna Yojana during the current year. The scheme facilitates the Self Help Groups to run Government canteens in various Departments/ Corporations/ Institutions. 47 SHGs have been empanelled so far by the Department which is designated the nodal Department for the purpose, out of which 1 SHG i.e. Om Shree Ganesh SHG from Merces has received approval to run a canteen at

Food & Drugs Administration (FDA), Bambolim.

Mahatma Gandhi Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (MGNREGA)

The objective of the scheme is to provide wage for the enhancement of livelihood security of the households in the rural areas of the country by providing at least 100 days of guaranteed wage employment in a financial year to every household whose adult members volunteer for unskilled manual work at the statutory minimum wage. The wage is enhanced to ₹322/-w.e.f. 1st April, 2023.

The maximum number of man-days in 2023-24 (upto December 2023) are generated in Canacona taluka i.e. 8579 and the minimum are 105 in Mormugao taluka. The number of man-days generated in each taluka during the last five years are given in Annexure - 23.

31638 man-days of wage employment have been generated and 171 Job Cards are issued during the current financial year upto December 2023. The total number of Job cards issued &Mandays generated under MGNREGA during the last five years is given in the Table No. 10.3

Goa Gram Samrudhhi Yojana (GGSY)

Startup Village Enterprise Programme (SVEP)

SVEP is a part of the Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana-National Rural Livelihood Mission (DAY-NRLM). The project assists the beneficiary in setting up the enterprise and provide them with business skills, exposure, loans for support etc. Under this business programme, 856 Enterprises have been supported during the financial year 2023-24 (as on December 2023) incurring an expenditure of ₹132.30 lakh.

Other achievements

- Under the project "Linking Rural and Eco-Tourism potential to SHG livelihood in Tambi Surla Cluster", the Government in association with Mineral Foundation of Goa has onboarded 7 SHGs having 98 members. The mineral foundation of Goa provides assistance in developing concepts, client based, governance structure and guidelines for the project.
- The Government in association with the Associated Chambers of Commerce & Industry of India (ASSOCHAM) is implements a

- project "Enabling rural entrepreneur towards digital world" with the aim of empowering the Goan rural community especially women with digital literacy. As on December 2023, 300 women entrepreneurs from various SHGs have been supported in Pale Cotombi in Bicholim Taluka of North Goa.
- The Government in association with Hindustan Petroleum Corporation Limited is implementing a project "Hindustan Petroleum Sakhi (HP Sakhi)".This project will Mahila SHGs as HP Sakhi for providing HP gas sales assistance. These SHGs are mapped to LPG distributors in their area of operation to provide services like i) LPG refill booking and sales, ii) Activation of dormant consumers, iii) facilitate micro financing and iv) sale of LPG related products like suraksha hose, aprons, etc.11 HP sakhis currently implementing the projects in Ponda, Bicholim, Bardez, Pernem and Tiswadi.

Home-stay Tourism Pilot Project

To enhance the livelihood opportunities, up-skill and create self-employment opportunities for Self Help Groups, the Government is promoting Home-stay tourism in association with Mineral Foundation of Goa in the hinterland areas of the State. Home-stays have been started in Talde village of Dharbandora by 7 SHGs involving more than 100 households in the village and also in the neighboring villages.

Goa Saras

The Government organized Goa Saras, a National Level Exhibition-cum-sale in both districts exposing different items produced by SHGs from all over the country. The SARAS Exhibition was

held from 30th November 2023 to 11th December 2023.

Swayampurna Goa e-Bazaar

Swayampurna Chaturthi bazaar was organized last year at 22 different locations in physical mode for 7 days to create opportunities for local Mahila Self Help Groups, Youth, Individuals to sell homemade sweets and other hand made decorative items. This year the Government organized Chavath Bazaar through online platform as "Chavath e Bazaar". For the First time in the country, such e-Bazaar has been organized on the occasion of Ganesh Chaturthi. Based on the feedbacks and suggestions received from Mahilas and Self Help Groups, the Government went ahead one step and created Swayampurna Goa e Bazaar platform i.e. www.swayampurnagoa.com

This platform has been specially designed for Local Artisans, Self Help Groups to sell their home made and hand made products not only within the State but also across PAN India. As on December 2023, more than 500 mahilas / artisans have been provided special training on branding & packaging of homemade products to make them competent and on-boarded them on Swayampurna Goa e-Bazaar portal.

Success Stories

Food Court Run by Rural Women in South Goa District Hospital (Hospicio) Sets an Example of Self – Reliance.

Ekta Village Organization from Rumdamol Salcete Block, a Self Help Group registered under Goa State Rural Livelihood Mission (GSRLM) operate Food Court Service in South Goa District Hospital. The Ekta VO Food Court services provides food from 08:30 a.m. to 07:00 p.m.at an affordable rate to the staff and families of patients seeking or under treatment in the hospital. A part from customers visiting the food court, orders are received from the staff which helps in additional earnings. This initiative has made the members of Ekta Self Help Group economically empowered.

PANCHAYATS

Deendayal Infrastructure

Development Scheme.

The objective of the scheme is to strengthen the Village Panchayats and to upgrade the infrastructure in the rural areas by taking up major projects

The following projects have been approved during the current financial year:

- Re-Construction of Panchayat Ghar of Sao-Matias in Tiswadi taluka.
- Development of existing Ground in Survey No. 183/0 of V.P. Mulgao in ward no. III at Shivolkar wada Mulgao in Bicholim.
- Construction of shopping complex with Community Hall in Survey No 26/1 of V.P Nachinola.
- Construction of Panchayat Ghar in survey No 70/1 of VP Seraulim.
- Construction of Community hall near Shree Satyanarayan Prasan Mandir at Metwada Volvoi, Ponda in Survey No 204/5-A and 204/6 of Village Panchayat Volvoi.
- Construction of Panchayat Ghar in Survey No 236/7 of village Guidorlim, Salcete.
- Construction of New Panchayat Ghar in Survey No 8/15 of village Paroda, Salcete.

- Work of sitting gallery and Market complex proposal for playground at Village Panchayat Verem-Vagurme.

Grants to Village Panchayats

Zilla Village **Panchayats** and Panchayats are provided Grants under various schemes for taking developmental works, solid & waste management and release of salary to Panch/Sarpanch, etc. The total grants released under various categories during the last five years was ₹98473.19 lakh. The details of grants released is given in Annexure 25.

15th Finance Commission

Under the Fifteenth Finance Commission, Grant-in-Aid is given to the State Government for Rural Local Bodies (RLBs) and Urban Local Bodies (ULBs). Fifteenth Finance Commission Period is from 2020-21 to 2025-26. The grants are divided into 2 categories i.e. Tied Grants (60%) and Untied Grants(40%).

The Tied Grants are for basic services like sanitation and maintenance of open defecation free (ODF), Supply of drinking water, rain water harvesting etc. The Untied Grants are open grants and can be utilized as per the need of Village Panchayats.

Table No. 10.8 and Table No. 10.9 show the year wise details of funds received by the State for Rural Local Bodies (RLBs) and amount released / distributed to the Village Panchayats under Tied Grants and Untied Grants respectively.

The total Grants received by the State Government is ₹130 crore as on date and utilization by Village Panchayats as on 31/12/2023 is ₹8.00 crore under Tied Grants and ₹11.00 crore under Untied Grants.

Swachh Bharat Mission Gramin

The scheme is aimed to provide toilet in each and every household in the rural areas in all the Village Panchayats and also to construct community sanitation complexes to make them (ODF) available. wherever land is Also. awareness is created among rural population for segregation of dry and wet waste. The State has been declared ODF State. Already 18018 of individual household toilets have been provided and 514 of community toilets have been constructed under this scheme. Steps are taken to motivate and educate communities in making villages clean with the theme "NitalGhar, Nital Gao, Nital Goecho Raakhno Haanv".

Material Recovery Facility (MRF):

Under this facility, Collection, Segregation and disposal of wet, dry and plastic waste is taken up. Out of all, 102 Village Panchayats have constructed the shades and remaining 89 Village Panchayats have identified the land which is in initial stage. The taluka wise status of MRF is given in the Annexure 26.

Rashtriya Gram Swaraj Abhiyan (RGSA)

The Goa Institute of **Public** Administration and Rural Development (GIPARD), State institute of Rural Development and Panchayati Raj (SIRDPR) - Goa has conducted 67 training programmes under revamped Rashtriya Gram Swaraj Abhiyan (RGSA) as per approved Annual Action Plan (AAP) for the year 2023-2024.

The training programmes and hands – on support was provided to Panchayati Raj Officials, elected representatives, Village Development Committee Members, Self Help Group Members and Anganwadi Workers as per thematic areas of training courses.

The thematic areas of training activities were Leadership & Communication Skills, Gram Sabhas, Mahila / Bal / Balika Sabhas. e-Gram Swarai application, SHG -PRI Convergence, Gram Panchayat Development Plan, Government Schemes, localisation of Sustainable Development Goals, etc. As per approved Annual Action Plan, under revamped RGSA, a total of 2535 participants approved to were trained. Since this Institute received **PRIs** aood response from 2859 participants were trained on above mentioned subject areas. The training data is also getting Training uploaded on Management Portal simultaneously where in programmes covering 1757 participants are uploaded on the Portal.

Local Government Directory (LGD)

of the LGD is one applications developed under the Mission Mode Project of Ministry of Panchayati Raj. The primary objective of LGD is to facilitate the State Departments update the directory with newly formed panchayats/local bodies, re-organization in panchayats, conversion from Rural to Urban area etc. and provide the information in public domain. LGD application assigns a unique location code (LGD code) to the existing and every new local Government body that created in the svstem. Directorate of Panchayats is the Nodal Department to monitor and update all the details on the Portal pertaining to State of Goa. The State of Goa was the first State of India to resolve all its discrepancies under LGD, thereby having perfect Directory of all the Village Panchayats on the portal of Ministry of Panchayati Raj, which is further linked to all other portals of the other Ministries.

Corporate Social Responsibility

Under the Corporate Social Responsibility, 43 works/ activities/ projects amounting to ₹387.88 lakh have been carried out by 29 Companies / Corporate Offices in 6 talukas during the current financial year (upto December 2023). The details are given in Annexure 27.

Viksit Bharat Sankalp Yatra (VBSY)

The Government flagged off the Viksit Bharat Sankalp Yatra on 15thNovember 2023 at Secretariat Complex, Goa. The campaign was publicized through three **IEC** vans using audio, visuals, pamphlets, brochures, booklets, calendars, diaries through which the works of schemes and Central Government were extensively publicized and the progress was uploaded on the website/application regularly. Under this campaign 17 Rural Schemes were covered.

In Goa, Viksit Bharat Sankalp Yatrahas reached in all 191 Village Panchayat upto 31/12/2023. Approximately 30,000 people have participated approximately 25,000 people have taken the Sankalp. Around 300 Persons have shared their experiences under Meri Kahani Meri Zubani. Every village has actively participated in the awareness campaign by performing cultural programs through **Dharti Kahe Pukar** Ke. During the Health Camps, approximately 13,000 people screened and TB Screening was carried out for 7940 people. Screening of 2500 people was done for Sickle Anemia. During the campaign 894 Women, Students, Sports persons and local Artists have also been felicitated and 2420 volunteers have been registered under Mera Bharat Volunteers and 66 Pradhan Mantri Ujiwala Yojana (PMUY) registrations have been completed.

Awareness programs for farmers are conducted under Satat Krishi Prayas. Till 31/12/2023, 128 Drone demonstrations and 45 soil health cards along with 145 new PM Kisan registrations have been completed.

Success Stories

Swachh Bharat Mission

The Village Panchayat of Nagoa stands as a testament to community-driven initiatives in waste management. With a population approximately 3,500 of residents, this small village has faced a significant challenge due to its proximity to an industrial estate, resulting in an additional 15000+ migrant population and a surge in waste generation. Recognizing the gravity of the situation, Village Panchayat of Nagoa embarked on a transformative journey to address the waste management crisis. Over a span of two years, they implemented a comprehensive plan that has not only mitigated the waste but has also problem created sustainable model worth emulating. The initial steps involved a meticulous survey of every household in the village, documenting details and quantities of waste generated daily. Communidade of Nagoa has donated 5000 sq. mts. of land for the purpose.

The Village Panchayat has started 100% Door to Door collection of waste and has set up a Material Recovery Facility admeasuring200Sq.mt. area for segregation of waste &for bailing of recyclable & non-recyclable waste and has also setup a TPD Bio-Gas Plant which generates 50-60 units of electricity per day.

Today, the impact of their efforts is evident from the fact that the Panchayat efficiently handles around two tonnes of plastic and dry waste, bailing it regularly. The waste management plant powers

itself through electricity generated by the biogas plant. 18 individuals from villages are employed on waste management site.

Success Story in Solid Waste Management /Liquid Waste Management

The Village Panchayat Chicalim has engaged contractor for Door to Door waste collection system by appointing an agency which collects charges for its services and also manages supervision for effective segregation of waste at the source of its generation. The collected waste is segregated into four categories i.e. Wet (Biodegradable waste), Dry (Non-Biodegradable waste), Household Hazardous waste and Fecal Sludge Management (FSM)/Sewage Waste.

TPD BIOGAS PLANT:

Every day 5000 kgs of wet organic waste is brought to the Biogas Plant feed shed area. 100% segregated wet processed waste is through shredder which grinds it thoroughly with the use of re-circulated slurry. This ensures that a homogeneous mixture enters the primary digester. overflow mixture/slurry is then sent into the secondary digester wherein biogas is generated with the help of an agitator. Approx. 300 cu.m. per day of biogas is generated which can generate around 250 to 300 units per day of electricity through the connected genset. Excess liquid slurry is taken into the Existing Treatment Plant (ETP) or sent to agricultural farms as organic manure. The Electricity Generated is used for self-consumption.

Total electricity requirement for Wealth out of waste (WOOW) plant: - 500 units Energy generated from Biogas therefore has saved 300 units per day, thus paying for only 200 units per day.

Material Recovery Facility & PMU

An area of 150 sq.m.is allotted for a Recovery Facility (MRF) Material whereby all the waste collected through the door-to-door waste collection is received and the general segregation of waste like dry, sanitary and refuse is sorted. From here, any wet waste received mixed with other type of waste is sent further to biogas plant for treatment and the refuse waste is then bailed in order to be sent to the cement factories for incineration. Sanitary Waste incinerated if any, is and dood segregated dry waste is sent further to the Plastic Management Unit (PMU). A PMU of 200 sa. m. is built to retrieve various factions of plastic waste like PET, MLP, HDPE, LLDPE etc. This unit ensures the plastic waste generate a good potential revenue by way of up cycling. Two 20HP bailing machines and a heavy duty plastic waste shredder is installed to handle these factions of plastics separately. The facility receives 4 tonnes of dry waste every day and recyclables fraction is almost 25-30 %. The recyclables and the Refuse Derived Fuel (RDF) is 100% documented. The Non-recyclable waste is further bled and sent weekly to Cement Factory through Goa Waste Management Corporation.

30 KLD STP & 40 KLD FSTP:

The Village Panchayat along with Solid waste management has focused on discharge of Liquid waste, with setting up of a liquid waste facility of 70KLD/day project make the financially sustainable. The Village Panchayats has established Sewage tanker facility at discounted rates. There is a Continuous demand from the waste generators and Airport authority. Market rate for tankers 7000-8000 vary from whereas Panchavats charges minimum Rate from 2000-3000.

40KLD F-STP:

Fecal Sludge from residential/commercial septic tanks is unloaded into the bar screen chamber whereby all inorganic items screened and the sludge flows into the anaerobic bio-digester chamber by gravity. This bio-digester carries out hydrolysis, methanogens etc. to break down the organic compounds. Next, the sludge water travels into the anoxic chamber where denitrification takes place reducing any nitrogen contents from it. The sludge water is then pumped into the primary settling tank followed by primary aeration chamber and subsequently, secondary settling tank and secondary aeration chamber by gravity. The sludge settled at the bottom of settling tanks is pumped into the sludge holding tank and then sent into the screw press whereas the treated sent further for water is treatment through pressure sand filter and activated carbon filter and then dosed with chlorine for disinfection.

Atal Gram Development Agency Goa

The Agency has undertaken following programmes.

Development of Agriculture activities in V.P.Surla

The Agency has implemented a novel scheme towards development of agricultural fields in the jurisdiction of Village Panchayat Surla in Bicholim Taluka. The main aim of the scheme is to transform large tracts of non-cultivable land into cultivable land by adopting suitable measures.

Manual Labour engaged for the above work is being paid daily wages as per the daily wage rate as approved by the Office of Commissioner, Labour and Employment, Government of Goa. Earth

machinery viz. Backhoe Loaders/Mini-Excavator/ Excavator for removal of shrubs, undergrowth dead wood, small stones/debris and leveling of fields are engaged as requested by the farmers after following proper codal formalities. An area of around 62.400.00 sq. mts. has been made cultivable in Ward No 1 (Patoli) in the jurisdiction of V.P. Surla by following appropriate strategies. An area of 31,000.00 sq. mts. has been made cultivable in Ward No. 4 (Ambefal. Bavem-Surla) jurisdiction of V P. Surla. The work of manual cutting/cleaning of Bushes. Grass & other undesirable vegetation in the jurisdiction of V.P. Surla, Bicholim Goa has been completed in another plot admeasuring 37,400. sq.mts.in Ward No. 1 and 2 (Brahma Farmers Kumare- Joshibhat- Bhile).

Cultivation of Strawberries

The Atal Gram Development Agency assisted 3 Self Help Groups from Verlem viz. Bhumika Self Help Group. Shiv Shakti Self Help Group Chandreshwar Self Help Group in the cultivation of strawberries. An area of 4900.00 sq. mts. has been brought under strawberry cultivation by Bhumika Self Help Group, Verlem (2300 sq. mts.), Shiv Shakti Self Help Group, mts.) Verlem (1400 sa. Chandreshwar Self Help Group (1200 sq.mts.). The Agency procured and supplied 33,000 strawberry saplings from Wai village in Maharashtra State.

Matoli Bazaar

was The annual Matoli Bazaar organized on the eve of Ganesh Chaturthi Festival at Margao Quepem. The Bazaar is aimed to inculcate entrepreneurship qualities among the rural women especially belonging to Scheduled Tribes. Around 250 women have formed Self Help

Groups and have been regularly conducting "Matoli Bazaar" every year Individual income earned varies from ₹15,000 to ₹40,000 per mahila.

SCHOOL EDUCATION

Implementation of e-School project at Government High Schools at Netorlim, Vaddem- Curdi in Sanguem taluka and Maina and Malkarnem in Quepem taluka: The Agency procured and supplied Interactive Smart Boards alongwith mini PC, UPS and Camera for Video Conferencing at Government High Netorlim, Vaddem-Curdi School, Sanguem taluka and Maina Malkarnem in Quepem taluka to make learning an enjoyable experience.

The Agency has also made arrangements for electricity connection and LAN networking in all the schools. The introduction of Interactive Smart Boards in the schools has benefited the student community to a great extent. This facility has also benefitted the teachers explain scientific and to mathematical concepts more clearly and deliver the best quality education to their students which helps the students to understand these complex concepts in an easy way.

CHAPTER 11

INDUSTRIES

Introduction

The State of Goa envisages catalyzing economic growth through accelerated industrial development. The mission is to create sustainable employment opportunities mainly to the people of Goa. It also includes environment friendly industrial development ensuring balanced growth of regions, a facilitative regime that explores and unleashes the energies of the private sector to create an environment in which industry, both existing and new, can prosper.

The State Government has taken steps to simplify the process of setting up industrial facilities in Goa. Various measures have been implemented to enhance the ease of of doing business, including the development of digital public goods for industry governance, the notification of new Goa--IDC regulations in 2023, decriminalisation of laws pertaining to industry governance and the notification of Logistics and Warehousing Policy.

There are 23 Industrial Estates in Goa having a total of 3158 plots for setting up of Industrial facilities. The number of Industrial Estates in North Goa and South Goa are 12 and 11 respectively. The details of number of plots Industrial Estate- wise is given in Annexure - 28. The maximum number of plots i.e 651 is in Verna Industrial Estate having 486 numbers of units having 354 running plants. The details of running plants Industrial Estate-wise is given Annexure - 29.

The total number of Micro, Small, Medium and Large (MSME) Industries registered in the State during the current

financial year (upto December, 2023) is 12.693 which has increased by 317.67% as compared to 2019-20. The number of Micro units registered has increased by 446.84% during the same period. The category wise details about Micro, Small, Medium and Large industries registered in the State during vears last 5 is aiven Annexure - 30 and the category-wise no. of units registered details during 2023-24 is given in Table 11.1

The registration process of MSME is fully online under MSMED Act, 2006. Any entrepreneur can apply online by visiting the portal www.udyamregistration.gov.in. The process of registration is entirely paperless and is based on declaration, no documents or proof are required for registering Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises, only Aadhaar number is required and the rest of the details about registration will be taken automatically from the Government data.

The Directorate of Industries, Trade and Commerce maintains the record of Udyam Registration under Micro, Small

and Medium Enterprises in the State of Goa.

The Goa Investment Promotion Board (G-IPB) granted in-principle has approval to 80 projects in the last 5 years. This comprises of 50 new manufacturing units, 5 new Hospitality projects, 7 new Service sector projects, 18 projects of expansion of the existing manufacturing units. The investment expected from all these units is ₹ 6297.14 crore and employment potential is 23113 people. Further, the Units registered under MSME during the vears 48.187. The last investments from this units is expected to be ₹ 3773.98 crore. The total employment potential through the Goa IPB projects and MSME Units during the last five years 3,27,925. The details are given in Annexure – 31.

The State Government has taken up several activities to improve the infrastructure and service delivery to the industries. Some of them are as follows:

- Revamping the Rules and Regulations of the Corporation and published Goa Industrial Development Corporation Allotment, Transfer and Sub-Lease Regulation 2023 on 7th December, 2023.;
- Digitization of GIDC services and creating a Single Window Portal;
- DGPS Survey of all the Industrial Estates;
- Creation of Green Corridors, Solid Waste Management facilities, etc;
- Creation of MSME/Startup Incubation Park

The State Government through Goa Industrial Development Corporation (Goa-IDC) held IDC-Connect programme at the various Industrial Estate to improve service delivery, redress grievances, and promote the implementation of various schemes for Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs). This programme is in line with

the vision of 'Seva, Sahayog and Swayampurna'.

IDC-Connect is an initiative to bring governance to the doorstep of the Industrial Estates. The end goal is to create a conducive environment for industrial growth and investment in Goa and showcase its potential and opportunities as an ideal destination for industrial development.

The Industrialists participated in the programme and interacted with the IDC officials and representatives of other line-departments. They raised issues related to infrastructure works and other development works in the Industrial Estate. They also gave suggestions on tackling non-functional units, designing a new IDC portal, and streamlining the vacant plot advertising mechanism.

Ease of Doing Business (EoDB)

Goa Industrial Development Corporation (Goa-IDC) has taken a significant step towards addressing the challenges of digitization by approving the engagement of a Software Development Company for the creation of a new portal. Recognizing the need for a lasting solution, the corporation has decided to invest in the development of a 'Digital Public Good' (DPG).

Digital public goods play a crucial role foundational elements for establishment of secure, trusted, and inclusive digital public infrastructure. They are essential in assisting countries in achieving Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Unlike isolated digital solutions that are often created and maintained independently, DPGs are designed to be open for study, adaptation, and replication in diverse contexts. Goa-IDC is pioneering this approach in India by becoming the first Industrial Development Corporation in the country to leverage and co-create a

Digital Public Good. This groundbreaking initiative will be carried out in collaboration with key partners, namely, eGov Foundation, Invest India, and Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu India LLP.

By embracing the concept of Digital Public Goods and collaborating with experienced entities, Goa-IDC aims to establish a digital solution that not only addresses its immediate needs but also sets a precedent for openness, adaptability, and collaborative innovation in the realm of industrial development. This forward-thinking approach positions Goa-IDC as a leader in leveraging digital solutions for sustainable development in the Indian industrial landscape.

Goa-Investment Promotion Board (G-IPB) has diligently worked with 40 plus Departments/ Directorates to implement 300 plus reform points as mandated by Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade (DPIIT), Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India. Goa -IPB has also precisely studied and decriminalised 59 criminal provisions spread across 29 acts of 18 Departments.

Further, Goa-IPB is coming up with a Combined Application form along with simplified application forms of different Departments to ease the business compliance in the State. Goa-IPB through numerous capacity building exercises and countless meetings have encouraged various Departments to categorize and streamline business compliances. As a result of this, various Departments such as Tourism, Pollution Control Board, & Town Country Planning, Revenue and Municipal Administration have simplified their business services.

Further, to simplify the business approvals and ensure faster clearance,

Goa-IPB is also assisting Goa Industrial Development Corporation (GIDC) by making suitable amendments to GIDC Regulations.

Achievements under various schemes

1. Pradhan Mantri Formalisation of Micro Food Processing Enterprises Scheme (PMFME):

This is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme (CSS) designed to address the challenges faced by the micro enterprises and to tap the potential of groups and cooperatives in supporting the upgradation and formalization of the enterprises. This scheme implemented on the sharing pattern of 60:40 However, scheme ratio. component like Capacity Building, Incubation Common Center. Handholding Support are 100% funded by Government of India. The achievements under this scheme during last two years is given in Table No. 11.2

Krishi Vigyan Kendra South Goa Directorate of Agriculture, Government of Goa Margao-Goa had proposed for Common Incubation Center at Durga Farm Chinchinim South Goa for the processing of Coconut and Local Seasonal Fruits. The project was scrutinised and approved by Ministry of Food Processing Government of India at the project cost Rs. 203.30 crore. Krishi Vigyan Kendra has completed minor Civil construction works.

2. Scheme of Funds for Regeneration of Traditional Industries of Ministry of Micro, Small Food Processing Enterprise (SFURTI):

The objectives of the scheme is to organize the traditional industries and artisans into clusters to make them competitive and provide support for their term sustainability, sustained employment, to enhance marketability of products of such clusters, to equip traditional artisans of the associated clusters with the improved skills, to make provision for common facilities and improved tools and equipments for artisans, to strengthen the cluster governance systems with the active participation of the stakeholders, and to build up innovated and traditional skills, improved technologies, advanced processes, market intelligence and new models of public-private partnerships, so as to gradually replicate similar models of cluster-based regenerated traditional industries.

3. Prime Minister's Employment Generation Programme (PMEGP)

This scheme is implemented by Directorate of Industries and Khadi Village Industries Board (KVIB): PMEGP is 100% funded credit linked subsidy programme of Government of India. The objective is to generate self employment and employment opportunities through setting up of new enterprises. The achievements under this scheme during last five years is given in Table No: 11.3

4. Goa Tribal's Employment Generation Programme (GTEGP) Scheme, 2017

The scheme is implemented with the objective of improving entrepreneurship skills as well as generating self-employment amongst the tribal communities of the State.

To avail this scheme, the applicant should be a member of the tribal community, should be between the ages of 18 to 45 years and should be unemployed with a minimum qualification of Standard IV.

The extent of assistance under this scheme is ₹ 25.00 Lakhs for Micro and Small Manufacturing Enterprises, ₹ 15.00 Lakhs for Service Enterprises and ₹ 15.00 Lakhs for trading Activity.

The assistance includes 40% subsidy on sanctioned amount, 5% promoter's contribution and the balance 55% loan with interest @ 2% p.a. The loan amount is repayable in 60 to 120 EMI's as may be decided by the Task Force Committee. The achievements under the scheme during the last five is given in Table No.11.4

5. Scheme for promotion of Beekeeping Industry

The Scheme for promotion of Bee Industry Keeping is implemented through Khadi and Village Industries Board for promotion & development of scientific beekeeping and production of quality honey & other beehive products, promoting holistic growth of beekeeping industry for income & employment generation, providing livelihood support to farm and non-farm households and to enhance agriculture/ horticulture production. Under this scheme during the year 2023-24, 30 proposals for 84 bee boxes have been sanctioned. The achievements under the scheme during the last 3 years is given in Table No.11.5

6. The Goa State Incentives to Encourage Investments Scheme 2017, 'Umbrella Scheme'

a) Interest Subsidy Scheme, 2017: All the Micro, Small, Medium Manufacturing Units;

Hinterland eco-tourism projects in lesser developed Talukas which commenced commercial production after 1/10/2017 and employing minimum 60% goan employees are eligible under this scheme. The benefits are reimbursement of 30% of interest paid eligible Term loan and/or reimbursement of 30% of interest paid or 1.5% of turnover (whichever is less) on eligible working capital loan. The ceiling limit is restricted to up to `25.00 lakh per annum. One unit has taken the benefit under the scheme incurring an expenditure of ₹ 2.79 lakh in 2022-23. In the current financial year sanction has been granted to six units.

b) Employment Subsidy Scheme, 2017:

All micro, small, medium, large manufacturing units; hinterland ecotourism projects in lesser developed Talukas and which are employing minimum 60% Goan employees, being paid minimum salary of ₹ 8000/- per month are eligible.

The benefits are reimbursement of 50% of salaries paid to Goan eligible employees pertaining to micro, small, medium units and reimbursement of 25% of salaries paid to Goan eligible employees for Large units as per proportion specified in the Scheme. For Micro, Small, Medium, Eco Tourism units - the benefit is restricted To ₹ 25 lakh per annum; and for Large unit- Upto ₹ 50 lakh per annum.

However, the benefit shall be restricted to ₹ 7000/- per person per month. 7 Units have taken benefit under the scheme during the last five years incurring an expenditure of ₹ 24.60 lakh.

c) Financial Incentives for Certification and Intellectual Property Rights Reimbursement Scheme, 2017:

micro, small, All medium, large manufacturing units, hospitals and educational institutions obtaining any standard certification and/ or intellectual property rights (IPR) except statutory certificates are eligible. The benefits are reimbursement of 100% of cost of certificates obtaining (excluding

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hotel/travel charges etc). Reimbursement of 50% of cost of registering (IPR) and fees paid to the registry for registration of IPR. The ceiling on benefit for certification is ₹ 8.00 lakh and for IPR is ₹ 15.00 lakh. 2 units have taken the benefit under the scheme incurring an expenditure of ₹ 1.02 lakh during the last five years.

d) Capital Subsidy Scheme, 2017:

All Micro and Small Scale manufacturing units that have commenced commercial production after 1/10/2017 are eligible. Further, the units which carry out substantial expansion after 1/10/2017 as defined in the Umbrella Scheme are also eligible. The benefits include a capital subsidy of 30% of the cost of capital provided the subsidy on building/office is restricted to ₹ 5 lakh; (for micro units).

A capital subsidy of 30% of the cost of capital provided the subsidy building/office is restricted to ₹ 10 lakh (for small units). For the purpose of this scheme, the cost of capital shall include the cost of all plant and machinery installed in the unit, Information and communication technology (ICT) equipment required to operate the machinery, office and factory premises. 17 units have taken the benefits under the scheme incurring an expenditure of ₹ 194.48 lakh.

7. Preferential Purchase Incentives for Micro and Small Enterprises Scheme, 2022

This scheme is intended to encourage and give boost to Micro and Small Scale Enterprise Sector. The achievements under the scheme from 2022-23 to 2023-24 (upto December 2023) is given in Table No: 11.6.

PM Vishwakarma Yojana

Under PM Vishwakarma Yojana, the artisans (Shramjeevi) engaged in 18 different trades shall be identified. These trades are Carpenter. maker, Armourer, Blacksmith, Hammer & Tool kit maker, Locksmith, Goldsmith, Sculptor. Cobbler, Potter. Mason. Basket/Mat/Broom maker/Coir Weaver, Doll & Toy maker, Barber, Garland maker, Washerman, Tailor, Fishing net maker. All Shramajeevis engaged in these 18 trades are issued an ID card upon their registration on the Portal. There is a provision under the scheme for 5 days training in each trade. every block, the training Centres are chosen for each trade. Upon completion of training, the beneficiary is paid ₹ 2500/- travelling allowance. Further, the Shramjeevi gets a e-voucher of ₹ 15000/- for purchase of tool kit / instrument. These Shramieevi then will be eligible for collateral free loan upto ₹ 1 lakh at very nominal rate of interest. Shramjeevi who avail the 1st tranche of loan will get 2nd loan of upto ₹ 2 lakh immediately after 1st loan is successfully repaid.

This monetary aid will enable the artisans to kick start their business and expand it, resulting in improved livelihoods. The first batch of Shramjeevis have completed their training in tailoring trade on 25th January 2023

Till 25th January 2024, 35000 Shramjeevis have been registered.

Economic Development Corporation (EDC):

EDC Limited is a premier financial Goa, institution in a catalyst for economic development and industrial growth in Goa. EDC is an apex Corporation of State Government extending financial assistance to the MSME Sector in the State. Since 1975. the Corporation has assisted over 4500 extendina units term loan of ₹ 1,66,835.95 lakh to fund projects.

Over the years EDC has been associated with every 2nd or 3rd project being set up in the State. The emphasis of EDC is to support 1st Generation entrepreneurs & take them to the next higher level to contribute to economic development in the State and create jobs.

Chief Minister's Rojgar Yojana (CMRY):

The Chief Minister's Rojgar Yojana (CMRY) scheme is a composite loan scheme which envisages to provide financial assistance for new as well as existing business.

The scheme has been revamped recently to widen the eligibility criteria so that more beneficiaries can be entitled to take benefit of the scheme. Age limit is enhanced to 50 years and income limit has been removed to enhance coverage under CMRY.

Under this scheme, loan limit for professionals and technically qualified persons is ₹ 25.00 lakh and for others is ₹ 20.00 lakh, repayable in maximum 7 years. Women/ OBC/Disabled beneficiaries who avail assistance under the scheme have to bear only 5% of the

project cost as their contribution while others have to bear 10% of the project cost. The interest rate on the loan is 8% p.a. and all beneficiaries who are regular and in-operation get an interest rebate of 6%, thereby reducing the effective interest to 2% p.a.

45 new beneficiaries have been added and loan amounting to ₹ 294.12 lakh has been sanctioned for the year 2023-24 (up to 31/12/2023).

As on 01st January, 2024, 7788 beneficiaries have been sanctioned loans under the Scheme amounting to ₹ 244.25 crore since inception. The performance of the CMRY scheme from 2019-20 to 2023-24 (up to 31/12/2023) is given in Table No. 11.7

Mukhyamantri Modified Interest Rebate Scheme:

Mukhyamantri Modified Interest Rebate Scheme provides interest rebate on the Term loan extended to MSME & Services sector (except sectors listed in negative category). Further, the scheme has been renewed in year 2023 with modifications & is extended till 31/03/2028.

Under this scheme, Interest Rebate of 5% is provided to units in backward

Talukas, 2% to Goan residents and 2% to Women Entrepreneurs. An additional rebate of 2% is offered to units employing 20 or more Goan employees. The maximum interest rebate is 9% p.a. or maximum of ₹ 25.00 lakh per year.

Under this scheme, 54 new beneficiaries have been added and interest rebate of ₹ 355.51 lakh has been released for the year 2023-24 (up to 31/12/2023). Since inception, an interest rebate of ₹ 2500.00 lakh has been released to 108 beneficiaries. The year wise number of beneficiaries and the amount of interest rebate reimbursed for last 5 years is given in Table No: 11.8

The Corporation has been assisting the Government by actively participating in Aatmanirbhar the Bharat and Swayampurna Goa progammes with an objective to increase awareness about Government Schemes. Special CMRY Camps are also organized at EDC House to promote the CMRY selfemployment Scheme.

The Corporation has been actively participating in various online programmes and camps organized by schools, colleges and other institutions so as to create awareness of self-employment schemes. The Corporation also manages Land Acquisition funds of

the State Government & other activities as mandated to it. The Corporation has been generating profits over the past years and regularly paying dividend to the Government

CSR Activities:

EDC being a profit earning company extends financial support by way of CSR to schools & other entities in State Government & Private sector to develop infrastructure and facilities for students and other stakeholders. Mines and Geology

The State of Goa is endowed with Mineral Resources. Iron Ore, Manganese Ore, Bauxite are minerals of economic importance. Besides there are minor minerals like Basalt, Laterite Stones and Rubbles, River Sand, Murrum etc., which are in great demand as construction material.

This industry is labour intensive and provides work to large number of people. The rich and varied mineral resources of the State have contributed handsomely towards the development and industrialization of the State.

The main rivers Mandovi and Zuari both flowing into the Arabian Sea are navigable by barges used for transporting the ore.

Achievements

1) "Reimbursement of Green Tax and Fitness fee to the mining affected truck owners scheme 2023":

The Government of Goa notified this scheme in February 2022-23 called "Reimbursement of Green Tax and Fitness fee to the affected truck owners minina scheme 2023" so as to provide financial assistance to the tipper truck owners who have been adversely affected due to the closure of all mining and related activities in the State of Goa.

The Financial benefit available under the scheme per tipper truck is reimbursement of fitness fee/green tax amounting to ₹ 17,900/- and 50% of late fee/penalty paid, if any. Till date Department has sanctioned 198 applications in regards to this scheme.

Two lease of Basalt and One lease for Laterite Stone has been granted under minor minerals section for the financial year 2023 - 24.

The Department has also streamlined process to collect online Royalty for various Government projects initiated by various Government Departments and also made a module to accept online Royalty and issue of online transit passes for Minor Minerals.

851 applications have been received till date. 200 applications are in the process of approval & 453 applications are in the process of verification. 198 applications have been sanctioned.

2) "Debt Relief Scheme for mining affected borrowers of financial institution":

It is targeted scheme, wherein who borrowers availed credit facilities for acquisition of barges, and trucks. tippers minina machinery/ equipment operating in the mining sector, from various financial institutions (Public, Private, Cooperative societies, NBFC,S and EDC) have been unable to meet their repayment commitments. As the physical targets such. it depends concerned. on the number of applications received. Details of "Debt Relief Scheme for minina affected borrowers financial institution" is given in Table No. 11.10

Ease of Doing Business (EoDB).

 Government has standardized the process for grants of permits for import of minor minerals under Rule 47 of MMDR, 1985 and implemented an online module from 5th October, 2022 and an amount of

E-Services to the Citizens/End to End digitization/Computerization:

- The Directorate has an integrated online Ore Management System for registration, payment and transportation of minerals including vehicle tracking system on Real Time Basis. All the permits of import & export, transit & sale of minerals is done online. Also processing fees charged for issuing permits is done through e-wallet.
- Public viewing web page for information on vehicle movement is made available to the general public on the official website of the Directorate of Mines & Geology under the Vehicle Tracking System.
- Online submission of documents for verification, renewals and registration of Vessel, Route and weighbridge is being carried out on Bhumija Portal, developed by GEL,Goa.

E-Auction of Ore & Dumps

 As per order of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India in writ petition (Civil) No. 435 of 2012, the State Government has floated single stage forward auction of 28th e- auction of

- the mineral ore/ stacks laying at various mines/ stackyard in the State of Goa on MSTC e-auction portal.
- As per Hon'ble Supreme Court vide order dated 13/12/2022, Government of Goa has notified dump policy on 14th September, 2023 for handling and auctioning of various dump located in different locations in the State of Goa and auctioning of the dump is under process.

Handicraft, Textile and Coir Kunbi Handloom Craft Village.

The major component of the Kunbi Handloom Craft Village is spread in an area of 5 acres in Salualim area in Sanguem District in Goa. The project envisages the following major compounds. In order to provide the suitable working space with all the facilities for the artisan, it is proposed to construct of Kunbi Handloom Craft Village.

The food courts are proposed with stalls of multiple cuisines serving various types of snacks as well as meals so as to cater to the tourist demand as well as the demand of the artisans. Government of India has in principle approved the project and sanctioned Rs. 10.00 crore for the same. The project is in tendering stage.

"SAMARTH" (Scheme for Capacity Building in Textiles Sector)

Samarth is a demand driven and placement-oriented umbrella skilling programme of Ministry of Textiles. The implementation period of the scheme is up to March 2024. The scheme was formulated under the broad skilling policy framework adopted by M/o Skill Development & Entrepreneurship.

Samarth aims to incentivize and supplement the efforts of the industry in creating jobs in the organized textile and

related sectors, covering the entire value chain of textiles, excluding Spinning and Weaving. The training programme and course curriculum have been rationalized keeping in view the technological and market demand of the domestic and international economies.

In addition to the entry level skilling, a special provision for up-skilling/ reprogramme has also been operationalized the under scheme towards improving the productivity of the existing workers Apparel in Garmenting segments. Samarth also caters to the up-skilling/ re-skilling requirement of traditional textile sector such as handloom, handicraft, silk and jute. During the current financial year (upto December 2023), 105 people have benefitted under the scheme.

Mahila Coir Yojana (MCY) for Value Added Products of the Ministry of MSME

MCY is being implemented by the Coir Board for the empowerment of women artisans in the coir sector with an aim to provide self employment opportunities to women artisans in regions processing coconut husk and provides scope for large scale employment as well as improvement of standard of living of rural women artisans. Four training programmes been have conducted and 80 women have benefitted under the programme during the current financial year (upto December 2023).

CHAPTER 12

TOURISM

Introduction

Goa is recognized as an International Tourist destination and Government of Goa focuses on implementing various innovations for development of resources in order to maintain International Standard to attract national and international tourists. Goa was selected as one of the States to host G20 Summits, wherein Government of Goa got the opportunity to showcase its international standard hospitality services to dignitaries from various G20 member countries invited during the Summit.

Goa is always highlighted for its unique beaches, however it is observed that preferences of tourists visiting Goa have undergone drastic change from beaches to hinterland, adventure and heritage tourism.

The State Government endeavors to augment the profile of the tourism industry by undertaking various infrastructure project to cater to the pressure of influx of tourists as well to offer best amenities to the visitors.

Tourist Arrivals

Goa with its beautiful pristine coastline, serene locations, hospitable people and unique rich culture has always been a preferred destination for the tourists from all over the world.

It is observed from table 12.1 that, there is an overall increase of 5.81% in the tourist arrivals of which domestic tourist show an increase of 2.61% while the arrival of foreign tourists have increased to 138.69% in 2023 (up to November 2023) as compared to 2022 due to

developed infrastructure in transport sector wherein Foreign and Domestic tourists are getting better facilities to arrive in Goa.

Goa is known for its hospitality and welcoming gestures towards tourists. This year Department has welcomed approximately 2300 tourists arrived from the first international Cruise ship, named 'Resilient Lady'. Also, Goa Tourism Department welcomed 250 foreign tourists who have arrived on the first International Charter Flight from Moscow, Russia on 1st October 2023, for the tourist season 2023-24.

 The Department has developed a Single Window System for registration of tourism activities and issuance of permission for minor events. During the year 2023-24 (till December 2023), permissions were granted for 11 major events wherein revenue amounting to ₹ 235.00 lakh was being collected and 92 minor events were held with a revenue collection of ₹ 52.53 lakh on account of license fee and other charges.

 The Revenue generated through Registration, Renewal and Lease is shown in Chart No. 12.1. It can be seen from the chart, that revenue for the year 2023-24 (up to December 2023) is increased by around 281% as compared to year 2018-19.

New Initiatives/ Schemes

 Collection of Crowd analytics of visitor footfalls and installation, operations & maintenance of digital advertising screens at various beach entrances

The Government has executed а "Master Services Agreement" on 05/10/2023 with a private entity M/s. BBIUR1 Media Private Limited, Salcete-South Goa, for installation of the digital advertising screens/ panels to display social messages, promote unexplored locations/ hinterlands, Goan culture and heritage, commercial advertisements as well as to collect tourists statistics on a real-time basis and submit periodical analytics of the same to the Department of Tourism.

Caravan Tourism Policy

notified Government has Caravan Tourism policy on 09/11/2023 aiming to promote new tourism products and to cater to the changing preferences of tourists. Financial incentives specifically designed to support Caravan operators for procurement/ development of Caravan vehicles. thereby fostering the growth of caravan tourism industry in the State.



Home-stay and Bed & Breakfast Policy

Government has approved Home-stay and Bed and Breakfast (B&Bs) Policy and notified it on 14/12/2023. The Policy is formulated to develop, promote and regulate home-stays and B&Bs in the State to supplement the availability of accommodation options and to enhance hinterland tourism. Special Incentives are provided to home-stays and B&Bs in seven talukas of Goa, viz. Sattari, Dharbandora, Sanguem, Bicholim, Ponda, Quepem, and Canacona.

• Village Development Scheme

Under this scheme, the Department will assist various villages, based on their potential such as demographics, natural attractions, potential for tourism development, etc. Presently, a proposal has been received from the Cotigao Village, Canacona for Construction of Adivasi Bazar (Tribal Market) at Navar Baddem.

Wellness Tourism

With the introduction of Ayush Visa for foreign nationals, Goa plans to become a prime Ayurveda and Wellness tourism hub. 72 Avush Health Wellness Centers (AHWCs) are operational in the State. 30 Part time Yoga Instructors are appointed for yoga sessions at AHWCs. Every AHWC has herbal garden, Non-Communicable Diseases (NCD) screenings, awareness for medicinal plants and common home remedies. Two Yoga Wellness Centre have been approved and Two Yoga instructors are presently working, one in each district.

• Regenerative Tourism

Department of Tourism has introduced the concept of Re-generative Tourism covering 11 spiritual sites. Regenerative tourism aims to transform the tourism industry by implementing sustainable practices that not only minimize environmental impact but also actively contribute to the regeneration of natural and cultural resources. The major goals of regeneration tourism are to protect natural ecosystems, promote cultural heritage, foster socio-economic development, educate on sustainability, encourage collaboration continuous research and innovation.

It involves implementing responsible tourism practices to minimize pollution and conserve resources, support local traditions and economies, empower communities, raising awareness. fostering partnerships, and exploring sustainable technologies. By focusing these objectives, regenerative on tourism in Goa aims to create a tourism industry that not only benefits visitors but also enhances the well-being of local communities and preserves the unique natural and cultural heritage of the region.

Rationalisation/ Improvement in existing schemes

Tourism Shack Policy

The New Tourism Shack Policy for erection of temporary seasonal structures, beach shacks, deck beds/ umbrellas for tourist season 2023-26 is formulated as per the suggestions and recommendations made by the various Departments and Shack Associations. Accordingly, the policy was approved and notified. Draw of lots for allotment of Shacks at North and South Goal beaches was conducted on 07/11/2023. Allotments of shacks at Goan beaches is already been done.

Hinterland tours

The Department through Goa Tourism Development Corporation (GTDC) has introduced various experiential tours to Raj Bhavan and Mayem and Canacona for the purpose of providing off beat tourism experiences to the tourists, which helps in exploring hinterlands of the State.

The Dudhsagar waterfalls, located in the Mollem National Park and Bhagwan Mahavir Wildlife Sanctuary are prime tourist locations in the State. The waterfalls provides an exciting range of adventures for explorers. GTDC, in association with the Forest Department has selected a service provider for conducting Monsoon Treks/Trails and regulating Jeep Safari at Dudhsagar Waterfalls.

Introduction of Experiential Tours and Treks through empanelled Operators

The GTDC has partnered with three agencies ("Empanelled Agencies") experienced in organising nature trails, architecture tours, heritage trails, village walks, spiritual trails, nature/bird

watching, camping, bike tours, food and culinary tours, brewery tours, etc.

GTDC has allowed these agencies to use its brand name to boost its services and increase the visibility of experiential tours in Goa and expects the agencies to provide standardised and quality services to all tourists. Empanelled Agencies will conceptualize tours and trails in Goa which will bring out unexplored tourism services and various points of interest in Goa. The Empanelled Agencies will also ensure that these tours are informative & interactive by exhibiting the best as well as the lesser known aspects of Goa to the tourists.

Promotion of Nature Education and Ecotourism in Protected Areas

Nature Interpretation Centre and Ecotourism Complexes are being strengthened in forests to create public awareness and provide nature and environmental education. These activities are done by involving local communities which will improve their livelihoods and provide gainful direct employment to the local people. Around 1.83 lakh tourists visited National Parks and Wildlife Sanctuaries and amount of ₹269.05 lakh of revenue was generated through Ecotourism and allied activities.

Subsidy/ Financial Assistance Schemes

 Tourist Trade Support (Working Capital Interest Subvention)
 Scheme 2021

"Tourism Trade Support Scheme" has been introduced to support the Micro, Small & Medium Enterprises (MSME's) in tourism industry which has been adversely affected due to Covid-19 pandemic by subsidizing the working capital loans for a 6-month period.

The benefits of this scheme is availed by M/s Tan Estates unit Panjim Inn (Hotel/Accommodation) and by M/s Purushottam Bhagvan Associates Panaji (Travel Agent/ Tour Operator) and an amount of ₹ 62,500/- has been sanctioned to each beneficiary.

International Charter Support (Waiver of Landing Fees) 2021

The scheme has been implemented to provide relaxation in landing charges of International Charters to Goa and to attract higher number of charters by reducing the burden on cost of operation of international chartered flights.

The benefit of this scheme is availed by M/s Minar Travels(India) Pvt. Ltd. Panaji, Goa amounting to ₹ 8,80,679/and by Air Astana, New Delhi amounting to ₹ 5,62,343/-.

Struggle," and "The People," museum offers a rich narrative of the region. Each area has interactive exhibits, meticulously designed to bring Goa's rich history and vibrant culture to life. Museum is created with combination of physical scenography and spatial audio integrated with mixed media story telling with 3D animation and visual effects.



Major achievements

Drishti Lifesaving Pvt. Ltd. 313 tourists were rescued from drowning at the beaches by the Lifeguards as on December 2023.
- Department has executed Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to express the mutual interest in exploring and developing a joint plan for bilateral co-operation in

Mukhyamantri Goencho Taxi Patrao Scheme

It is a programme launched by Goa Miles on 23rd March 2023 to help people who are in need to start taxi business. It provides financial assistance to those who cannot afford to buy new vehicle and start their own taxi business. This assistance covers only loans and down payment for acquiring a taxi. In all 120 Tourist

vehicles of different models have been handed over under the Scheme.

 Goa Miles is an Aggregator App connecting passengers with the drivers of tourist taxis for the purpose of hiring vehicles to reach destination. App service provides convenience to customer wherein one can book and get pickup/drop. Any taxi with valid permit can on-board under the App. At present there are more than 3100 taxis registered under this app.

Mhaji Bus scheme:

The scheme is aimed at improving efficiency in public transportation in the state by hiring private buses to improve services of the state-run Kadamba Transport Corporation Limited (KTCL). Majhi Bus Scheme is made operational on 17th August 2023.

As on date, 57 of buses are operating on routes such as Margoa-Canacona-Pollem, Margao-Quepem – Curchorem and Ponda – Usgao Tisk-Bicholim.

KADAMBA TRANSPORT CORRPORATION LTD (KTCL)

Major Achievements

 Zero Emission Goals: In order to maintain a balance between ecology and development the Government has taken various steps to reduce carbon emissions in the State. Faster Adoption Under and Manufacturing of Hybrid & Electric Vehicles (FAME) scheme, as on December 2023, 51 buses have been introduced in the State. This has resulted in saving 22.18 lakh liters of diesel and reduced carbon emission of around 5943 tons.

- **Automated** Collection Fare System: KTCL as successfully implemented Digital Ticketing software through Paytm. Now passengers can pay ticket fare using, One Goa One Card, Credit Card. Debit BHIM/Gpay/Paytm/Phone Pay and QR based mobile ticketing. The above action has resulted in ease of ticketing and multiple usage of card.
- The Department of Heavy Industries and Public Enterprises (MoHI&PE), Government of India had sanctioned additional 100 nos. of which one AC e-bus has been delivered and delivery of balance 99 buses is expected from February, 2024 onwards.
- Government has launched KTCL Goa Miles App during September 2023, which offers services of real time tracking of KTCL buses, integrated payments for KTC tickets.

Minor Ports

- Construction of Terminal Building: Work of Construction of the State of Art Iconic Terminal Building at Panaji Jetty is in progress, 67.44% of the work is carried out at an estimated cost of ₹ 28.00 crore. The project is expected to be ready by March 2024.
- Desilting/Dredging of River Sal:
 River Sal located in south Goa District has been desilted in 3 Phases to rejuvenate and to also facilitate smooth movement of Vessels.

Work has been completed on 14th May 2023 at a cost of ₹ 30.68 crore for 12.0 meters wide, 3.0 meters depth and 18 kms stretch.

Desilting/Dredging and cleaning of Assolna river, a tributary of river Sal has also been completed on 18th June 2023, The total length of desilting is 4.7 kms. and the cost of the same is ₹ 4.46 crore.

Additional works of desilting, a part of river Sal, including disposal of the dredged spoils at the designated disposal grounds, at Bapsora, Velim from Colleavaddo ferry point to the Assolna-Ambelim Boundary within an area of 1.45 kms. in length, 12.0 mtrs. wide and 2.5 mtrs. depth and Captain of Ports Jetty to Muxer within an area of 1.80 kms. in length, 25.0 mtrs. wide and 3.0 mtrs. depth is under process and the cost of the same is ₹7.14 crore.

- **Upgrading** the **Departmental** capabilities for hydrographic data acquisition: Government is in final stage of procuring the Single Beam Hydrographic Data Acquisition Processing System. This will enhance capabilities of the the Department to collect, monitor and update the critical bathymetric data of the rivers of Goa
- Redevelopment of Maritime school at Britona: Government has approved the re-development of existing Maritime School at Britona into a "Goa Institute of Maritime Excellence (GIME), on Design Build Finance Operate Transfer (DBFOT) basis to the successful single bidder, viz., M/s. Ganpat University, Gujarat. The letter of award to the bidder will be issued shortly.
- Registration/Renewal of Vessels: Total number of new vessels registered in the State for the current financial year, till November 2023 are 250. Already there are 6106 number of registered vessels in the State. Registration/Renewal of water sports boats through online mode has been initiated on Goa Online Portal and the same is in the evaluation stage.
- Participation at GMIS (Global Maritime India Summit) 2023:
 Government actively participated at Global Maritime India Summit 2023, Mumbai Maharashtra, The Department of Ports represented State maritime along with Fisheries

Tourism Department and presenting/promoting the development and investment opportunities in the state Maritime sector and secured 1st Place for Goa Pavilion Large Category amongst 12 Coastal states and Major stakeholders in Maritime Industry.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Public Works Department has undertaken 97 civil projects in the current financial year. 161 number of projects were completed in 2022-23 which were initiated in 2021-22 and 87 works and 156 works were completed in 2023-24 which were initiated in 2022-23 and 2021-22 or prior respectively.

From 2023-24, all the Government buildings are being maintained by Public Works Department in order to ensure smooth execution.

To ensure all the ongoing drinking water supply projects are executed in a time bound manner for its timely completion so that the benefits are extended to the general public, Government has spent so far over ₹ 75.25 crore during this current financial year upto December 2023. During the same period ₹ 557.57 crore have been spent on improvement of riding quality surface, widening, good all weather roads with major emphasis on village road across the State. An expenditure of ₹ 143.13 crore has been incurred for improvement sewerage and sanitation sector.

The Government has undertaken the work of providing and Fixing smart water meters for advanced meter Reading including Operation and Maintenance of the System for 5 years for Panaji City at a tendered cost of ₹ 854.56 lakh excluding GST and Department charges. Government is thriving to improve the quality of living and enhancing 'ease of living' of people of

Goa by use of modern technology in monitoring of the system and to capture service delivery data automatically for ensuring the quality of services. This will forego the usual trend of taking meter readings manually by visiting every household. Billing cycle will regularized as bills will be generated online. It will also help to monitor near real-time consumption patterns which will help to regulate water leakages and faults, provide accurate billing, and improve engagement with customers. The project is in final stage of completion. The Pilot project with 100 Smart meters is successfully completed. Online bills are generated for last 10 months.

The construction of New Zuari Bridge was completed and was made operational. This Bridge has made the connectivity from North Goa to South Goa hassle free. Sanction has been granted to 6 lane elevated road at Porvorim. This project envisages construction of 5.15 km long flyover on single pier through heavily congested Porvorim area having traffic over 75000 Passenger Car Unit (PCU) per day. The Construction of this project will remove the traffic bottleneck between North Goa Panaji and South Goa. construction of 4 lane bypass In Bicholim is 93 % completed and will be completed soon.

The construction of 25 MLD Water Treatment plant at Ganjem is 91% MLD Water completed and 15 Treatment Plant at Chandel is expected to be completed by May 2024. The construction 10 MLD of Treatment Plant at Pale is completed and 30 MLD Water Treatment Plant at Tuem is under construction and the works is expected to be completed by December 2024. Currently the works of improvement of Water Supply in St. Andre and Cumbharjua Constituency is

under execution and the overall progress is 91% and 97% respectively.

Trial runs of Kavlem Sewerage Treatment Plant (STP) are in progress. Testing of Sewer network and rectification of leakages is in progress. 95% sewer network is laid in Curti and 50% sewer network is laid in Bandora.

Sewerage Network in Colva is 95% completed. Work of effluent disposal line is completed and alteration of Electro Mechanical works in Sewerage Treatment Plant (STP) is completed & ready for commissioning. Work of House sewer connections in Colva is in progress and 100% road crossings are completed. House connections will be released once STP and network are commissioned in Colva.

Around 95% Sewer network in Navelim is completed. 7 Pumping Station are required to be constructed in order to commission the network. Out of 7 Pumping Stations, 1 Pumping Station is ready for commissioning at Davorlim, 6 Pumping Station are under various stages of construction. Navelim Sewerage Scheme is expected to be commissioned by May 2024 onwards in phased manner.

Fatorda and Margao Sewer Network-Rehabilitation of North Trunk Main: Total Length of North Trunk Main is 7.2 kms. Out of 7.2 kms, stretch from Old Market Circle to STP at Shirvodem which is 3.5 kms is commissioned. Stretch from Presentation school to Old Market Circle of 1.9 kms length is in commissioning Stage. With respect to last stretch from Arlem Circle to Presentation school, sewer line laying and construction of manholes are under construction.

Work on Sewerage scheme for Taleigao and its surrounding areas is under

execution. Presently 8.50 kms network is laid. Also, work on Sewerage scheme for Porvorim and its surrounding areas is under execution. 40 kms sewer network is already laid. Work of STP has been started and presently foundation of basin is completed. Similarly the laying of Trunk main as per revised STP location are in progress.

Under Sewerage scheme for Curchorem Municipal area and surrounding areas, laying of 31.92 kms sewer line with construction of 840 manholes is completed & nearly 3.125 kms of sewer line and 75 Manholes is under construction.

The details of important works completed during the last five years under Buildings and Road Sectors is given in Annexure - 40.

GSIDC. wholly а owned State Government company is a Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) for speedy implementation of all the Infrastructural Projects, envisaged by the Government like Roads, Bridges, Fly-Overs, Bus-Stands, Hospitals, Office Buildings, Tourism related Projects, etc., all over the State. The works carried out by the Corporation during the last five years is given in Table No.13.12

URBAN DEVELOPMENT

- An amount of ₹ 325.50 crore released for Smart City Project under Smart City Mission.
- An amount of ₹ 62.02 crore released under Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation (AMRUT) 1.0.
- Allocated ₹ 85.00 crore under Atal Mission for Rejuvenation and Urban Transformation (AMRUT) 2.0.

Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM-U) 2.0

Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM-U) 2.0 was launched on October 1, 2021 for a period of five years with a vision of achieving Garbage Free Status for all cities through 100% source segregation, door to door collection and scientific management of all fractions of waste including safe disposal in scientific landfills.

As a part of SBM-U 2.0, all 14 Urban Local Bodies achieved Open Defecation Free and Open Defecation Free Plus status. 12 ULB's have applied for ODF+ recertification. Results are awaited.

Under Solid Waste Management component. construction of toilets. Material Recovery Facilities and Biomethanisation (5 TPD) are ongoing.

Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana

The aim of this scheme is to provide assistance to the EWS financial beneficiaries from Housing for all Plan of Action (HFAPoA) for new construction/ enhancement of existing houses.

₹ 65.00 crore expenditure has been 2,800 incurred for construction of houses under the scheme since its inception.

Deendayal Antyodaya National **Urban Livelihoods Mission (DAY-**NULM)

The scheme was launched on 23rd September 2013. A total of 1145 Self-Help Groups (SHGs) have been formed till December 2023, since the inception of the scheme. In this current financial year 38 groups have been formed and 36 SHGs have been given one-time revolving fund of ₹10,000/- each. Total ALFs (Area Level Federations) formed is 01 and 05 ALFs have been given onetime revolving fund of ₹50,000/- each in 2023-24.

City Livelihoods Centres are set up in Cuncolim, Mormugao, Curchorem and Bicholim Municipal Councils to create a platform wherein the urban poor Self Help Groups (SHGs) can market their goods and services in an organized manner. One individual and 3 SHGs have been given loans under the Self Employment Programme with interest subsidy over and above 7% in the current financial year. Under the Employment through Skill Training and Placement (EST&P) component of DAY-NULM, 458 candidates have been trained in Self-employed Tailor, Senior Beauty Therapist and Senior Associate Desktop Publishing courses.

PM Street Vendor's Aatmanirbhar Nidhi (PM SVANidhi)

The Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs had launched the scheme on 1st June, 2020, a Special Micro-Credit Facility Scheme for providing collateral free working capital loan upto ₹10,000/-₹20,000/-(2nd (1st tranche loan), tranche loan) and ₹50,000/- (3rd tranche loan) to the Street Vendors in order to address the hardships faced by the street vendors and to resume their livelihoods that have been adversely affected due to COVID-19 pandemic consequent lockdowns. duration of the scheme is till December. 2024. The achievement are the scheme is given in Table No. 13.14.

Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM-U) 2.0

Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM-U) 2.0 was launched on October 1, 2021 for a period of five years with a vision of achieving Garbage Free Status for all cities through 100% source segregation, door to door collection and scientific

management of all fractions of waste including safe disposal in scientific landfills.

As a part of SBM- U 2.0, all 14 Urban Local Bodies achieved Open Defecation Free and Open Defecation Free Plus status. 12 ULBs have applied for ODF+ recertification wherein results are awaited.

All the Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) have setup Material Recovery Facilities (MRF) in the State of Goa and all the dry waste is segregated in this MRF Facilities. The State is working on upgrading the existing MRF Facilities under the scheme.

Bio Methanation Plants: The Corporation of the City of Panaji (CCP) has set up decentralised biomethanation plants of total capacity upto 5 TPD at various locations in the City. Mapusa, Margao Municipal Canacona and Councils have setup 5 TPD Biomethanations plants each. Small capacity plants of 500 kgs. (0.5 TPD) has been setup at Valpoi, Quepem, Curchorem-Cacora, Sanguem, Cuncolim and Pernem.

Incinerators: The State has installed 1.5 TPD incinerators for domestic hazardous waste at Mapusa, Cuncolim, Ponda and Bicholim Municipal Council.

Effluent Treatment Plant, Sewerage, Collection and Disposal: Sewerage networks have been installed in Panjim, Ponda, Mapusa, Mormugao and Margao. The waste from other ULBs is sent via night soil tankers to nearby STPs Panjim (St.Inez), Baina, Navelim, Bicholim, Ponda where the waste is treated through SBR technology. The excess wet waste from the Corporation of the City of Panaji (CCP) is sent to Saligao Plant for treatment.

Master Plan For Towns

Master plan creation of Valpoi, Ponda & Mormugao is underway and will be completed by 31st March, 2024.

GIS Based Survey of ULB properties

The GIS based survey of properties of urban local bodies is underway. The main objective of this exercise is to assess tax accurately, ensure that all dwelling units are brought under the tax ambit, management of properties and ensure that new constructions are carried out as per approved plans.

In addition, a number of Map/Data layers which will be created based on the survey department will be shared with various departments through the One Map Goa/PM Gati Shakti - National Master Plan (NMP) platforms. This will them to make facilitate informed decisions when it comes to management of resources for development by adopting the Geo-Spatial analysis features. This is the key take away of this project. As on date, work in Bicholim Municipal Council is completed whereas Mapusa, Pernem and Sanguelim is in progress.

E-Governance Services rendered through online platform

Digitization & Processing of Property Tax Data: Property tax assessment, calculation and collection is digitized and back office operational through а (MAS) developed application National Informatics Centre (NIC) and is available to the public at large via web/mobile applications. Presently, the property tax data, managed by NIC, is being integrated with the property register wherein a unique property identity code is assigned to all properties is made accessible through www.goaulbservice.gov.in and Goa Online portal.

Tax assessment/liability and online payment: Citizens are able to know their tax liability and also assess their tax through the www.goaulbservice.gov.in portal. The department has leveraged existing payment platforms to facilitate the collection of taxes. Payment of taxes can now be made through GPay, PayTM, Net Banking, Debit Card and so forth. Door-to-door collection services for house taxes, licenses and rentals handheld Point of Sale (POS) devices is done.

Building Permits: Pursuant to the issuance of the Technical Clearance Certificates, digitally signed Construction Licenses and Occupancy Certificates are issued through software applications. Physical visits are greatly reduced, and licenses are issued within 3 weeks.

Processing of applications for trade licenses & income certificates, issuance of Birth & Death certificates, collection of leased shop rentals and other miscellaneous services which are specific to councils, like booking of halls and Night Soil tankers and pet registration are done through online mode.

All the above services are developed and maintained just by engaging 2 developers from Infotech Corporation of Goa Limited (ITG). Now the services are being integrated on the National Urban Digital Mission (NUDM) platform Urban Platform for deliverY of Online Governance (UPYOG) and will soon be available on the National Portal. Goa is the 5th State to be boarded on this platform.

SMART CITIES MISSION

The core infrastructure elements in a Smart City includes - adequate water

assured electricity supply, supply, sanitation, including waste solid management, efficient urban mobility public transport. robust ΙT connectivity and digitalization, good governance, sustainable environment, safety and security of citizens. particularly women, children and the elderly, and health and education.

Under the Ease of doing Business (EoDB) the Department have launched online services namely Application for Initial NOC, Final NOC, renewal of NOC and Fire / Incident report under eDistrict Mission Mode Project to provide online platform for the citizens to apply for services.

During the last 5 years from 2019 to 2023, Fire & Emergency services have attended 13590 fire emergency calls and 22874 non fire emergency calls. Property worth ₹ 348.79 crore have been saved due to timely action taken by fire personal.

In order to make Goa disaster proof Government has trained 14369 number of people under Fire and Emergency Services and 12806 fire prevention

inspections have been conducted during the last 5 years.

The Fire & Emergency services from last 5 years with ample support of Government of Goa have purchased 9 Quick response fire vehicles, 01 Emergency Rescue Vehicle, 02 Water tender vehicle, 02 Water Bouser and 01 Advance multipurpose vehicle.

Infrastructure Projects

- The Re-designing and Reconstruction of existing Building and additional Construction of new Administrative and Training Block" at Fire Force Headquarters is in final stage of completion and will be inaugurated in the current financial year.
- The Construction of New Building for Fire Station at Bicholim is in progress is likely to be completed in the next financial year 2024-25.
- The construction of new Building for Fire Station at Valpoi is in progress and likely to be completed in the current financial year 2024-25.
- The construction work of new Fire Station Building at Vasco is in progress.

Water Resources Department

To ensure water resources availability in terms of quantity and quality at all times Government has initiated several developmental works in the State. The works of some projects are ongoing and some have been completed.

Achievements

 Inter-state Tillari irrigation project was completed at a cost of ₹1465.80 in March 2023. Under this project,

- 6933 ha. land has been brought under irrigation and 200 MLD raw water was supplied for Domestic use.
- National Cyclone Mitigation Project (NCRMP) was completed on September 2023 at risk cost ₹116.35 crore. This project has enhanced the State preparedness and developed cyclone resilient infrastructure and capacity building along the coastline of 135 kms. of the state.
- Construction of floodwater pumping station at Mala Panaji was completed in May 2023 at a cost ₹16 crore. This projects will benefit Flood Control Measures in Panjim.
- Sustainable use of mining pit water for irrigation in Bicholim and Sattari Taluka: Project was completed in the month of May 2023 at a cost ₹16.00 crore. This project will benefit in providing irrigation water for mining affected areas.
- Box Conduit at Quepem and Paroda project was completed in May 2023 at a cost ₹13.00 crore.
- The project "Centre of Excellence at Margao" was completed in the month of December 2023 at a cost of ₹ 6.00 crore. This project will act as a centre to promote scientific studies under Hydrology.
- Amrit Sarovar Mission was launched by Hon'ble Prime Minister on National Panchayati Raj Day on 24/04/2022 aimed at developing and rejuvenating 75 water bodies in each district of the country as a part of celebration of Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav. The State Government has already rejuvenated 164 water bodies in the State.

Building Plan Approval Management System (BPAMS)

Building Plan Approval Management System (BPAMS) is a new revolutionary tool implemented by Town & Country Planning Department (TCP), Government of Goa to help speed up the process of building plan compliance check in accordance with building bylaws of TCP-GOA.

Its high speed and accuracy is a boon to all stakeholders. Within minutes it is capable of analysing the building plans and generates a set of Reports, which are comprehensive and easily understandable to all stake holders.

The BPAMS system introduced by TCP, Goa focuses on efficiency, transparency, accountability and responsiveness thereby speeding the approval process and enhancing the ease of doing business.

Other Achievements

The process of registering professionals like Notary Architect/Notary Engineers, Engineers, Structural Engineers,

Landscape Architect, Urban Designer and Town Planner under the Goa Development and Building Construction Regulations, 2010 is continued by the Department. The total number of **Professionals** registered under Goa Land Development and Building Construction 2010 Regulations, (GLDBCR) is 54 for the calendar year 2023 till 29th November and total number of renewals of registration under GLDBCR, 2010 is 78 for the calendar 2023 vear 29th November.

- For speedy disposal of Government projects, Chief Architect has been empowered to grant Technical Clearances Development Permission and Completion order for building designed by his office.
- Also, in case of Material Recovery Facilities and Solid Waste Management Structure of the Local authorities, the concerned engineers of Municipal Councils /Corporation /Directorate of Panchayat /Assistant Manager of Goa Waste Management Corporation having engineering specialization have been empowered to grant Technical Clearances / Development permission and completion order.
- Issue of Zoning Certificate and NOC under section 49(6) through online mode has commenced from 21/07/2023.
- Recommendation of Conversion application under Land Revision Code (LRC) has been made Online.

- Amendment to "The Goa Town and Country Planning Act, 1974 (Goa Act No.21 of 1975) by providing for preparation of Zoning Plan for villages and Town which do not fall under planning area and under jurisdiction of Planning and Development Authorities.
- To decriminalize certain provision of the Goa Town and Country Planning Act 1974 by removing the imprisonment provision for minor offence under Section 110,115 and 123 while increasing the fines in case of Section 110 and 123 and to

- improve disciplinary action under Section 115 of the said Act.
- Insertion of new Section 99A in the said Act so as to enable the Planning and Development Authority and the Government to engage function agencies/ consultation for preparation of Plan.
- Amendment to Section 17 of the Act to provide for alteration/modification of Regional Plan for accommodating and promoting projects/schemes in furtherance to tourism development, economic and environmental policies of the State which will not materially alter the overall character of Regional Plan 2021, and also to rectify errors in Regional Plan by way of procedures to be notified by way of rules.

ELECTRICITY DEPARTMENT

Solar Roof Top/Solar Energy

The Goa State Solar Policy was notified on 7th February 2019 and was subsequently amended on 6th August 2020. The policy is further amended on 23rd March 2023 to allow consumers with demand load of 1MW and above to take power under Open Access from Solar project during day time generation and during the peak hours (6 pm to 11 pm) through Battery Enabled Storage System with maximum of 15% of demand of the State.

The State has generated almost 8 times more solar power i.e 41.64 MUs as compared to 2019-20. The total no. of solar connections in the State of Goa as on 31/12/2023 is 1134 and the total solar capacity installed is 53.03 MWp. The total solar power generation during the last five years is given in Table No. 13.16 below.

The following are the achievements under various schemes:

Deen Dayal Upadhyay Gram JyotiYojana (DDUGJY)

- Replacement of 94,187 LT Meters with Electronic meters.
- Three Villages Electrification under Sansad Adarsh Gram Yojana (SAGY) at Khola, Ibrahampur and Rachol was completed.

Under Integrated Power Development Scheme (IPDS)

- Replacement of 1,29,551 LT meters with Electronic meters.
- Installation of solar roof top at 15 substations in Goa thereby generating total 410KWP solar power.
- The Real Time Data Acquisition System (RT-DAS) has also been implemented at substations for identification of Reliability indices such as SAIDI and SAIFI.
- Work of erection of 33/11KV ,2x20 MVA Gas insulated Substation (GIS) at Navelim in South Goa, Altinho – Panaji and Calangute in North Goa.

Other Achievements

 A new 220/33KV, 63 MVA transformer was commissioned at the Thivim substation at the total project cost of ₹40 crore to cater the increasing loads of North Goa district along with the proposed loads at Tuem Industrial estate.

- A new 110/33KV, 50 MVA transformer was commissioned at Verna Substation to enhance power supply reliability and availability for the Industrial consumers at Verna Industrial estate besides catering to the loads of Sancoale, Vasco and surrounding areas. The total cost of the project is ₹12 crore.
- The work order was issued for Design, Supply, Erection, Testing and Commission of 3x63 MVA, 220/33KV State of the Art GIS substation at Saligao along with 220KV Double circuit line from Thivim substation for an amount of ₹370.89 crore. The substation will drastically improve the voltage profile of North Goa district besides increasing power availability in the region.
- The Electricity Department has also undertaken number of projects across Goa for conversion of Overhead system to underground cabling for an estimated cost of ₹1450 crore.
- The work of Supply, Erection, Testing and Commissioning of 220/33KV, 63 MVA transformer at Ponda is in progress and is expected to be completed by March, 2024. The total cost of the project is ₹42 crore. The substation will cater the loads of the Ponda taluka and the surrounding areas.
- The work for Supply, Erection, Testing and Commissioning of 2x20 MVA, 33/11KV substation at Mandrem at a cost of ₹55 crore is completed and commissioned. The proposed substation will benefit the consumer along the coastal belt of Mandrem, Arambol, Morjim, etc.
- The work for Supply, Erection, Testing and Commissioning of 2x20 MVA, 33/11KV substation at Tuem will be completed within another 3 months. This substation will cater to the proposed industrial loads of the Tuem Industrial Estate.

- The Electricity Department has recently migrated all its systems and processes from the Data Centre at Kadamba plateau, Goa to MS Azure Cloud.
- The Department is also in the process of implementation of HR Management in Systems Applications and Products in Data Processing (SAP) for online maintaince of all employee data and records, online performance management system and for online attendance and payroll system.
- The Department has also implemented of e-office for faster processing of the document and to achieve paperless operations. All new documents will be scanned and properly stored so that they can be retrieved easily as and when required.
- The Electricity Department has devised 10 packages under Revamped Distribution Sector Scheme to include various projects aimed in improving power supply quality and reliability. This projects are related to replacement of old / Distribution Transformer fraved Centres, providing new Distribution Transformer Centres, conductoring of old / frayed 33KV overhead conductors, 11KV and LT Underground Cabling works, RMUs for 11KV cabling works along with IT/OT works. Work orders has been issued for 10 infrastructure works amounting to ₹300 crore.
- The tender for installation of 7.5 Lakh Smart Metering works under Revamped Distribution Sector Scheme is floated and the order is expected to be issued within next 2 months.

 The Department is also in the process of implementation of Enterprise Resource Planning for under IT/OT works of Revamped Distribution Sector Scheme. The estimated project cost is about ₹38 crore.

The list of Infrastructure projects approved during the current financial year is given in Annexure - 42.

CIVIL AVIATION

Manohar International Airport at Mopa, Goa is developed & operated by GMR Goa International Airport Limited in partnership with Government of Goa on PPP Model successfully with an initial investment of ₹ 3,400 crore. Phase I of the airport catering to the needs of 4.4 Million Passenger Per Annum (MPPA) with requisite basic infrastructure and world class facilities, was inaugurated on 11th Dec 2022. Thereafter, airport domestic commenced its 5thinternational operations effective January 2023 and 21st July 2023 respectively in effective collaboration with various departments of State and Central Government.

The Airport has completed its maiden year of operation with flying colours and secured 47% of Goa's air passenger traffic, by connecting 25 domestic and 5 international destinations serving 3.7 Million passengers as on 31st December 2023. It also employed 1,800 Goans in qualifying operations by employing 1,200 Goans through its Aviation Skill Development Centre. Currently, on an average it handles about 100 air traffic movements and 15,000 passengers per day. The airport has also received excellent positive passenger reviews and enjoys one of the highest engagements on social media platforms for airports. It has also received prestigious awards

Sustainability Airport Award at International Airport Reviews, CII Design Excellence Award, Martequity Awards 2023 (Marketing Tech Awards by Economic Times) to name a few. It is ranked among the top 15 airports of the country according to the reports from Airport Authority of India.

Going forward, Manohar International Airport intends to connect more than 40 destinations, across both domestic & international, and aims to secure more than 50% of Goa's air passenger traffic. In that mission, it's also getting ready by expanding its operations to Phase III (Stage 1) capacity requirements as per the Commercial Airport (CA) to cater to 8 Million Passengers per annum with an additional investment of about ₹ 200 crore. In this journey, it endeavours to socially responsible, be а environmentally sustainable airport living expectations up to the stakeholders.

Aviation Skill Development Centre (ASDC) has been set up at Manohar International Airport at Mopa to impart Skill and training to youth with a priority to train and generate employment to Goans.

Till date 1215 have been imparted ASDC training and 1086 have been employed at Manohar International Airport. The Airport has employed total of 3560 persons out of which 1792 are Goans and 1768 are non Goans.

CHAPTER 14

SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY & ENVIRONMENT

DEPARTMENT OF SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY AND ENVIRONMENT

The Department of Science Technology and Waste Management deals with the subject of popularization promotion Science and of and Technology in the State through various programmes /projects implemented with the active support of Goa State Council for Science and Technology, Goa State Innovation Council, various NGOs and Researchers/research Institutions in the field of Science and Technology.

The Department is mandated with Management of Solid Waste and other wastes, generated in the State through safe and scientific methods, which is achieved through Goa Waste Management Corporation.

The Department has implemented a "Scheme for providing Grant-in-aid to conduct Science Seminars, Workshops, Awareness Programmes, Exhibitions etc. and to travel in India and Abroad to attend training/workshops.

During the current financial year 2023-24 (till December 2023), 11 schools / colleges/ research institutions have been provided grant-in-aid of ₹ 8.40 lakh to organize Science exhibitions/ seminars etc.

Besides, 04 researchers/faculties from Colleges/University have been provided with grant of ₹ 4.41 lakh to visit abroad to participate in the Science Conferences to present their research papers.

Goa State Council for Science and Technology is also supported with a financial grant of ₹1.96 lakh under this scheme.

Under "Scheme for Researchers in the field of Science and Technology and Innovation and for Projects of Students as a Part of Curriculum and to Publish Publications Books etc. in the field of Science, Technology and Innovations", 16 Students of Schools/Colleges/University/ Individual Researchers have been given grant-in-aid amounting ₹ 44.79 lakh to take up research projects in Science and Technology.

So also, 06 groups of students from Engineering Colleges / Polytechnic from Goa have been financially supported under this scheme by releasing a total grant of ₹ 6.49 lakh to complete their final year projects.

Apart from above grants, the Department has released ₹ 1352.50 lakh to different NGOs / Government / Corporations/Autonomous bodies to take up different initiatives/projects.

Grant-in-aid amounting to ₹ 1.50 lakh have been provided to three Schools to participate in Science Exhibitions and also to visit places of scientific repute in India in which 40% reservation is kept for ST students.

In addition, following three new schemes have been notified

- (a) Scheme to encourage students for Innovative projects
- (b) Goa Rajya Vidnyanik Puraskar.

(c) Manohar Parrikar Yuva Scientist Award

Major achievements:

Department has successfully completed the project Mapping of (S&T) needs of the State in consonance with the Sustainable Development Goals" in April 2023 and has identified the important sectors. The Department has organized Sustainable Lifestyle Workshops under the Ministry Environment, Forest & Climate Change (MOEFCC)- Environment Education Programme (EEP) in the State, and has trained more than 200 eco club teachers in the months of July & August, 2023.

The National Nature Camping Program (NNCP) for the Eco Clubs of the State was implemented by the Goa State Council for Science and Technology during the month of November till January, 2024.

The Department has participated in the 2ndedition of GI (Geographical Indications) fair India held from 20th to 24th July, 2023 at India Expo Centre & Mart, Greater Nodia. Annual "Science Film Festival, 2023" event was held in April, 2023 through Vidnyan Parishad Goa.

The Government has obtained the GI tag for Goan popular produce Goan Bebinca, Goa Mankurad Mango, Agsechi Vaiygem, Goa Cashew and Sat Shiro Bheno. Besides this, the GI applications for Mussarate Mango, Goan Sausage and Kunbi Saree are under process.

The Department through Goa State Innovation Council has set up Rapid Prototyping Lab at Don Bosco College of Engineering, Fatorda which is a home to a variety of State - of - the - Art

prototyping equipment for the innovators in Goa.

The Goa State Innovation Council has conducted overall a total of 521 workshops & training programs and a total of 41,516 participants were trained in the workshops & training programs.

National Mathematics Day & National Science Day Celebrated

The Goa State Council for Science and (GSCST) Technology celebrated Mathematics day on 19/04/2023 and Science Day on 26/04/2023 at Goa Chambers of Commerce and Industry, Panaji, Goa in order to give respect and tribute to great Scientists. Students from various schools have participated in the above programmes. During these two events a State Level Competition was conducted "Power Point on Presentation" & Poster/quiz competition highlighting contributions of Mathematicians and "Global Science for Global Well Being" and the winners were honoured with prizes.

Solid Waste Management Facilities

Common Bio-Medical Waste Treatment and Disposal Facility (CBWTDF) at Kundaim.

A State- of- Art CBWTDF is set up on Public Private Partnership (PPP) basis. The CBWTDF has collected and treated 2713 tons of biomedical waste till October, 2023 since its inception in the year 2022. 903 tons of biomedical waste has been treated in the financial year 2023-24.

Common Hazardous Waste Treatment, Storage & Disposal Facility (CHWTSDF) at Pissurlem.

Goa Waste Management Corporation along with Goa Industries Environmental Management Association has

established a CHWTSDF for the State of Goa.

E-Waste Management in the State of Goa.

The construction work of the E-Waste **Management plant** in Pissurlem Industrial Estate **has** started in December, 2022 and the work is in progress and is expected to be completed by May, 2024.

Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR):GWMC has collected ₹ 4.00 lakh under EPR fees from Producers, Importers and Brand Owners in the year 2023-24.

Environment

Department of Environment (DoE) was established with the aim to promote environment related projects for conservation and upgradation of environment and abatement of pollution in the State is undertaken through various schemes.

The State Climate Cell has begun official activation procedures to request appointment of a Departmental Nodal Officer and Assistant Nodal Officer for operationalization, implementation and monitoring of the State Action Plans on Climate Change(SAPCC) at 60 Government Departments and other key organisations.

A total of 43 coastal Biodiversity Management Committees have been identified as priority and taken under the wings of Goa State Climate Change Cell (GSCCC) as potential vulnerable areas to the impacts of climate change. Other areas in the State marked in the SAPCC are also part of the baseline study.

GoVan project has directly benefited 25 women who are actively engaged at Multi-product Processing Centers. The

GoVan project remains committed to creating opportunities for women in the community, fostering inclusivity, and promoting sustainable livelihoods through the active participation of all community members. This project has successfully empowered the lives of approximately 50 local farmers wherein raw material is directly purchased from them through direct engagement.

Value addition within the GoVan project embraced sustainable practices, such as eco-friendly packaging. This not only aligned with conservation goals, but also catered to a growing market demand for environmentally conscious products.

The project encouraged establishment of community-based enterprises involved in value addition. This fostered a sense of community ownership and cooperation. ordering of GoVan consistent hampers by Government Departments, private agencies/organizations, other individuals reflects the widespread recognition and appreciation for the project's initiatives.

The approval of 10 more Multi-product Processing Centres (MPPCs) through the District Mineral Foundation (DMF) signifies a strategic move towards supporting livelihoods and fostering sustainable development in mining-affected regions allowing diversification of economic activities in mining-affected districts.

Cleanliness of beaches is of utmost importance in Goa being a tourist destination. Therefore a 'Mega Beach Cleaning Campaign' was held on 21stMay, 2023 under the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, to spread awareness of keeping surroundings garbage free.

Goa State Wetland Authority (GSWA)

GSWA has taken policy decisions which include the categorization of Wetlands into Category I (Pristine wetlands) and Category II (Urban wetlands), curtailing the Zone of influence of wetlands to inlet channels and 25% slope and 5m around the existing constructions to be excluded while notifying a wetland.

A total of fifteen (15) Wetlands have been notified and 29 wetlands have been drafted to be notified under Wetland (Conservation and Management) Rules 2017, in the State of Goa.

GSWA has notified and constituted Lake Management Committees as a part of integrated management plan for notified Wetlands. This is one of a kind initiative taken up by GSWA for convergence of governance.

Goa State Wetland Authority has taken another initiative to undertake restoration of water bodies using traditional methods which does not alter/harm the existing ecological characteristics of water bodies. it promotes public participation in conservation of water bodies and associated ecosystems with abundant natural resources. Total 644596 numbers of saplings distributed under Mopa Airport Plantation programme and other Talukas across Goa for the last 5 years.

The Government has completed the process for preparation of Coastal Zone Management (CZM) Plan, 2011 as per CRZ Notification 2011 and the Ministry of Environment Forest and Climate change has notified the CZMP-2011 in 1.25000 scale and CZMP-2011 in 1:4000 scale is under submission.

Ministry of Environment, Forest & Climate Change has released an

amount of ₹ 40.52 lakh to National Centre for Earth Science Studies, Kerala as 1sinstalment for Preparation of CZMP 2019 and will be completed in the month of April / May, 2024. Government has prepared a draft Zonal Master Plan for Ecologically Sensitive areas around Wildlife protected land in the State of Goa.

Forest

The State of Goa has been very proactive in conservation of Forest and Wildlife in the present scenario of climate change and Global Warming. Goa with its 3702 sq.km has good forest cover with 1,225.12 Sq. Km of recorded Government forest which is over 33% of the total geographical area of the State. Out of this 62% is designated as 6 protected areas along the biodiversity rich and ecologically sensitive Western Ghats. The Forest Department is entrusted with protection, management and development of forests and wildlife.

Tree plantation for qualitative improvement of Forests

58405 mangroves are planted in an area of 37 hectares. Total 901.5 hectares plantation has been completed under Compensatory Afforestation scheme and assisted natural regeneration in degraded forests including 288.5 hectares plantation in fire affected areas.

Celebration of Vanmahotsav

The Department has organized 31 extensive plantation programmes in various parts of the State as part of three-month long Vanmahotsav from July- September, 2023. Vanmahtosav is celebrated as part of awareness for trees plantation and forest conservation. During Vanmahotsav 2023, around 2.04 lakh tree saplings including ornamental and medicinal plants were distributed

free of cost to the public and various Government and Non-Government Institutions. The Department has organised 174 such extensive plantation programmes in various parts of Goa during last five years.

Soil & Water Conservation Measures

The Department is working consistently to improve water regime and soil fertility of the forest and surrounding area. The Department has constructed 38766 Staggered trenches, 35 check dams, 10 water bodies and 3Bore- wells till date in the FY 2023-24 as measures of soil and water conservation by involving local people and those belonging to the Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe communities residing in the remote areas of Goa thereby improving their socio economic condition.

Nursery of 16000 seedlings covering 81 hectare area of new Canes/ Bamboos, plantations have been raised in degraded forests areas involving local population thereby generating local employment.

Protection of Wildlife

The 72ndWildlife Week was celebrated from 02nd to 8th October, 23 with the theme "Partnership for Conservation". Events such as rangoli competition, essay writing in (Konkani, Marathi, Hindi & English), Wildlife Quiz Competition and Photography competition for college students. Poster competition for high school students, drawing competition for primary students and specially abled students were organized.

To mitigate human animal conflict, this Department maintains 24 x 7 Rescue Squad/ Centre at Campal, Margao and Cotigao for rescuing wild animals under stress.

A total of 5587 number of wild animals were rescued and re-habilitated during the current financial year(till October, 2023). The details are given in Table No: 14.1

Under Sansad Adarsh Gram Yojana, the Forest Department has successfully carried out erection of 6 running km. solar power fence in Ibrampur village of Pernem Taluka. This has minimized human animal conflict in this region.

Protection of Tiger Reserve initiative by the Department

Tiger Reserves are designated habitats for the conservation of Tigers and their prey base. Under the Wildlife Protection Act, 1972, a tiger reserve is legally mandated to designate a critical core area over which human habitation and resource extraction is not permitted. The area is encircled by a buffer zone that permits multiple human activities which give precedence to conservation objectives. Over the years, Tigers have been spotted in Goa in the part of Western Ghats.

Turtle Conservation Program

Goa has four notified Olive Ridley Turtle nesting zones viz., Morjim, Mandrem, Agonda and Galgibag which are protected by the Forest Department. During the turtle nesting season 158 nests of Olive Ridley Turtles have been recorded in the coast of Goa. Out of

13,748 eggs laid, 8989 turtle hatchlings were released.

Training and capacity building of all stake holders including local people is carried out for scientific management and professional handling of stranded marine animals along the coastline from time to time, during the year more than 600 people were trained.

Promotion of Nature Education and Ecotourism in Protected Areas:

Nature Interpretation Centre and Ecotourism Complexes are being strengthened in forests to create public awareness and provide nature and environmental education to improve their livelihoods and provide gainful direct employment to the local people.

State Medicinal Plants Board, Goa have taken efforts by organizing awareness programmes and workshops for farmers to sensitize towards development and cultivation of Medicinal Plants. One hundred and ten (110) Vaidya Mitra cards are issued to the Vaidyas of Goa to ease them in harvesting of medicinal plants from the forests of Goa.

Further, the Department has created 77 Nos. School Herbal Gardens and Nurseries with the provision of planting stock.

Scientific documentations such as 'Medicinal plants at Aushadhi Vatika' and 'Trees of Panjim' were released during the period. Goa Forest Department is committed for protection, conservation and scientific management of forests and wildlife and is taking all feasible efforts for the purpose.

The Government of Japan has invited proposals from the Government of India for the Technical Corporation Program "Science & Technology Research Partnership for Sustainable Development (SATREPS)" for the financial year 2023 under the ODA scheme, in order to establish

international framework to deal with global issues related to environment/energy, bio-resources, natural disaster & infectious diseases.

Forest Plantation

The Forest Department undertakes planting activities within and outside the Government owned forests. During the current year, around 77187 seedlings were distributed to the public and 24,795 nos. of seedlings were planted by the Department.

As a part of Jal Shakti Abhiyan launched by Union Government, high priority is given for soil and water conservation and creation of water bodies in forests and wildlife sanctuaries. Plantation of fruit bearing trees is carried out for improvement of habitat for wildlife and minimize their movement to habitation in search of water and food.

Eco Tourism

Monsoon Tourism is also promoted by opening Dudhsagar waterfall trek during current year by deploying trekkers from villages located on fringe areas of Bhagwan Mahaveer Wildlife Sanctuary and National Park, Mollem, resulting in gainful employment for the youth of villages like Collem, Mollem, Sigao of Dharbandora Taluka.

Around ₹1.83 lakh tourists have visited National Park and Wildlife Sanctuaries and ₹ 269.05 lakh of revenue generated through Eco-tourism and allied activities. Revenue of ₹ 15.14 lakhs (Oct, 2023) was generated through the sale of forest produce in the current financial year.

Information Technology (IT)

The Department of Information Technology, Electronics and Communications is committed towards building a robust startup ecosystem by boosting local entrepreneurs thus making Goa the most preferred startup destination.

In order to promote Robotic, Coding on Drone Technology and motivate young minds about innovation startups. The Department has successfully organized summer camps 2023 on 17th-19th May 2023 at Salvador –Do – Mundo and Media Tech Expo 2023 from 21st -27th November, 2023 during the International Film Festival.

Startup Policy Scheme: The Startup Policy is a great initiative by the Government to promote startups in the State to help create employment. 123 beneficiaries have availed the benefit amounting to ₹ 350.93 lakh from 2018-19 (till date), the Startup Policy scheme consists of seven components namely(1) Interest Subsidy Reimbursement scheme (2) Seed

Capital scheme (3) Reimbursement of Expenses for Startups Operating from Leased/ Privately Owned Premises scheme (4) Salary Reimbursement Co scheme (5) working space/ Incubators/Accelerators Subsidy scheme (6) Trademark reimbursement scheme and (7) IPR Reimbursement scheme. IT policy Scheme: A recruitment assistance of 10,000 per fresher is provided to the existing and new units that recruit through campus recruitment from the educational institutes located in Goa.

Drone Policy

The Government has launched the Drone Policy 2022 with an aim to promote manufacturing sustainable innovation as a key player in India's drone ecosystem.

The objective of the policy is to encourage use of drones for innovative delivery of citizen services with a focus in the areas of agriculture, forestry, healthcare, mining and tourism and also to promote drone technology start-ups in the State.

Goa IT Policy

The Government of Goa has approved and notified the Startup Policy 2021 and IT Policy 2018 with a vision to make Goa one of the most preferred start-up and IT destinations in India by providing them with the much needed support and assistance to the growing needs of the Startup and IT Ecosystem. Government of Goa envisions that facilitating entrepreneurship would lead to value creation and job creation. The policy also intends proliferation of technology startups and unleashing of economic opportunities across the State of Goa.

Electronic Delivery of Notice Act.

The Electronic Delivery of Notice Act primarily aims to serving of notices through electronic media i.e. any notice which is required to be given under such State Law or Rules and Regulations, to any person, may be sent in electronic form, where such person or his authorized representative gives consent in writing for service of notice on him by such mode.

Electronic Manufacturing Cluster (EMC-Tuem) is coming up at Tuem village in Pernem taluka under the Greenfield Electronics Manufacturing Clusters (EMC) Scheme of the Ministry of Electronics & Information Technology (MeitY), Government of India .6 allotments have been done within the EMC, one Offer of Allotment has been issued and 2 more applications are under process for allotment.

Scheme for Empowering ST/SC Communities using ICT Tools:

Under this scheme basic computer skills, training courses for BPO Operations/Call Center Executives are provided to youth / housewives from SC/ST Communities. During the current financial year, as on December 2023, 227 SC and 3628 ST individuals have benefited.

CHAPTER 15

RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT

Introduction:

Research & Development (R&D) is recognised as one of the many activities that contribute to innovation. It is essential for the process of technology absorption and adaptation. R&D is of utmost necessity to develop a country's production potential and also its Science and Technology Sector. It helps a nation to develop and bring about innovation in all sectors.

Science and Technology and Waste Management

Department of Science The and Technology with is mandated popularization and promotion of Science, Technology and Innovation in the State of Goa including scientific management of waste generated in the State. To achieve this mandate various schemes are implemented under which financial assistance is sanctioned and released as grant-in-aid to various Institutions/ Academic Institutions/ Individual researchers, NGOs working in the field of Science and Technology. Besides, financial grants are also given to students/ group of students, who carry out the projects as a part of their academic curriculum.

- In the year 2019-20, 08 Institutions/ Colleges were given Grant-in-aid amounting to ₹ 30.77 lakh out of which grant of ₹ 11.32 lakh was given to National Institute of Oceanography, Dona Paula towards 2nd installment for 3 years project entitled "Impact of tar balls on marine biota along the coast of Goa".
- ➤ In the year 2020-21, 11 Institutions/ Colleges were given Grant-in-aid

- amounting to ₹ 23.94 lakh out of which grant of ₹ 5.40 lakh was given to Goa Waste Management Corporation, Saligao towards Installation of Bio Digestor at new South Goa District Hospital Margao.
- In the year 2021-22, 12 Institutions/ Colleges were given Grant-in-aid amounting to ₹ 39.25 lakh out of which ₹ 20.00 lakh was given to Agnel Charities (Agnel Seva Sangh) at Agnel Ashram, Verna-Goa towards 5th and final installment towards establishment of "Technology Business Incubator".
- In the year 2023-24 (as on December 2023), 29 Institutions/ Colleges have been given Grant-in-aid amounting to ₹ 61.61 lakh out of which ₹11.32 lakh has been given to National Institute of Oceanography, Dona Paula towards 3rd and final installment for 3 years research project titled "Impact of Tar Balls on Marine Biota along the coast of Goa".

The detailed Grant-in-aid given to various Institutions/ Colleges during the last 5 years is given at Annexure – 43.

Besides, Department is mandated with Management of Solid Waste and other wastes generated in the State through safe and Scientific methods, which is achieved through the Goa Waste Management Corporation. To achieve the mandate, the Department implements following Schemes.

During the year 2023-24 (up to December 2023), total 11 numbers of Schools/ Colleges/ Research

Institutions have been provided Grantin-aid of ₹ 8.40 lakh to organize Science exhibitions/ seminars etc. under the "Scheme for providing Grant-in-aid to conduct Science Seminars, Workshops, Awareness Programmes, Exhibitions, Supply/ Replacement of Science Education vehicles and Providing Financial Assistance to Teaching Faculties, Researchers and Subject Specialty Experts to Participate in Science Seminars and workshops in India and Abroad in the field of Science & Technology". Also, 04 numbers of Researchers/ faculties from Colleges/ University have been provided with grant of ₹ 4.41 lakh to visit abroad for participating in Science Conferences to present their research papers.

- ➤ During the year 2023-24 (up to December 2023), total 16 number of Schools/ Colleges/ University/ individual researchers have been given Grant-in-aid amounting to 44.79 lakh to take up research projects based on Science and Technology under the "Scheme for Researchers in the field of Science and Technology and Innovation and for Projects of Students as a Part of Curriculum and to Publish Publications/ Books etc. in the field of Science, Technology and Innovations". Also, 06 groups of Students from Engineering Colleges/ Polytechnic from Goa have been financially supported under scheme by releasing total grants of ₹ 6.49 lakh to complete their final year projects.
- ➤ The Department has given a total Grant-in-aid of ₹ 1.50 lakh to 03 number of Schools under the "Scheme for the Group of students of High Schools and Higher Secondary School to participate in Science Exhibitions in India" and also to visit places of scientific repute in India with

condition that the group of students visiting such places should consist of at least 40% students from Scheduled Tribes community.

New Schemes

(a) Scheme to encourage students for Innovative projects

The Government of Goa introduced this scheme in view to encourage students in the State of Goa, who are having technological innovative ideas, which they want to translate into working prototype. Under this scheme, financial support is provided to deserving students on need cum merit basis. Government of Goa through Department of Science and Technology and Waste Management students who encourages require necessarv financial support, converting their innovative ideas into projects.

(b) Goa Rajya Vidnyanik Puraskar

Goa Rajya Vidnyanik Puraskar (GRVP) introduced an award by is Government of Goa through Department of Science & Technology & Waste Management. It is an award to and encourage. identify recognize Innovators/ Scientist who implemented their ideas to innovations that are changing the life of the world. The GRVP will be awarded each year to Innovators/ Scientists who develop their ideas into a product or process that has been adopted or has high probability of being adopted in the State of Goa. The scheme is implemented through the Goa State Innovation Council (GSInC). Scope of the scheme is to give three awards during each financial year in the form of ₹ 2.00 lakh each to the Goan Innovators/ Scientists, one each in categories of Innovation, Environment and Societal impact.

(c) Manohar Parrikar Yuva Scientist Award

Manohar Parrikar Yuva Scientist Award (MPYSA) is an award introduced by the Government of Goa through Department of Science & Technology & Waste Management. It is an award to encourage, identify and recognize Indian Scientist who has achieved excellence in the field of Science and Innovations. Technology and MPYSA is awarded annually to a Scientist, in memory of Late Chief Minister of Goa and Defence Minister of India, Shri Manohar Parrikar, who himself was a Technocrat and had love for Science and Technology. Scope of the Scheme is to give one award during each financial year in the form of a cash prize of ₹ 5.00 lakh to one Indian Yuva Scientist on recommendation of the Expert Committee.

The Green School Audit program, Green Olympiad, ThinQ-23 the Navy quiz, Wipro earthian program, Taluka level science guizzes, National Ayurveda Day in Schools and observance of other days of national importance in the Schools of Goa is done by the Goa State Council for Science and Technology (GSCST). By observing all these activities GSCST acts as catalyst for curiosity among young minds, by turning local issues into adventures scientific and thereby shaping a future where innovation meets responsibility.

Department through Goa State Council for Science and Technology has obtained Geographical Indication (GI) tag for Goan popular produce Goan Bebinca, Goa Mankurad Mango, Agsechi Vaiygem, Goa Cashew and Sat Shiro Bheno during this year in addition to earlier obtained GI for five popular Goan produce. Besides, the GI applications for Mussarate Mango, Goan Sausage and Kunbi Saree are under process.

Department through Goa State Innovation Council has set up Rapid Prototyping Lab at Don Bosco College of Engineering, Fatorda, which is a home to a variety of State-of-the-art prototyping equipments for the innovators in Goa.

Directorate of Higher Education (DHE)

Following Innovative Practices have been undertaken by DHE.

I. Establishment of Centre for "Research Development & Innovation" at Directorate of Higher Education"

In the year 2019, Goa Government started the "Centre for Research, Development and Innovation" (RDI) at the Directorate of Higher Education (DHE), way before the release of New Education Policy 2020. The RDI has introduced guidelines for Colleges, R&D Cells, giving them a structured plan to elevate their research endeavors. The impact is clear, Colleges in Goa are now more proactive about research, working together and creating a vibrant research culture. The following are the primary objectives:

1. Fostering Vibrant Research Culture:

The foremost objective is to create a vibrant research culture across Goa's Higher Education Institutions (HEIs), a culture that not only encourages curiosity-driven exploration but also cultivates an unquenchable thirst for knowledge. Through targeted initiatives, workshops, and collaborative programs, RDI aims to elevate the research ecosystem, amplifying the scope for ground-breaking discoveries and advancements.

2. Empowering Faculty and Students:

Statistics reveal that over the past two years, RDI initiatives have directly engaged more than 700 faculty members and attracted participation from 1,000+ students across various programs and workshops. By providing faculty with grant writing workshops, orientation programs, and research opportunities, RDI empower them to become catalysts of change, fostering a generation of inquisitive minds poised for innovation.

3. Societal Impact and Progress:

Beyond the confines of academia, RDI efforts transcend to impact society at large. The research output generated through these initiatives has led to the development of solutions addressing pertinent societal challenges. From innovative technologies to community-centric projects, these endeavors have laid the groundwork for tangible societal progress.

4. Collaborative Framework for HEIs:

These initiatives do not operate in isolation; they stand as pillars fostering collaboration among HEIs. By creating a network of knowledge-sharing, resource pooling, and collaborative ventures, RDI aim to create a fertile ground for collective growth and synergy among educational institutions.

RDI objectives are not merely aspirations, they are driving forces propelling Goa's HEIs towards a future where knowledge knows no bounds, where innovation is nurtured, and where societal progress is intrinsically tied to our collective academic pursuits.

Capacity Building Initiatives by RDI

➤ Two Days Research Grant Writing Workshop 2021

The objective of the workshop is to enhance research capabilities of Goa's

faculty members by providing skills for crafting compelling grant proposals.

➤ New Faculty Orientation & Mentoring Programme 2021-23

The objective of the programme is to provide a platform for newly recruited faculty members to enhance pedagogical skills, research methodologies, and administrative processes.

Research Grant Writing Workshop for Science and Engineering Faculty of Goa 2022

The objective of the workshop is honing grant proposal skills for science and engineering faculty. 30 faculty members prepared research proposals aligned with Science and Engineering Research Board's (SERB's) State University Research Excellence (SURE) Scheme, and expected increase in research funding for these disciplines. Overall, these initiatives collectively signify a paradigm shift in Goa's Higher education landscape.

II. Establishment of "R&D cells" (RDC) in all HEIs in Goa including Technical and Medical Institute

RDC within Colleges are poised to craft comprehensive roadmaps and execute well-planned outcome-oriented activities annually. This strategic approach aims to significantly elevate both the quality and quantity of research undertaken in Goa's HEIs. Remarkably, out of 59 HEIs, 55 successfully established their RDCs, marking an impressive 93% implementation rate. Under the guidance and directives of the "Centre Research & Development Initiative (RDI), educational institutions in Goa have successfully implemented a series of promotion comprehensive research activities across various categories which include organizing weekly research seminars. instituting dedicated а

"Research Day" as an annual event to showcase remarkable research endeavors within Colleges, the conducting department-wise iournal clubs for reviewing recent subject literature, and creating informative video clips highlighting College research work for display in the library and many more.

III. Establishment of "Goa State Research Foundation (GSRF)"

Goa State Research Foundation (GSRF) helps faculties of Colleges and the State University to do research with dedicated funding, making a big impact in the State. GSRF's key things are giving funding for faculty projects, encouraging high-level research, and making sure research proposals make a real difference.

It helps teachers do better research, fills funding gaps, has a smart plan for research growth, and aims to make a difference in society. Its focus is on dedicated funding, collaboration, and fostering cutting-edge research in all disciplines, directly contributing to fostering a robust research culture in higher education institutes in Goa, setting a benchmark for research initiatives nationwide.

For funding research in the State of Goa, GSRF has formulated schemes such as Goa GSRF Research Start-up Grant Scheme, GSRF Minor Grant Research Scheme, GSRF Post-Doctoral Fellowship Scheme, GSRF Doctoral Research Fellowship Scheme, GSRF Major Research Grant Scheme, and GSRF Summer/ Winter School Scheme.

IV. Training Non-PhD Faculty for Bridging Gaps in Research Skills

An eight-day Training Program for non-PhD faculty in Goa focused on "Enhancing Final Year Student Projects." This initiative equipped 430 faculty members (non-PhD regular faculty of Colleges) from diverse disciplines with advanced skills in research methodology and practical application.

V. Mentoring and Guidance for Successful Grant Acquisition and Research Advancements:

Three Colleges have received the prestigious DBT Star College Grant, Government of India to enhance the research infrastructure at Undergraduate Colleges.

Knowledge Exchange Programs

Vidnyan Dhara: Propagation of knowledge of science to youths

This is a unique programme in India where Scientists from National Research Institutes delivers talks to University students. University faculty delivers talks to College students, College Teachers engage with students from Higher Secondaries and High Schools. Vidnyan Dhara 2023, has been directly engaged with more than 32,000 students through 254 talks. This year, plan is to engage with more than 75,000 youths through 500 talks.

Goa College of Pharmacy

The M. Pharma students carry out research projects as a part of their dissertation in the field of Formulation Development, Analytical Development, Herbal Drug Development, etc.

The following research projects has been funded through grants:

Goa College of Engineering

Goa College of engineering designed and developed a software App for Goa Police Department called "E Beat Management System". The E-Beat Book is a web and mobile-based application used by law enforcement agencies to streamline the collection, updating, and analysis of information related to crime and criminals in real time. It serves as an essential tool for Police Officers working at the grassroots level.

Police Department

The Goa Police Department has signed MoU with

- (a) IIT, Farmagudi, Goa to enhance Research & Development (R&D) and training activities, to strengthen law enforcement & Cyber Security.
- (b) Goa College of Engineering, Farmagudi for conducting Research, enhancing potential of Human resource & strengthen Law enforcement
- (c) V.M. Salgaocar College of Law, Miramar, Goa for training, research & organizing seminar/ workshop, conference, project etc.

Water Resources Department

Research and data documentation

Under the National Hydrology Project funded by the World Bank, this Department is carrying out river gauging, establishment of all weather stations at various locations in the State.

The State Water quality laboratory is installed at Sinchai Bhavan- Porvorim, to monitor the quality of water in the State. A Centre of excellence is planned at Margao, to promote scientific studies on the data generated and mathematical

modeling etc. 90% of the work is completed.

Official language

Language Research and Training Centre is established in the Directorate of Official Language.

"Private **Translators** Meet" was organized on 31/10/2023 at Language Research Training and Centre, Directorate of Official Language, Panaji Goa create awareness about to translation scope in Goa. Around 28 translators from Goa amateur participated in the meet.

Directorate of Tribal Welfare

The Government has inaugurated the Tribal Research Institute in Sanguem Municipal area on 20/08/2023 at the hands of Hon'ble Chief Minister of Goa. Tribal Research Institute aims undertake activities such as Infrastructure Building, Research and Documentation, Training and Capacity Building, Celebrating Tribal Festivals and Yatras, Organising exchange of visits by supporting tribals and Innovative projects/ initiatives/ activities which can help tribals or tribal majority area.

CHAPTER 16

SOCIAL SECTOR

HEALTH

Goa boasts of a well developed health care infrastructure that includes hospitals, clinics and diagnostics centres. The health sector encompasses both Government – run institutes and private healthcare providers ensuring an all-inclusive range of services for the population.

Investments have been made to upgrade existing hospital and improve the availability of specialized healthcare services in the State.

Deen Dayal Swasthya Seva Yojana (DDSSY)

The DDSSY has been rolled out to provide health coverage to the entire resident population of the State who reside in Goa for a minimum period of five years. Benefit under this scheme is the cashless treatment limited to the annual coverage.

Also, the insurance benefits can be availed individually or collectively by members of the family. A total of 447 medical procedures are covered under the scheme.

42 Private Hospitals, 11 Government hospitals in Goa and 17 Private hospitals outside Goa have been empanelled under DDSSY.

Goa Mediclaim Scheme

Financial assistance is provided to every permanent resident of the State for availing super specialty treatments that are not available in the Government Hospitals in the State.

The nature of sickness covered are Continuous ambulatory peritoneal dialysis (CAPD), Plastic surgery, Intensive Care Unit (ICU), Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU), Trauma Care, Coronary-artery bypass grafting (CABG)/ Percutaneous Transluminal Coronary Angioplasty (PTCA) (Angiography & Angioplasty), Open Heart Surgery (Valve Replacement, Mitral valve repair (MVR), ventricular Septal Defect (VSD), Autism spectrum disorder (ASD)), Kidney Transplantation, Neuro Surgery, Radio Therapy Chemotherapy (Cancer), Cochlear implant, Spastic Child, Cerebral Palsy, Skeletal Deformities and Bone Marrow Transplant.

National Vector Borne Disease Control Programme

Malaria

A total of 2,47,846 patients were screened for Malaria and no death due to malaria was reported during the current financial year (upto 31st December 2023).

Dengue

Fever/Chikungunya/Japanese Encephalitis:

Dengue and Chikungunya cases are reduced at maximum extent due to concrete efforts taken up by the Government in this regard.

During the financial year 2023-24 (till 31st December, 2023), 512 confirmed cases of Dengue, 8 confirmed cases of Chikungunya and no cases of Japanese Encephalitis were reported.

National Programme for Prevention and Control of Cancer, Cardiovascular Disease and Stroke (NPCDCS):

The Department has conducted various Opportunistic Screening, diagnosis and treatments at Primary Health Centre (PHC) and Community Health Centre (CHC) level. The total number of patients who have received treatment for the year 2023–24 (April to November 2023) is given in Table No: 16.3

ST Elevation Myocardial Infarction (STEMI) Goa Project:

STEMI project consists of 20 spokes and 4 hubs. It is to ensure that patient reaches the nearest hub centre in shortest possible time, within golden hour and get diagnosed using Tele – ECG and thrombolyzed for ST Elevation Myocardial Infarction with newer thrombolytics such as Reteplase and Tenecteplase.

A total of 3028 critical ECG diagnosed, 533 STEMI diagnosed and 398 patients have thrombolysed till December, 2023.

Changing Diabetes Barometer Project (CDB)

The Government is providing insulin free of cost to all diabetic patients under CDB project. Under this project, diabetes educator provides free counseling on nutrition, exercise and importance of compliance to anti-diabetic treatment. Till December, 2023, 217901 patients have benefited.

Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Diseases (COPD)

Under the "National Programme for prevention of Non-Communicable Diseases", COPD has recently been included in the State for Screening and 840 patients have been identified till December, 2023.

Non-Alcoholic Fatty Liver Diseases (NAFLD)/ Non alcoholic Steatohepatitis (NASH)

The NAFLD/ NASH programme was conducted from September to December 2023 and 1677 patients have been screened for NAFLD/ NASH.

Goa Stroke Programme

The Government has initiated State specific initiative "Goa Stroke Programme" with an aim to reduce the morbidity and mortality due to stroke in the State.

To facilitate early diagnosis and prompt treatment of acute stroke patients, facilities are available at both the District Hospitals. 47 Acute Ischemic Stroke patients have been thrombolized during the period from February to December, 2023.

National Mental Health Programme (NMHP)

Tele MANAS is a comprehensive mental health care service and available at South Goa District Hospital, Margao and Institute of Psychiatry and Human Behavior (IPHB) at Bambolim, till December 2023, 2499 calls have been attended during the year.

Psychiatric OPDs are conducted at both the District Hospitals and patients are regularly counseled, altogether 8870 mental disorder cases have been reported from April to September, 2023.

National Programme for Tobacco Control (NTCP)

Under this programme, Tobacco Cessation Clinics are functional at both the District Hospitals providing counseling as well as Nicotine replacement therapy.

Behavioral Counseling for tobacco cessation is also being conducted at the peripherals. Report of Tobacco Cessation Centre from both the Districts Hospital for the year 2023-24 (upto November 2023) is given in Table No. 16.4

Pradhan Mantri National Dialysis Programme (PMNDP)

Under the Pradhan Mantri National Dialysis Programme, hemodialysis services are provided under Public Private Partnership (PPP) mode. A total 3489 patients are registered from April to December, 2023 and 70193 dialysis sessions have been conducted.

National Programme for Control of Blindness & Visual Impairment (NPCB & VI)

The objective of NPCB & VI is to reduce blindness incidence from 1.10% to 0.30%. As per the Project "ANDH MUKTH GOA", facilities for cataract surgery are available throughout the State to eradicate blindness.

The Government has developed Ophthalmic OT at Community Health Centre Sankhalim on 16th August, 2023 and Sub District Hospital Chicalim on 22nd November, 2023.

The details of Cataract surgeries carried out including free Intraocular Lenses Implants during the last five years is given in Table No: 16.6

School Health Programme Distribution of Free Spectacles

Under the School Health Programme detection and correction of Refractive Errors for Primary and Secondary School Students is carried out and free spectacles are provided.

During the last five years, 683 schools have been covered and 55361 students were screened. 3228 students were detected with refractive errors and 2616 spectacles were provided.

National Leprosy Elimination Programme

Special activities, Skin Camps and house to house surveys have been conducted to detect early hidden cases of Leprosy in the community and prompt referral is carried out for suspected cases.

A total of 8,27,047 persons was screened for new Leprosy cases. The details of Leprosy cases for last five years is given in Table no: 16.7

Integrated Disease Surveillance Programme (IDSP)

IDSP, a decentralized, District based Surveillance Programme, intends to detect early warning signals of impending outbreaks and help initiate an effective response in a timely manner. Activities undertaken under this

Activities undertaken under this Programme include

- ➤ Testing for COVID-19, Influenza, KFD, Leptospirosis
- Preventive and control measures are taken for the above diseases.
- ➤ Setting up of RT-PCR labs in different Public Health hospitals.
- ➤ 100% reporting of all the Syndromic, Presumptive and Laboratory forms.
- ➤ IHIP Portal helps to identify outbreak at initial stage so that preventive measures of control can be initiated.

National Iodine Deficiency Disorder Control Programme (NIDDCP)

This programme is designed to generate awareness amongst general public on the importance of lodated salt and lodine Deficiency Disorder. As per National Family Health Survey (NFHS-5) consumption of iodized salt is 96.2% in Goa.

Till November, 2023 out of the total 896 tested samples, 857 have found with adequate lodized salt.

NATIONAL AYUSH MISSION (NAM)

At present 34 Ayurvedic and 14 Homoeopathic OPDs are operational in the State. Up-gradation at AYUSH OPDs has been undertaken to set up Panchakarma & Development of herbal gardens. 02 Yoga Halls are constructed one each at PHC Colvale and PHC Balli. Agni-Viddha Karma, Cupping Therapies have also been started at AYUSH OPDs.

AYUSH Health Wellness Centres (AHWC)

Out of the designated 74 approved AYUSH HWC, 72 are operational. 49 Community Health Officers (CHOs) cum AYUSH MO have been appointed at Sub Centre level whereas 30 Yoga Instructors (Part time) are appointed for yoga sessions at AHWCs.

Mental Health Care Centre under Innovation

02 Mental Health Care Centres are approved of which 01 unit has been established at PHC Corlim providing consultation, free medicine and counseling to patients.

Setting up of Up to 50 Bedded Integrated AYUSH Hospital

02 Integrated 50 bedded AYUSH Hospitals have been approved. The South Goa Integrated AYUSH Hospital at Margao, is nearing completion

whereas North Goa Integrated AYUSH Hospital will be established at Velguem, Bicholim, Goa.

AYUSH Gram

4 AYUSH Grams are operationalized at Keri, Borim, Agonda and Netravali. Regular AYUSH awareness activities are being conducted to propagate AYUSH Way of life in the villages. Ecofriendly trainings such as Honey Bee are being conducted. Identification of medicinal plants and home remedies, development of kitchen gardens are promoted. Activities like Poshan Maah, Ayurveda Day and International Day of Yoga are regularly conducted at these Ayush Grams.

Under New Public Health Programmes

02 units of KARUNYA (palliative care through AYUSH) have been setup at PHC Navelim and CHC Bicholim. 02 units of National Programme for Management of Musculoskeletal Disorders & Osteo Arthiritis and VAYO MITRA have been started at PHC Quepem and CHC Pernem.

ACHIEVEMENTS UNDER NATIONAL AYUSH MISSION (NAM)

- Yog Gram was showcased at AYUSH Health and Wellness Centres (HWC), Rural Medical Dispensary (RMD), Netravali during the 9th International Day of Yoga, 2023.
- Yog Mandir i.e. Yoga Halls are being developed in the State.
- Mental Health Care Centre is set up at PHC Corlim where Panchakarma procedures such as Shirodhara and Nasya along with diet and lifestyle advice for AYUSH management are provided to the patients. An expenditure of ₹ 1541.58 lakh has been incurred for the last five years.

Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB-PMJAY)

Under Ayushman Bharat – Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB-PMJAY), a cover of ₹ 5 lakh is provided to a family per year for secondary and tertiary care hospitalization across public and private empanelled hospitals in India. 17 hospitals are being empanelled under the scheme in the State. Beneficiaries can visit any empanelled public or private hospital in India to avail cashless treatment.

There are 41098 eligible families as per Socio Economic Caste Census 2011, of which 24717 families have enrolled on AB-PMJAY consisting of 63220 individuals upto 9th January, 2024. Also 2731 cases amounting to ₹ 251.67 lakh have been settled upto 5th January, 2024.

The Ayushman Bharat Campaign was organized from 18th September, 2023 till 2nd October, 2023 and a card generation drive was undertaken for eligible population of the State. Ayushman Cards were generated during Viksit Bharat Sankalp Yatra and during the special camps organized by the Directorate of Health Services.

Nursing Institute

The Government Nursing Institute provides opportunities for students to pursue Diploma, Graduate and Post Graduate Nursing studies in Goa. A cumulative of 877 students successfully completed B.Sc. nursing programme till the last academic year, including 113 students who passed out during the current financial year i.e. 2023-24. A cumulative of 21 students have successfully completed M. Sc Nursing programme.

Altogether 7 students have successfully completed the Post Basic Diploma in Neonatal Nursing and Cardio-Thoracic Nursing. Also a total 360 students have successfully completed the Auxiliary Nurse and Midwifery programme till the last academic year

Emergency Management and Research Institute (EMRI)

In Goa, EMRI Green Health Services operates a fleet of 101 ambulances. 7,16,557 emergencies have been attended since its inception and 57258 lives have been saved. The initiative also assisted 1148 deliveries and 47385 pregnancy cases.

The total Road Traffic Accident (RTAs) handled by EMRI stands are 1,26,975. The Hearse Van has attended 11824 cases and the Drop Back vehicles has had 9113 beneficiaries during the year.

National Programme for Prevention & Management of Trauma

The objective of this project is to enhance road safety, identify black spots, ensure better coordination with stakeholder Departments and provide immediate relief to accident victims. Goa State has registered more than 4873 accident entries on iRAD portal during the period from January 2022 to October 2023.

Swasth Mahila Swasth Goa Project:

It is an unique project launched with the aim of screening 1 lakh women above 25 years of age for breast cancer over a two year period. Till November 2023 a total of 96858 women has availed the facility of breast cancer screening and 48 breast cancer positive cases have been identified which are undergoing treatment.

India Hypertension Control Initiative (IHCI):

This initiative is launched in collaboration with Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), World Health Organisation (WHO), Resolve to Save Lives, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW) and DHS Goa. The patients who are enrolled under IHCI shall be followed up using "SIMPLE App" and managed using State specific Hypertension Treatment.

Ayushman Bharat Health and Wellness Centres (Ab-HWC):

In Goa, the health facilities, Primary Health Centres. Rural Medical Dispensaries, Sub Health Centres have converted into Health been Wellness Centres. There are total of 201 Health and Wellness Centres in the State which include 24 Primary Health Centres, 30 Rural Medical Dispensaries, 4 Urban Health Centres, 1 Urban Health Training Centre, 1 Rural Health Training Centre and 141 Sub Health Centres. All the Health and Wellness Centres are upgraded with IT infrastructure and Tele Consultation Services.

GOA STATE AIDS CONTROL SOCIETY (GSACS):

Goa State AIDS Control Society under National AIDS Control Programme Phase-V aims to reduce annual new HIV infections and AIDS-related mortalities by 80% (2025-26) and also dual elimination attain of vertical transmission and HIV/AIDS related stigma.

The number of persons detected HIV positive have declined from 280 in 2018 to 219 in 2023 whereas HIV testing has increased from 79,900 in 2018 to 1,22,790 in 2023 (till November 2023)

The Anti-Retroviral Therapy (ART) Medical College. Centre at Goa Bambolim provides treatment to people living with HIVs and till November, 2023, a total 7996 patients have been screened for ARV eligibility out of which 5512 patients have enrolled for ARV treatment and 3364 patients are on live register of ART. First lines failure patients are given Second Line ARV Therapy. A total 242 patients are alive on second line ARV Therapy upto November, 2023. Second Line failure patients are given Third Line ARV therapy which has 36 patients availing Third Line Therapy.

Goa State was ranked 6th in the Evaluation conducted by National AIDS Control Organisation (NACO) for the financial year 2023-24 (till September 2023) which is result of concrete efforts of Goa SACS and associated partners.

Goa won third prize at Regional Level Red Ribbon Quiz Competition organized by the National AIDS Control Organisation (NACO), Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, New Delhi at Mumbai.

Blood Safety

In Goa, the availability of safe blood is ensured through a network of 5 blood banks, of which 3 are supported by NACO. Out of total 5 blood banks, 3 are in the Government sector and 2 in private sector. The total collection of blood during the last five years i.e 2018 -2023 (upto October 2023) was 1,39,406 units.

The proportion of voluntary blood collection was 98060 units comprising nearly 70% of the total collection. Efforts have been made to achieve 90% Voluntary Blood Donation and to phase out the replacement blood donation.

GOA MEDICAL COLLEGE

Super Specialty Block, Goa Medical College provides the specialized services under a Centre of Excellence in

areas like Endocrinology, Nephrology, Cardiology, CVTs, Urology, Neurology, Plastic Surgery, Paediatric Surgery etc. OPD Statistics of Broad Specialty and Super specialty blocks for the last 5 years is given in Annexure - 44.

The Central Laboratory (OPD 13) provides round the clock services for emergency investigations.

Nephrology Department conducts OPDs thrice a week and provides various diagnostic and therapeutic services like Haemodialysis, Renal Transplant, Vascular Access, Kidney Biopsy etc.

During the year 2023-24, a total 10374 outdoor patients, 13773 indoor patients and 19630 Dialysis patients were attended.

Organ Transplants

Live Related Renal Transplants – Till December 2023, 21 Live Related Renal Transplants are conducted, out of which 3 are done in last 5 years. Also 7 Deceased Donor Renal Transplant have been carried out

Cochlear Implant surgeries for Deaf Mute children below age of 05 years has started from 25/11/2014 under Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase / Fitting of Aids and Appliances (ADIP Scheme), Government of India. Till December 2023 the Department has successfully carried out 13 Cochlear implants.

Subspecialties in ENT have been started recently in Department of ENT. Total 43265 OPD patients were attended and 1372 indoor patients were treated.

GOA DENTAL COLLEGE

Goa Dental College and Hospital in with collaboration Goa State Commission for Protection of Child Rights and Directorate of Education conducted an intensive sensitization programme for Heads of Schools/ Nodal teachers of Prahari Club against the menace of Electronic Cigarettes and vaping devices infiltrating the lives of students in Educational Institutions in Goa. The Programme was organised in Tiswadi, Salcete & Bardez Talukas sensitizing 394 teachers and leaders of Prahari Clubs. During the last 5 years. 5,82,995 OPD patients and 3,338 Indoor patients were attended at the Goa Dental College. During 2023-24, 40 students passed out with Bachelor of Dental Surgery degree and 14 students passed out with Master of Dental Surgery Course.

57 special drives were conducted for screening of Dental Health, wherein 4211 patients were examined and 715 patients were treated. The awareness of Oral Health and Anti-tobacco was conducted for Vanarmare tribe of Goa benefiting around 62 persons.

Anti - Tobacco film festival was collaboration with organized in Entertainment Society of Goa on 3/05/2023 to create continuous awareness of ill effects of tobacco for the masses, through the medium of films.

INSTITUTE OF PSYCHIATRY AND HUMAN BEHAVIOUR (IPHB)

IPHB has witnessed 4013 new patients and 3329 Child Guidance Clinic (CGC) cases. In addition to this, IPHB has issued 1295 disability certificates. Whereas 532 Unique Disability ID (UDID) cards have been generated and dispatched.

A total 15 students have successfully completed M.Phill in Psychiatry Social Work and 18 students have completed Post Basic Diploma in Psychiatric / Mental Health Nursing from 2019-20 to 2023-24.

During Mental Health Week, Mental Health awareness programme was conducted in different Panchayats. Around 18 Special Drives / Camps /Lectures / workshops were organised which were attended by faculties and students.

SCHOOL EDUCATION

PM POSHAN (Mid-Day Meal Scheme)

PM POSHAN (Mid-Day Meal Scheme) is a flagship scheme of the Government of India which has been implemented in the State by providing hot cooked food to all Government and Government Aided Lower Primary & Upper Primary Schools, and Alternative Innovative Education (AIE) centres. The scheme is implemented through 97 Women Self Help Groups (SHG's)/ Mahila Mandals which possess a valid license from Directorate of Food & Administration (DFDA). Also 9 Parent Teacher Associations are supplying Mid-Day Meals to the school children. The beneficiaries under major schemes during 2023-24 (upto December 2023) are given below in the table No.16.12

Bharat Yatra Scheme

This scheme is for the students of Secondary and Higher Secondary Schools to create awareness about Indian culture through the educational tours to far flung areas in the Northern and Southern India.

During academic year 2023-24, 137 Students and 11 Teachers from 5 schools were permitted to undertake Bharat Yatra Scheme.

Grants to Sanjay Centre for Special Education, Porvorim – Goa

The Sanjay school is an autonomous society 100% funded by the State Government. The Sanjay Centre for Special Education has 06 Schools under its control.

The school imparts training to hearing impaired, mentally retarded, physically handicapped, slow learners and children with specific learning disabilities with view to train them to become independent and self-reliant. Grant-in-Aid amounting to ₹ 1408.00 lakh has been released during the current financial year.

Scheme for Providing Counseling to the Students in the Government & Government Aided Institutions (Secondary/Higher Secondary)

The scheme is implemented through Goa Education Development Corporation (GEDC) and aimed to provide counselling to students studying in Government and Government aided Secondary and Higher Secondary Institutions in the State.

77 counsellors and 17 supervisors are employed on contract basis for the purpose. During the academic year 2023-2024, 291 schools were covered under the scheme across the State of Goa.

Educational Concession to the Children of Service Personnel

Students whose parents are Defense Personnel can avail benefit under this scheme. Presently, the scheme is implemented for the students studying in Colleges, Technical Institutions and Universities. The students have to produce their original fee receipts. Total 40 students have availed the benefit during the year.

Incentive Scholarship Examination for students of Std. IV

The main objective of this examination is to identify the hidden talents among the students. Every year in the month of April. Talent Search Examination is conducted for class IV students studying urban, slum areas and rural, belonging to landless families in Government Government & aided primary schools in Marathi, Konkani & Urdu medium so as to provide them financial assistance of ₹ 2000 per annum upto class X to pursue education.

284 students were awarded scholarship from various categories during the year 2022-23.

For the year 2023-24, Incentive Scholarship Examination is scheduled on 21/4/2024.

Adolescent Education Programme (AEP)

The Government in collaboration with Goa State AIDS Control Society, Panaji, conducted 13 day "Life Skills Development" Adolescent Education Programme / workshop from 24/07/2023 to 31/08/2023 covering 528 schools of Goa for creating awareness on HIV/AIDS.

Implementation of New Education Policy (NEP)

The State has already enacted the Compulsory Education Act (1995) & enforced it to ensure that every child is educated. The NEP primarily focuses on foundational pillars of Access, Equity, Quality, and Affordability & Accountability.

The NEP Policy aims to universalize the Pre-primary Education by 2025 and provide foundational Literacy/ Numeracy to all by 2025.

Education Management Information System (EMIS)

Education Management Information System (EMIS) is prepared in booklet form for collecting Statistical Information of all Government aided and unaided schools of Goa.

Other Achievements

Goa State Education Development Corporation (GSEDC) has carried out Repair / Up-gradation / Maintenance/ Renovation of Government Schools incurring an expenditure of ₹ 10766.60 lakh from 2017 to 2023.

Statistical information on schools, students and teachers in Goa i.e Primary, Middle, Secondary and Higher Secondary schools during the year 2023-24 is given in Annexure - 50 and Taluka wise Divyang Students enrolled is given in Annexure - 49.

HIGHER EDUCATION

In Higher Education Institute, language laboratories play a crucial role in fostering effective language learning and communication skills.

The Government has initiated the project to streamline and integrate all academic activities of affiliated colleges by providing a centralized, electronic platform "Integrated Academic Information Management System (IAIMS)" to enable the colleges to work as a single unit.

Cyber Suraksha Scheme

Focuses on helping students fill in skill gaps by offering short term technical programmes of varying duration. One of the first certificate course being offered is the "Cyber Suraksha" programme to students who are interested in pursuing career in cyber security.

The course is set to commence from January, 2024, with 2000 students registered from various colleges across Goa. Government also supports the students for higher education through interest free Education Loan and Bursary scheme.

The details of beneficiaries who have availed the benefit under Interest Free Education Loan Scheme and Sant Sohirobanath Ambiye Dnyanvruddhi Shishyavrutti Bursary scheme are given in the Table No. 16.14.

Directorate of Higher Education has Memorandum signed seven Understanding (MoUs) with various industries namely IBM India, Consultancy Services (TCS), Newton Mugafi (Unlu), Entri, Nav School, Gurukul, Yashaswi Skill Nav Gurukul, Yashaswi Skill Limited, and 3 MoUs have been signed with academic institutes such as Indian Institute of Tata Science. Institute of Social Institute of Sciences & Company Secretaries of India . 133 students were offered jobs by several industries including TCS.

It aimed to strengthen the skills of college students, so that they are well-equipped to carry out the roles and responsibilities in their career. 1218 students have benefited under this initiative.

Goa State Higher Education Council and Institute of Company Secretaries of India (ICSI) have conducted a Teacher Conference on the theme "Empowering Educators", for the faculty of Higher Education Institutions and Higher Secondary Schools having Commerce subject. The event was held on 10th October 2023 at Multipurpose Hall, Art and Culture, Patto Panjim.

TECHNICAL EDUCATION

The Directorate of Technical Education has signed MoU with EduSkill Foundation with an objective to cover Students of Technical Institutions under AICTE – EduSkill Internship (online) programme.

Coding and Robotics Education in Schools Scheme (CARES)

Under CARES, school students across the State are imparted coding skills, thereby enhancing their computational thinking abilities, creativity and innovativeness.

Teachers have been trained to impart these skills, across schools in the State. The scheme was launched during the academic year 2021-22 in all Government and Government aided schools for Class VI, VII and VIII reaching out to 65,000+ students in around 440 schools in Goa.

Diamond Jubilee Government Investment for Technical Education Scheme

Under the Scheme, Government bears substantial component of the fees payable by Students enrolled in Technical Degree and Diploma Courses in 15 AICTE approved Institutions in the State of Goa, there by alleviating the financial burdens on the students and parents.

Around 3194 students have availed the benefits of the scheme during 2023-24, till December, 2023.

GOVERNMENT POLYTECHNIC

Community Development Polytechnics conducts various training programmes, for school drop outs, unemployed youth & women for the varying from three to six months duration under manpower development.

All together 452 students have been enrolled for the year 2023-24 at Government Polytechnic Verna, Curchorem, Government Polytechnic Mayem-Bicholim and Government Polytechnic Vasco.

ART & CULTURE

The Directorate of Art and Culture deals with the preservation, promotion. development of cultural traditions and reading culture of the State through its network of institutions, libraries, programmes/activities etc. The activities/ programmes are organized for the welfare of the artists and development of art organizations by way of providing financial support. It also establishes proper infrastructure facilities for the artists and general public in the fields of Art and Culture.

End to End Digitization of Kala Samman Scheme

The development process of End to End Digitization of Kala Samman scheme is under process. As per the scope of work, the first part i.e. sanctioning of the amount to the new beneficiaries has been completed and the second phase which includes arrears calculations, maintenance of ledgers, disbursement of amount etc. to all the beneficiaries is under completion stage. The services will be made available online for general public from the financial year 2024-25.

Scheme for Financial Assistance for Veteran Artists

The Ministry of Culture, Government of India implements the 'Scheme for Financial Assistance for Veteran Artists' where artists who have contributed significantly in the field of Art, but due to old age have to lead a miserable life or are in penury condition are provided monthly financial assistance up to ₹ 6000/- provided the artist is getting pension of at least ₹ 500/- per month from the State Government.

The Government of Goa through the Directorate of Art and Culture organizes D. D. Kosambi Festival of Ideas in the memory of noted Historian and Mathematician, son of the soil Shri. Damodar Dharmanand Kosambi.

Success Stories

Department of Art & Culture organized Digital National Tribal Dance Festival and Tribal Goan Dance Festival under the Centrally Sponsored Scheme, **Support to Tribal Research Institute** The Central Government released an amount of ₹ 25.00 lakh for the said programme.

GOA COLLEGE OF ART

The Government has signed MoU with different Departments / Institutions / Organizations /other bodies with the purpose/objective of creating an

environment of sharing information for the purpose of bringing uniformity in the field of Fine Arts & Applied Arts and to create a linkage with the industry.

Students of this Institution have participated in various competitions taken up and executed projects in the field including the design and execution of a 12 feet outdoor sculpture installation for Goa University and a larger than life size bust of Mahatma Gandhi and four relief panels for the Durbar Hall at Raj Bhavan.

Students of Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A) executed a 84 feet x 12 feet Mural at Badrinath for the occasion of opening of Badrinath Dham.

WOMEN AND CHILD DEVELOPMENT

The Government is committed for welfare and empowerment of women and care & protection of children by implementation of various Acts and schemes. The Department also monitors the atrocities/crime against women and child abuse.

Poshan Abhiyan: This flagship programme is aimed to improve nutritional outcome of children. adolescent girls, pregnant women and lactating mothers. total 92511 Α community based events have been conducted during the year 2023-24 till 2023. Mother November Committees have been formed to track and monitor Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM)/ Moderate Acute Malnutrition (MAM) children at AWC level. 86 kitchen gardens have been setup at Anganwadi centres.

Griha Aadhaar Scheme: Griha Aadhaar Scheme has been launched by the Government to address the problem of spiraling prices and to provide financial support to the housewives/homemakers from middle.

lower middle and poor section of the society. The financial assistance of ₹ 1500/- per month is provided to the beneficiary.

Mamta Scheme: One-time financial incentive of ₹ 10,000/- is given to a mother who delivers a girl child (maximum 02 deliveries) in a registered medical institution.

Anganwadi Services Scheme: Under the scheme, 1262 Anganwadi Centres have been set up across the State reaching out to every nook and corner and providing services of Immunization, Health Check-up, Referral Services, Supplementary Nutrition, Nutrition and Health Education and Non-formal preschool Education.

Supplementary Nutrition Programme (SNP): The scheme aims at supplementing the nutritional intake of children (6 months – 6 years of age), pregnant women and nursing mothers.

The beneficiaries under various beneficiary oriented schemes is given in the Annexure 51.

Special Drives

- Poshan Pakhwada is conducted in all Anganwadi Centres in the month of March, Poshan Maah was celebrated in the month of September, 2023 where in 18563 awareness activities were carried out at Anganwadi Centres by focusing on identification and tracking of children with Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) and plantation drive for promotion of kitchen garden.
- Training on Understanding Gender and Gender Laws in India by UN Women was conducted between 16th to 18th August, 2023. Training was conducted for 12 Government Departments to help individuals to

- understand the role played by gender in acquiring knowledge and skills necessary for gender equality in their daily lives and work.
- Till December, 2023 total 34 Aadhaar camps were conducted.

SOCIAL WELFARE

The Directorate of Social Welfare provides welfare programmes and services to the persons with disabilities, social security for the aged and destitute through the network of residential care homes and non-institutional services. Besides this, the Department also provides avenues of self-employment to persons with disabilities and creates awareness among general public regarding the welfare measures.

Mukhyamantri Dev Darshan Yatra

The Government endeavored to assist particularly Senior Citizens to undergo spiritual experience. Under the scheme, 11979 individuals have undertaken pilgrimage to Shirdi, Vailankanni and Tirupati during the year 2022-23.

Senior Citizen Identity Cards

3953 Senior Citizen Identity Cards were generated and issued to the beneficiaries for availing the benefits under Government Schemes.

Unique Disability ID (UDID) Cards UDID card will be the single document of Identification, verification of the Divyang for availing benefits & schemes provided by the Government . 9138 UDID cards are issued to Persons with Disability during the year 2023-24 till December 2023.

The Performance / achievements of various welfare schemes under Directorate of Social Welfare Department during the financial year 2023-24 (upto December 2023) is given in Annexure – 52.

- "Dr. Ambedkar Samajik Puraskar" was conferred to 04 awardees on the occasion of Birth Anniversary of Bharat Ratna Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar on 14th April, 2023.
- 18 eminent Senior Citizens aged 70 years & above were felicitated on the occasion of "International Day for Senior Citizen" on 1st October, 2023 for their valuable contribution to the society and selected awardees were given a Certificate of Appreciation.
- On 19th December, 2023 on the occasion of "Goa Liberation Day", 13 Best Social Workers, 3 Best Persons with Disabilities (employees), 1 Best Employer for Person with disabilities and 1 Best NGO working for Persons with disabilities in each category were felicitated at the hands of Hon'ble Chief Minister of Goa.

The Department has introduced various schemes on CM Scholarship Portal to process of scholarship the disbursement to students belonging to Persons with Disabilities, SC and OBC. The Department in collaboration with NIC has launched 13 educational CM portal. schemes on the (https://cmscholarship.goa.gov.in)

Divyang students from Goa represented India in various sports at the 2023

Special Olympics World Summer Games – Berlin. A total 19 medals were clinched i.e. 09 Gold, 05 Silver & 05 Bronze.

Purple fest

The International Purple Fest Goa 2024 was held from 8th to 13th January, 2024 wherein Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase / Fitting of Aids and Appliances (ADIP) camp was organised in collaboration with Artificial Limbs Manufacturing Corporation of India (ALIMCO).

During this camp, 520 Persons with Disabilities (PwD) were assessed and aids and appliances were provided. Also, 67 Senior Citizens were assessed aids and appliances distributed to 29 Senior citizens whereas remaining distribution will be done Pradhan through Mantri Divvasha Kendra (PMDK) which was inaugurated on 10/01/2024 at Goa Medical College, Bambolim.



Creation of New Department for Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities

In order to implement Rights for Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016 and the magnitude of work involved for its effective implementation, Cabinet approval is granted to create separate Department for Empowerment and

Inclusion of PwD which will cater to all 21 notified Disabilities as per Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016.

TRIBAL WELFARE

The Government is committed for the overall development of the Tribal community through implementation of various schemes.

The Government has initiated CM the Scholarship Portal to process applications for the schemes such as Pre-Matric Scholarship (Std. Vth to Xth) Merit Based Award. Gagan State Bharari Shiksha Yojana and Home Post-Matric Nursing Courses. The **Scholarships** and Pre-Matric Scholarships (Std. IXth & Xth) at central level, can be availed through National Scholarship Portal.

Pre-Matric Scholarship (Std. Vth to Xth)

The objective of the scheme is to provide financial assistance to the families of students who are otherwise unable to send them to schools due to poverty and also to improve the educational status and reduce the dropouts rates among Scheduled Tribes' students through Scholarship.

Gagan Bharari Shiksha Yojana

The objective of the scheme is to provide additional maintenance allowance of ₹7,500/- for 10 months for day scholar and ₹15,000/- for those students staying in hostel during the academic year (for ten months).

Additional disability allowance of ₹ 750/-per month during the academic year (for a period of ten months) is given to PwD students.

Merit Based Award

The main purpose of the scheme is to motivate ST students by giving merit based award, based on benchmark of the performance and to provide financial incentives to high performing students belonging to Scheduled Tribes who have qualified for SSCE & HSSCE Board Examinations of Goa Board.

Matrutva Yojana

Under Matrutva Yojana, the Government opportunity provides for couples belonging to ST population to avail treatment to conceive child using In vitro Fertilization (IVF) and Intrauterine (IUI) insemination techniques. Government covers treatment cost upto ₹ 5.00 lakh per couple for one child only. Several couples belonging to population who have faced fertility related issues to conceive a child, and could not afford the costly treatment have benefitted through this scheme.

Pre-Matric Scholarships to ST Students (Classes IXth to Xth)

The objective of the scheme is to provide financial assistance to support parents of ST children for education of their wards studying in classes IX and X so that the incidence of drop out especially in the transition from the elementary to the secondary stage is minimized and to improve participation of ST children in classes IX and X of the Pre-Matric stage, so that they perform better and have a better chance of progressing to the Post Matric stage of education.

Post Matric Scholarships to the Scheduled Tribes (ST) Students

The objective of the scheme is to provide financial assistance to ST students studying at post matriculation or post-secondary stage to enable them to complete their education. Their entire tuition fees are reimbursed. Students will be paid non-refundable fee charged by recognized institutions such as enrolment/registration, tuition, games, union, library, magazine, medical

examination and such other fees compulsorily payable by the student to the institution.

Vidya Laxmi

The objective of the scheme is to promote education among girl children belonging to the ST Communities and assist the weaker section of the society. The girl child who passes Std. Xth examination and appears in the Std. XIth, in any stream (Science, Arts, Commerce, Vocational, ITI, etc.) is eligible to avail the benefits of the scheme. An amount of ₹ 25,000/- is provided by way of fixed deposit in the name of the girl child and the Officer nominated by the Government. This amount is released to the beneficiary after passing out Std. XIIth Board examination.

Home Nursing Course

The objective of the scheme is to provide financial assistance to the poor and meritorious students belonging to ST community in order to enable them to pursue Home Nursing Course.

Grant in Aid to Voluntary Organisation (Hostel)

The objective of the scheme is to provide grant-in-aid to the voluntary social organizations to run hostels for ST students to enable them to pursue their studies who due to poverty otherwise are unable to attend the school.

Sahayata

The objective of the scheme is to provide financial assistance for the purpose of organizing activities such as seminars, workshops, competitions, tribal sports, traditional culture, medical camps, awareness camps etc. for ST community in the State.

Antya Sanskar Sahay Yojana

Schedule Tribe families whose family income limit is ₹ 3.00 lakh per annum

can avail the benefits under the scheme. Financial assistance of ₹ 20,000/- is sanctioned to the person related to deceased person to perform funeral and religious ceremonies related to last rites to the deceased person.

The claim may be made within 12 months from the occurrence of death in the family by next of kin of the deceased.

Atal Asra Yojana

The objective of the scheme "Atal Asra Yojana" is to provide financial assistance for construction/ reconstruction and repairs of existing house of ST communities. Financial assistance for construction of new house and reconstruction of existing house is upto ₹ 3.00 lakh and for repairs of existing house is upto ₹ 1.50 lakh.

To Support Children of Widow / Orphan Child

This is a special scheme implemented by the Government to support orphan child in the State. The Government provides fixed maintenance allowance of ₹ 2500/- per month per child of a widow and ₹ 3000/- per month per orphan child for meeting expenses on food and clothing till the age of 18 years.

Prashikshan Yatra

Financial assistance up to ₹ 2,00,000/-is provided to the Educational Institutes functioning in Tribal Dominated Areas to conduct Study Tours/Excursions across the country to cover places of Historic, Cultural and Educational importance during school vacations.

Adivasi VikasYojana

The scheme aims to provide financial support to Village Panchayats/ Zilla Panchayats and Municipalities where there is substantial tribal population to create new infrastructure projects and

upgrade the existing ones as also carry out one time maintenance for the benefit of the village communities.

Financial Assistance to Pre-Primary Schools in Remote Areas

The scheme aims to provide financial assistance to set up pre-primary schools in the remote tribal areas which lack the facilities of the pre-primary education for tribal population.

Financial assistance in the form of rent amount payable for the premises, fixed remuneration to one Teacher, one helper, teaching aids/equipments, toys, mid-day meal are provided under the scheme.

Munkarache Ghar

Financial assistance is provided to the needy Mundkars of ST category enable them to exercise their right to purchase dwelling house at the price determined by the Mamlatdar under the provisions of the Goa, Daman and Diu Mundkar Act. The maximum financial assistance under the scheme for purchase of dwelling house is ₹ 30,000/-.

Udhyog Adhar Yojana

The scheme provides financial assistance to individual ST person either to participate in the exhibition / fair etc. organized in the State of Goa or outside Goa, provide financial assistance to NGOs to organize an exhibition / fair etc. for the benefit of ST people in respect of exhibition cum sale of traditional products of the tribal people.

Short Term Professional Training Courses in the State of Goa

The objectives of the scheme is to train youth belongs to ST community to start their own business and provide financial assistance to acquire skills by joining the various training courses for the purpose of self-employment or for their livelihood.

Financial assistance will be given to complete professional short term training course with maximum limit of ₹ 5000/-.

The achievements under various welfare schemes under Tribal Welfare are given in Annexure 46 and 47.

Projects undertaken under Article 275(1)

Construction of road from Avali bus stop to Ponsal, Ponsal to Bajiwada, Bajiwada to Sabliwada and Sabliwada to Baddem Village Panchayat Cotigao in Canacona Constituency: The Project was approved in the year 2022-2023 for 710.15 amount of ₹ The Ministry of Tribal Affairs, New Delhi released an amount of ₹ 350.00 lakh for the purpose and administrative approval has already been accorded.

Construction of open type Bandhara at Apeykond in V.P. Gaondongiri in Canacona Taluka: The project was approved in the year 2022-2023 for an amount of ₹ 610.02 lakh and the Ministry of Tribal Affairs, New Delhi released an amount of ₹ 400.00 lakh. The proposal is submitted to Government for according Administrative Approval.

MOU signed with Disha Foundation

The Directorate of Tribal Welfare and Tribal Research Institute (TRI) has signed MoU with Disha Foundation in order to envisage the undertaking of various research based projects by involving experts from various fields considering the association of Disha Foundation with The Ministry of Tribal Affairs, New Delhi and NITI Aayog.

Disha Foundation will provide handholding support TRI Goa for the construction and setting up of museum which includes Content & Curation of Tribal Museum of Freedom Fighters, need-based research and documentation.

Banastarim Market Complex

The Banastarim market complex is constructed with the best of infrastructure for the benefits of vendors. The market complex is spread across an area of 5000 sq. mtrs with a build-up area of 2833.00 sq. mtrs. The market complex has a total of 60 shops, separate space for sale of vegetables, fish and meat.

Also, a community hall with a total capacity of 450 people has been completed with total cost of ₹ 1780.00 lakh during the current financial year.

Goa State Scheduled Tribes Finance and Development Corporation Ltd.

Ashraya Adhar Scheme:

Under the scheme, loan to ₹ 5,00,000/- at the rate of 2% interest per annum with repayment of up to 10 is provided for vears repair/renovation/reconstruction of existing house belonging to ST community.

1329 beneficiaries have been released 1st installment of loan amounting ₹ 4663.98 lakh and 854 beneficiaries have been released 2nd installment of loan amounting ₹ 931.93 lakh during the last 5 years upto December 2023.

Short Term Loan Scheme

Under this scheme, loan up to ₹ 1.00 lakh is provided at the rate of 2% interest per annum with the repayment period of 20 months for education and 10 months for business and medical

purposes including moratorium period of 3 months to any person belonging to ST community State to meet the immediate expenses towards education, medical and business purposes.

145 beneficiaries have been released loan amounting ₹117.84 lakh from 2018-19 to 31st December, 2023.

Self-Employment Scheme

Loan up to ₹ 10.00 lakh is provided to the unemployed person belonging to ST Community and also loan upto ₹ 15 lakh to the Association/Society /Partnership/Self Help Groups (SHG)/Companies formed exclusively by the members of ST Community at the rate of 4% interest per annum with a repayment period of 5 to 10 years for setting up of viable income generating ventures in Industrial, Agriculture and Service sector.

Under Self Employment Scheme, 69 beneficiaries have been released loan amounting to ₹ 498.16 lakh for last five years upto December 2023.

Goa Tribal's Employment Generation Programme Scheme (GTEGP):

Under the scheme, loans up to ₹ 25 lakh for MSME, ₹ 15 lakh for service enterprises and ₹ 15 lakh for trading activities with 40% subsidy on the total loan amount i.e. 95% of the project cost @ 2% interest per annum with a repayment period up to 10 years including moratorium period of 3 to 6 months provided anv is to unemployed person who has studied from 4th Std and above (relaxable in deserving cases), and aged between 18 to 45 years.

Under the GTEGP scheme, 60 beneficiaries have been released loans amounting ₹ 334.80 lakh and subsidy amounting ₹ 220.07 lakh from 2020-21

till December 2023. The details are given below in Table No. 16.17.

SPORTS AND YOUTH AFFAIRS

Physical Education, Games, Sports and Youth activities play a vital role in the overall personality development of an individual. Keeping this in view, the Government has provided the youth such opportunities that will contribute in developing their talent through the systematic and successful implementation of the various sports and youth related activities and schemes.

National Games

The Government successfully organised the 37th National Games, during October to November, 2023. The Goa Contingent bagged 92 medals in 43 sports disciplines at the Nationals Games (i.e. Gold - 27, Silver - 27 and Bronze - 38).

Expenditure amounting to ₹ 28099.24 lakh was incurred towards 80 projects pertaining to 37th National Games, 2023.



The Official flag of the National Games was handed over to Uttarakhand which will hold the 38th National Games in 2024.

National Service Scheme (NSS)

NSS is a 100% Central Sector Scheme. An amount of ₹ 51.19 lakh was allotted to the State and the total expenditure incurred was ₹ 10.78 lakh benefiting 30900 beneficiaries during the current financial year. Under this scheme, activities such as International Day of Yoga, World Environment Day, Meri Mati Mera Desh, Swachata Pakwada, World Health Day, Workshop Etiquettes. Rashtriva Ekta Azadika Amrut Mahotsav, Chandrayan 3. Tree Plantation-Vanamahostav, Fit India Swachhata, Freedom Run 4.0, National Games 2023, NSS Foundation Day etc were organised.

Total 118 NSS Volunteers participated in the West Zone Pre Republic Day Camp, Republic Day Camp, National Integration Camp, Adventure Camp and Youth Convention.

Other Achievements

The Government has developed and inaugurated the Government School Playground at St. Cruz.

The Department deputed State teams for the National participation to participate in the 66th National School Games in the age groups of U/19 years boys and girls, comprising of 11 disciplines and won 8 medals (1 Silver and 7 Bronze medals).

32 players participated along with 4 officials in All India Civil Services Tournament.

16 players participated in Goa State Yogasana team at National Yoga Olympiad 2023-24 held at New Delhi.

The team won Silver Medal in U/14 girls category.

The Department organized Diet Coaching Camp in 45 disciplines in which a total number of 270 students had participated in 09 disciplines i.e. Football, Volleyball, Badminton, Table Tennis, Hockey & Carom.

State/ Taluka level sports

The Government recognised school students participated in Interschool Tournaments in three age groups (U/14 yrs, U/17 yrs and U/19 yrs) for both boys and girls in approximately 35 sports disciplines at the Taluka, District and State Level.

COLLECTORATE NORTH

Goa was the first State to have 100% computerized land records which is available on Dharani app. Also DHARANI-II version has been developed and implemented by NIC, Goa. This will help public to have access to land records from home and also stop fraud and mal-practices as public can check records of any property in Goa.

Goa Disaster Management (GDM)

A total 87 natural calamity claims were sanctioned amounting to ₹ 40.98 lakh as compensation to victims of North Goa District during the financial year 2023-24 (till December, 2023) under Goa Disaster Management.

The Collector/ Chairman of DDMA, North has approved 07 claims and disbursed a total amount of ₹ 3.50 lakh to the next of kin of the deceased due to Covid-19 compensation during the financial year 2023-24 (till December, 2023). CIVIL SUPPLIES

The Department of Civil Supplies and Consumer affairs is performing a very important role especially for people belonging to weaker section. The Department has successfully provided free food grains under Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Anna Yojana Scheme (PMGKAYS) under National Food Security Act (NFSA).

Total expenditure of ₹ 130.00 lakh has been incurred towards providing financial assistance to 7,257 beneficiaries under Antyodaya Anna Yojana Ration Cards (AAY RC) from July to December, 2023.

Chief Minister Financial Assistance for refilling of LPG Cylinder Scheme, 2023

An amount of ₹ 275/- per month, towards assistance for purchase of LPG cylinder is being paid directly in the bank account of the beneficiaries.

Assistance to State agencies for FPS dealers' margin, additional margins and transport

The scheme provides subsidy for meeting shortfall in procurement of food grains, transportation and handling charges under National Food Security Act (NFSA). An expenditure amounting to ₹ 392.00 lakh has been incurred covering 4,85,345 beneficiaries during the year 2023-24 upto December 2023.

Special Drives/Camps/Programmes

- De-duplication is an process. As of now out of 1856 derecords, duplicate Goa has conducted survey all 1856 of records and 1233 have been recommended for cancellation/ blocked and remaining 623 have been retained.
- Aadhaar Enrolment camps were held in Tiswadi and Bardez. Altogether 7 New Enrolments and 165 Updations of Aadhaar were done in both the camps.

Digitization of Fair Price Shops (FPS) in the State

The Department has installed 450 Enable Point of Sale (e-POS) devices to FPS in the State for the distribution of food grains to the beneficiaries on Rental basis through Linkwell Telesystem Pvt. Ltd., @ ₹1089 + GST 18% total ₹ 1285.02 per unit per month. Fortified rice is supplied to all the beneficiaries under Public Distribution system w.e.f March, 2023.

The Department of Food and Drugs Administration is responsible for protecting and promoting public health through the control and supervision of food safety.

Achievements

- Panaji City was among the top 11 cities of India to compete globally for the "Smart City Challenge" organised by the Milan Urban Food Policy Pact (MUFPP).
- North Goa District secured the First Place for the "Eat Right District Challenge" of the Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI).
- Goa State ranked first in the Small States Category in the State Food Safety Index of the FSSAI for the last 5 consecutive years.
- Special Drives/camps programmes were conducted on various topics such as World Food Safety Day, Walkathon North & South Goa and Awareness and demonstration on millets.

SKILL DEVELOPMENT

The Government is giving more emphasis on Skilling, Re-skilling & Up-skilling of Goans through its various initiatives, programmes and policies.

The Department of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship plays a pivot role in making State as a skill hub through its network of 10 Industrial Training Institutes (ITI's) with impact capacity of more than 3,000 wherein number of skilled youth pass out every year and contributes in development of the State.

The ITI's have introduced new age courses in last 5 years such as solar technician, mechanic consumer electronic appliances, fashion designing, food production, multimedia animation, cosmetology, smart phone technician

cum app tester, multipurpose health worker, food & beverage service assistant, digital photography, etc.

Due to continuous efforts of the Government, Farmagudi Government ITI and Bicholim Government ITI have been selected as International Skill Centres among 50 other ITIs in the Country. Also, 10 Government ITIs were registered as Training Provider under Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana (PMKVY).

This year Government has taken number of new initiatives to enhance skilled manpower of the State. The Department has made collaboration with various Corporate houses, academic institutes, industries to enhance skill infrastructure and introduction of new courses in the curriculum.

Chief Minister Apprenticeship Scheme

The Government initiated Chief Minister Apprenticeship Scheme wherein Goan youth were provided an opportunity to gain hands on training and experience in all Government & Private establishments. Under this scheme, earlier opportunities were catered to only Students with Technical background such as Polytechnic, ITI etc.

The Government went one step ahead and introduced Chief Minister Apprenticeship Policy through which opportunities are now provided to students with non-technical background to gain hands on training and work experience at Government and private establishments. Goa is the 1st State to provide this unique platform for youth with non-technical skills. The purpose of the scheme is to enhance employability among Goan youth.

The registration of candidate, who is willing to undergo Apprenticeship Training is being done through National

Apprenticeship Portal (NAP) and the same portal is being used by the Establishments to register themselves and create opportunities.

Skill Acquisition and Knowledge Awareness for Livelihood Project (SANKALP) (P) (A)

Short Term Training courses on Non National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF) aligned job roles such as Basic Food Production, Basic Electrician, Bag Making, Flower Making, Basic Beautician Course, Basic Computer Operator, and Basic Sewing Technology have been conducted under SANKALP (P) (A).

Skills Strengthening for Industrial Value Enhancement (STRIVE) (P)(A)

Under this scheme, "Train the Trainer", training programme was conducted for 467 Officers and Officials.

Chief Minister's Kaushalya Path Scheme (CMKPS)

This is a newly launched scheme with the aim of Skilling, Re-Skilling & Up-Skilling maximum local youth and to provide skilled work force to Industry as per their demand. Under this scheme, 74 individuals have been benefitted during the financial year 2023-24.

Some of the Special Drives/ Camps/Programmes conducted by the Department are:

- During the period from June,2022 till December, 2023, Prime Minister Apprenticeship Mela was held at Farmagudi Government ITI, Vasco Government ITI, Panaji Government ITI, Ravindra Bhavan, Margao Goa, Pernem Government ITI and at Verna Industrial Estate, wherein 131 establishments and 635 youth had participated in the events.
- Awareness workshop for Skill Development for SC/ST beneficiaries SANKALP under scheme was organized on 03rd September, and 03rd October, 2023 at Farmagudi Government ITI and at Canacona Government ITI respectively.
- Mega Career Guidance Programme was organized at Rajiv Gandhi Kala Mandir, Ponda on the topic 'To know your Army job for ITI students'.

Other Initiatives

- ➤ The Department has setup Skill Centre of Excellence at Farmagudi Govt. ITI in collaboration with Sri Sri Rural Development Program Trust.
- Memorandum of Understanding (MoUs) have been signed between Government of Goa & various other Institutions/ Corporates
- The Government has signed MoU with M/s. Tata Technologies Ltd. to set up Technology Hub in 5 Government ITIs to align industry iob roles in demand with the skills imparted to empower gainful employment for all ITI pass outs by providing courseware based latest industry needs and upgrade lab facilities at ITIs by installing new equipments, machineries and technology tools and developing relevant and up-todate course content for new and emerging trades.
- MoU signed with M/s. Daikin Technologies Ltd. for setting up of Centre of Excellence in Refrigeration & Air conditioning and to impart training on advanced technology at Government ITI Farmagudi.
- MoU signed with Jaquar Group for plumber trade to impart training on advanced Technology at Government ITI, Panaji.
- Stem Tinkering and virtual labs have been set up at Government ITI Farmagudi and ITI Cacora.
- ➤ The Department has provided skill enhancement training for technicians of Konkan Railway Academy.
- ➤ The new building of Model ITI at Government ITI Panaji under "Upgradation of existing Government ITIs into Model ITIs " is completed and inaugurated on 15th

July 2023. The objective of the scheme is to develop a benchmark for industry oriented ITI which would serve as a model for other ITIs. Under this Scheme, an existing ITI in a State is upgraded as Model ITI which will be evolved as an institution showcasing the best practices, efficient and high training delivery quality sustainable and effective industry relationship. The total expenditure incurred on the new building at Government ITI Panaji is ₹ 334.00 lakh.

EXCISE

The Department of Excise is the Nodal Department for the scheme for granting compensation to the toddy tappers, on death or injury caused to the toddy tappers while tapping trees viz.

- In case of death ₹ 2,00,000/-
- In case of permanent disablement- ₹ 1,00,000/-
- In case of temporary disablement ₹ 250/- per day as advised by the Government Medical Officer.

The Department of Excise was awarded the third place among other Government Department for collecting amount of ₹ 4.34 lakh towards Armed Forces Flag Day on the occasion of Armed Forces Flag Day. The category wise number of licenses issued is given Annexure – 53.

The Department of Excise collected Revenue of ₹ 865.80 crore for the financial year 2022-23 and ₹ 650.08 crore for the financial year 2021-22 thereby increasing revenue by ₹ 215.72 crore i.e. 33.18% over previous year. The Excise Department has also collected revenue of ₹ 661.94 crore upto December, 2023 and aims to earn more than 841.04 crore, the target set for the Department for the financial year 2023-2024.

As a step forward of achieving the 'Ease of Doing Business', the Department of Excise has further upgraded the online system of delivering various services. Consequently, all type of permits i.e. import permit, export permit are issued online.

Further granting and renewal of all type of licences is made online. The complete procedure of obtaining various licenses, permits, has been uploaded on the website of the Department.

The following service is provided by the Excise Department through the online Single Window System on Goa online portal.

- New Registration of liquor licenses for retail sale for consumption/packed bottles/Wholesale for Indian-Made Foreign Liquor, Country Liquor & Foreign Liquor,
- Transfer of license incase licensee is not alive.
- Registration/renewal of labels.
- Excise Import/Export permits of raw material/finished goods, Export to

other States, Export to overseas, Local Transport permit.

• Excise verification Services.

LEGAL METROLOGY

The Government has launched online platform to eliminate the process of physical submission of applications and payment towards issue of verification Certificate and renewal of Weights and Measures.

Revenue of ₹ 1.76 lakh was collected from Manufacturer Dealer, Repairer of Weights, measures and Package commodities towards various taxes and fees and total amount of ₹ 16.47 lakh fine was collected as fine under different cases. In addition, 71 surprise

inspections were conducted during the year 2023-24 till December 2023.

LAW

The construction of New District and Subordinate Court Complex at Merces, Tiswadi is under progress and around 76% work is completed and construction work of New Civil and Criminal Court building at Margao is completed. 80% repairs/renovations work is completed of e-type bungalow, D type quarter garages and compound including beautification wall surrounding areas at court complex Bicholim, Goa.

The Fast Track Special Court has disposed of 28 Session cases from February 2022 to December 2023.

FACTORIES AND BOILERS

The Department has complied with various number of IT and IT related reforms in accordance with Department of Promotion, Industries and Internal Trade (DPIIT) recommendation. 9 services of the Department have been made available online. Altogether, 67 Training programmes were conducted on First Aid and Safety & Health for supervisory working personnel hazardous industries, wherein, 2316 workers were trained. During the year 2023-24. 131 inspections were conducted till December, 2023.

SETTLEMENT AND LAND RECORDS

The Department has made all spatial land records and promulgated Record of Right computerised. The Department procured Electronic Total Station (ETS) instruments and DGPS as part of Modern Survey Techniques.

Modern Record Room has been setup at the Head Office of Directorate of Settlement and Land Records by installation of compactors for physical storage of records.

Government has successfully uploaded all of the survey plans on the Bhunaksha platform and have linked all the Records of Rights(Form I & XIV/Form D) with the survey plans enabling the general public to view and take printouts through e-services.

OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

Rajbhas Prashikshan Evzonn, 2008:

Training is imparted to all Government Officers/Officials in order to facilitate them to carry out official work in Konkani, being the Official Language of the State so also, to make the correspondence and communication with general public in Konkani.

Bhasha Vikas Yojana

The financial support to the eligible groups/ institutions/educational institutions was released for the development of Konkani, Marathi, Hindi and Sanskrit Languages. 24,100 institutions have availed the benefit of the scheme during 2023-24.

Rajbhasha Jagruti Yojana

The Directorate organizes/conducts programmes/ activities which aim to promote language skills and awareness of Official Language. During the year 2023-24, 492 beneficiaries have benefited.

The Government encourages writers in the State to develop their talent and to give boost to Konkani and Marathi languages on the specified subjects i.e. Science & Technology, Finance, History, Mass/Media Communication, Administration, Tourism, Sociology, etc. 2 beneficiaries have availed the benefit upto December 2023.

COMMERCIAL TAX

Enforcement drives throughout the State of Goa were conducted to trace the evasion and to check the registration and billing system of the taxpayer. 517 taxpayers were inspected during the drive to find their compliance and contravention if any, during the current financial year. The 'Economic Intelligence Unit' (EIU) section has recovered ₹107.61 crore from tax evaders by analyzing taxpayers returns, conducting inspection, search and seizure and thereafter initiating appropriate action under the provisions of law during the last 3½ years i.e. from May-2020 to December-2023,

Fake Registration Drive

A Special all India drive against fake/bogus registration was conducted by 'Economic Intelligence Unit' (EIU) team. 19 Goods and Services Tax Identification Number (GSTIN) were shared for verification for fake/bogus registration. The EIU team also has identified locally 22 GSTIN for verification of genuineness of the taxpayer.

On verification, this Department has found 30 non existing GSTIN out of 41 cases. Total Input Tax Credit (ITC) blocked as on 31/12/2023 is ₹ 588.26

lakh. Total amount of evasion of tax detected is ₹ 3906.11 lakh. The Government has recovered ₹ 13.19 lakh. Further, 61 GSTIN have been identified who have availed bogus ITC. This has been sent to other State Jurisdictional Officer for verification and blocking of bogus ITC.

Based on the intelligent analysis done by the Enforcement team, action has been initiated against Tax evaders and defaulters u/s 67 of GST Act and u/s 73 of VAT Act. 165 surprise inspections and search raids were conducted in the last 3 ½ years. The revenue generated by the Commercial Tax for last 5 years given in Annexure – 45.

MUSEUM

The Museum Department participated in the Museum Expo 2023 at Pragati Maidan, New Delhi by setting up a stall representing Goan culture and heritage. International Museum Day observed on 18th May, 2023 and 46th foundation day was held to promote socio-cultural heritage of Goa on 29th September. 2023. Museology Conservation' workshop was organized in collaboration with Indira Gandhi National Centre for Arts (IGNCA) and Goa University on 12th January, 2024.

ARCHIVES

The Department extended research facilities to 31 Research scholars including 15 foreign scholars and also issued 144 books to the scholars in connection with their research. 3,605 visitors were attended in connection with property documents, Inventory files, Notorial Deeds, Village Communidade records, Birth/ Baptism records etc.

33,448 certified documents were issued to the public and 3,284 digital images of records on CD- ROMs were issued to research scholars during the year 2023-24.

Book titled 'Sawantwadi Saunsthanachya Itihasachi Sahdane Part II' and 'Portuguese Hukumnama' were published and released during the Online Portuguese current year. Translation Service was launched on 1st October 2023. Archives Exhibition was organized from 18th June to 23rd June 2023 at Sanskruti Bhavan, Patto. Five days intensive basic workshop on Modi Script was organized at Goa University from 30th October to 4th November 2023.

E-Services to the Citizens / End to End digitization / Computerization:

18 lakh folios of death / birth are digitized and made available on State Data Centre. The public can view and apply for these records through Goa Online services.

Digitization of Documents

In-house digitalization of 2,16,767 pages of 518 Land registration records of and Bardez. Ilhas Bicholim facilitated faster access and public delivery service. The Department has started issuing scanned copies of these records to public, which has reduced manhandling of the physical records thereby ensuring their preservation for posterity. Also, the Department has completed scanning of 1,64,414 pages of 210 volumes of Travel documents and 8117 pages of 145 volumes of Captain of Ports records.

Library of Archives

The work of digital cataloging of 30,189 books on different subjects is carried out through e- granthalaya Library Software. 80,000 scanned pages of Legislacao/Boletim Official has been uploaded in the D Space Software for easy and quick reference and retrieval for the users.

ARCHAEOLOGY

The Department of Archaeology plays a pivotal role in preserving and promoting the rich cultural and historical heritage of the State. With а focus archaeological, conservation, restoration and research & education, the Department also works towards safeguarding and showcasing the diverse archaeological treasures.

The department employs various conservation techniques to protect and maintain the archaeological sites and artifacts.

In the last 5 years, the Department has taken up various Conservation/ Restoration works of Protected Monuments across the State of Goa is as under:

Works undertaken: (i). Structural Consolidation of Jain Basti, Bandora (Phase I), (ii) Restoration of Alorna Fort, Pernem (Phase I), (iii). The Maintenance and Restoration of Chapel Xavier Ella. Old of St. (iv). Restoration of Alorna Fort Pernem (Phase 2), and (v). Restoration of Chapel of Monte, Ella old Goa (Phase I)

Ongoing Works: (i). Restoration of Sakhali fort, Sakhali and (ii). Restoration of Khorjuve Fort, Khorjuve.

Works Initiated: (i). Restoration of Chapora fort, Chapora, (ii) Heritage Circuit at Kudne, Kudnem, and (iii) Restoration of Jain Basti Bandora, Phase 2

The Department has carried out the Restoration and conservation of the ancient temple of Shree Saptakoteshwar at Narve, Bicholim with proper archaeological norms. The footfall at this temple has now increased in multifold and tourists from all over the world are visiting this temple once built by Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj.

Rock carving at Pansaimol is accepted by UNESCO in the tentative list of World Heritage Site along with 9 other sites of Maharashtra.

SMALL SAVINGS AND LOTTERIES

The Government is operating Paper Lotteries by appointing M/s. Summit online Trade Solutions Private Limited, M/s Future Gaming & Hotel Services Pvt. Ltd., and M/s. B.S. Enterprises unit of Goldwin Healthcare Pvt. Ltd.

Revenue of ₹ 7537.95 lakh was collected from the sale of lottery tickets and 699 beneficiaries received lottery prices during last 5 years.

PROVEDORIA

Establishment of Chief Minister Mathru Pitru Kalyan Kendra Half Way Home:

The old age home at Majorda & Chinchinim have been repaired and renovated through GSIDC by incurring an expenditure amounting to ₹ 300 lakh & ₹ 126.00 lakh respectively.

Presently, 02 old age homes are used as half way home i.e. Halfway Home Mapusa (Female) North Goa & Halfway Home Majorda (Male) South Goa.

DIRECTORATE OF ACCOUNTS

The Department is entrusted with the implementation of important Social Security Schemes for Government employees like Goa State Government Employees Group Insurance scheme, General Provident Fund and Deposit Linked Insurance scheme and New Pension System.

The new building premises of the Directorate of Accounts at Penha de Franca, Porvorim named as "KAUTILYA, LEKHA BHAVAN" has

been inaugurated on 10th November 2023 and has commenced its functioning from the new premises.

The Government has successfully implemented the E-Kuber integration system of e-payments and e-receipts. The implementation of e-receipt model ensure that remittances are State instantaneously routed from Government receipt portal to State Government accounts ensuring ready with availability funds of the Government. The inherent advantages of e-payment and e-receipts systems are near to nil reconciliation issues and zero delay in completion of transactions. This will also diminish the major grievances on receipt of pension.

GOA POLICE

Goa Police is making all efforts to enhance their capability to deal with emerging challenges. The Department is committed to the security and safety of not only the citizens but also of the visiting tourists as well. All major religious, cultural and sports events are managed by the Department with aplomb. The Goa Police has been able to maintain Law & Order well during the New Year and other major events/celebrations.

Various awareness camps on traffic, female empowerment, drug abuse & illicit trafficking, road safety, health medical camps, cyber crimes etc. were conducted in various schools & colleges. "Prayas" is an initiative undertaken by South Goa District Police with objective to create awareness among people living in slums and low income groups.

This community policing initiative is mainly to keep youth living in slums areas away from entering into crime and safeguarding women and children living in slums. Regular activities are undertaken in slum areas in South Goa District i.e. Zuarinagar, Sahapur, Dattagad, Azad Nagar, Moti Dongar, Birla and other congested areas includes Baina, New Vaddem and Mangoor Hill.

Goa Police reported 2028 cases under IPC and detected 1750 during the year 2023, the crime cases reported against women, senior citizen and cyber crimes and their detection is given in Table No.16.28

projects Infrastructure namely construction of Maina Curtorim police station, Fatorda police station, Quarters Development works Arlem. St. Cruz police outpost and additional fittings at Quepem police station amounting to ₹ 3612.08 lakh have been approved during the current financial year.

JAIL

Government has initiated several reformatory measures from time to time, in-order to equip the prisoners with skills, education, employment and vocational training etc. Central Jail, Colvale has been declared as one of the Study Centres of IGNOU during the year-2015.

Upto December 2023, total 168 inmates registered themselves under various educational programmes and

successfully completed Bachelor of Arts (BA) (02), Bachelor Preparatory Programme (BPP) (35), Bachelor of Arts in Tourism Studies (BTS), Food and Nutrition etc.

Government has successfully adopted the e-prisons application which includes e-Mulakat facility and e-Peshi. e-Mulakhat application enables virtual meeting for the prisoners across the country to meet their relatives through video Conferencing. Similarly, e-Peshi is a VC facility enabling electronic method of video-linkage as an alternative method for production of an accused in Court.

10 Hand Held Metal Detectors (HHMD) and Installation and Commissioning of ICT equipments (C.C.T.V) have been supplied to Central Jail Colvale.

Special Drives/ Camps

Training is being imparted among the Prison Staff in collaboration with GIPARD, Ela Old Goa. Six batches were imparted training as per the training manual issued by the Bureau of Police Research & Development. The last batch of Prison staff consisting of 17 participants per batch underwent training w.e.f. 10/04/2023 to 17/05/2023 respectively.

Special Aadhaar Coverage Camps were organized for the inmates at Central Jail, Colvale and till date around 57 inmates have been enrolled for Aadhaar and the process for enrolling the remaining inmates is in progress.

Biometric device compatible with the e-Prisons application has also been installed in Central Jail, Colvale for Aadhaar based biometric verification of inmates.

Activities conducted Re-commissioning of Bakery Unit in the Central Jail, Colvale:

- Inmates are imparted training in Bakery Products through Institute of Hotel Management (IHM) Goa.
- Bakery products such as Samosa, Pakoda, Bread are being prepared and sold in-house to the inmates.

Department has procured Chapati making machine and water purifier through CSR funds as a part of reformation activity and a source of revenue generation for the inmates.

GENERAL ADMINISTARTION DEPARTMENT (GAD)

Goa Institute of Public Administration & Rural Development (GIPARD) is the State's Apex Training Institute for training, capacity building, research and consultancy activities; in areas of Rural Development, Panchayati Raj, Public Administration, Women and Gender Studies, Disaster Management, etc.

On the occasion of Goa Liberation Day i.e. on 19th December, 16 Home Guard & Civil Defence Volunteers have been awarded Chief Minister's Home Guards and Civil Defence Gold Medal for Meritorious Service. Also, on the occasion of Independence Day i.e. 15th August, 07 Home Guards & Civil Defence Volunteers were awarded Meritorious Service & on the occasion of Republic Day, i.e. 26th January, 02 Home Guards & Civil Defence have been awarded President Medal for Distinguished Service for Home Guard Volunteers.

The Home Guards & Civil Defence Organisation has been awarded with 76 cash and Good Service Tickets (GST) to

the official staff during last five years till December 2023 in recognition of their commendable services rendered on various occasions.

Regional Employment Exchange

The Government has transformed the manual services rendered by Goa Employment Exchange to online portal (www.goaonline.gov.in) to create a job matching in a dynamic, efficient and responsive manner between the Goan Job Seekers/Career Aspirants and Employers thus, creating a virtual handshake between the Employers and the prospective Job seekers / Career Aspirants.

The details of Job Seekers registered/ notified/ sponsored for vacancies and number of Drives/camps conducted during the last 5 years is given in Annexure - 55.

Model Career Centre (MCC) has been conducting various outreach activities such as Programme on Career Guidance / Counselling, Seminars on Soft Skill Trainings, Sessions on Civil Service Competitive Exams, Sessions on Entrepreneurship, Job Fairs & Placement Drives etc to enhance and upgrade the skills of the Job Seekers.

LABOUR

Scheme for supply of Sewing Machines to the trainees enrolled under various labour welfare centre in Goa

Under the scheme, ₹ 20.00 lakh were allocated during the year 2022-23. The total expenditure incurred under the scheme is ₹4.67 lakh covering 230 beneficiaries.

Scheme for giving stipend to the trainees belonging to the SC/ST community: Under this scheme the stipend has been increased from

₹ 1000/- to ₹ 2400/- per month, effective from June 2023.

The Retrenched Workers Assistance Scheme is the most prominent scheme under the Goa Labour Welfare Board. During last year from April 2023 to December 2023, 45 beneficiaries have availed the benefit amounting to ₹ 46.64 lakh.

Employee State Insurance (ESI)

E.S.I. has State of art infrastructure for treatment facilities of beneficiaries. All the insured persons and their family members who are covered under E.S.I. scheme in the State are availing cashless medical treatment from Dispensaries and E.S.I. Hospital at Margao. Besides there are Insurance Medical Practitioners 03 appointed under E.S.I. scheme and free consultations, medicines are provided to the insured persons. Medicines not available are purchased bγ beneficiaries from private medical stores and the amount is reimbursed to their accounts. Referral of patients requiring and treatment is specialist advice provided with Tie up arrangement with Private hospitals for secondary care. For Super Specialty Treatment Tie up arrangement is done by the E.S.I. Corporation.

There are 1,92,988 insured persons in the State of Goa covered under E.S.I. Act as on 31/03/2023 availing medical treatment from E.S.I. dispensaries and hospital, besides other benefits under the E.S.I. Scheme.

The Enforcement Cell carried out 1841 inspections and 17 prosecutions against the defaulting employers under various Labour Laws during the period April to December, 2023.

There are two Labour Courts i.e Industrial Tribunal-cum-Labour Court and Labour Court II. The process of adjudication has been streamlined and

strengthened. 54 cases on Industrial Disputes have been received by both the courts during the period of April to December 2023 and 42 cases have been disposed off during the year 2023-24 upto December, 2023. The pending cases as on 31st December 2023 before the Industrial, Tribunal-cum-Labour Court and Labour Court II are 454.

GOA STATE ELECTION COMMISSION

During the year 2023-24, State Election Commission conducted the following activities:

- Delimitation and reservation of 15 wards of Ponda Municipal Council and 12 wards of Sanquelim Municipal Council.
- General Election for 15 wards/constituencies of Ponda Municipal Council and 12 wards /constituencies of Sanquelim Municipal Council were held on 25th March 2023.

 Bye Elections at 6 Village Panchayats were held on 25th March 2023.

ADMINISTRATIVE TRIBUNAL

Administrative Tribunals are quasijudicial institutions that resolve disputes related to the recruitment and service conditions of persons engaged in public service. A total 1429 cases are filed before the Administrative Tribunal, out of which 433 cases were disposed off and 996 cases are pending under various Acts.

SAINIK WELFARE

The Government is in the process of establishing Veteran Home (Old Aged Home) for armed forces veterans and armed widows of personnels Salvador-do-Mundo, Bardez, Goa. Also the construction of Sainik Rest House at Bambolim is expected to be completed by May, 2024. 140 ex-servicemen were employed in the State Government/ Central Government / Corporations / Private Sector Banks / Private Sector and 05 complicated pension cases were settled in respect of Ex-Servicemen/ Widows.

Financial assistance was provided to each of World War II veterans and War Widow prior to January, 2000. 19 beneficiaries were awarded cash in lieu of Land and Annuity. 3 Goan youth were released monetary incentive to the tune of ₹ 4.50 lakh for joining armed forces during 2023-24.

HOME DEPARTMENT (GENERAL)

The Home Department is one of the most pivotal Department responsible for the maintenance of internal security and implementation of domestic policy for the State. The prime objectives and responsibilities of the Home Department include maintenance of Law & Order,

Crime Control, Police Administration, Arms Matters, Administration of Justice, Internal Security matters, Human Rights matters, matters of Freedom Fighters, Medals and Awards, NRI matters, Citizenship matters and also to liaison with Central Government, other State Governments and the Armed Forces on various administrative and policy matters.

Freedom Fighters:

The Department has sponsored the names of 316 Children of Freedom Fighters (CFF) to various Government Departments for employment under the "Scheme for providing employment to the Children of Freedom Fighters".

The Goa Public Gambling Act, 1976:

Under the Goa, Daman & Diu Public Gambling Act, 1976 Government has issued licenses to 06 off-shore and 12 onshore casinos operating electronic amusement/slot machines in the State.

The total estimated revenue generated in respect of casinos (i.e. onshore & offshore) for the F. Y. 2023-24 is ₹ 398.20 crore.

One Man Commission of Inquiry:

The report/ recommendations have been successfully submitted by the Commission of inquiry constituted under the Chairmanship of Shri Justice V. K. Jadhav, Former Judge of the Hon'ble High Court of Bombay to inquire into and fix responsibilities in all cases of land grabbing in the State and to inquire into the involvement of Government Officers, other Public functionaries and private individuals in cases of land grabbings

Goa Police Department including IRBn:

Government has declared the office of the Criminal Investigation Department to be an e-Police Station, for transmission and investigation of all cases registered at e-Police Station.

Goa State Haj Committee:

The Government has assisted 117 Haj pilgrims from Goa this year to proceed for the pilgrimage at Haj.

INFORMATION AND PUBLICITY

The Goa State working Journalist Welfare Scheme

Goa State Journalist Welfare Fund disburses pension for the welfare of retired journalists. Presently, 61 pensioners are drawing a monthly pension of ₹ 10,000/- and 11 family pensioners are drawing ₹ 5,000/- per month

Assistance for Purchase of Computer Camera for Journalist 2021

Assistance is provided towards purchase of Laptop / Camera and to empower the journalists to face the challenges of rapidly changing technology. Total 17 journalist have availed the benefit upto December, 2023 under the scheme.

Patrakar Kritadnyata Nidhi Scheme

The Patrakar Kritadnyata Nidhi Scheme (Journalists Benevolent fund) was launched to provide immediate financial assistance to needy journalists found to be in indigent circumstances in emergency cases such as to meet the expenses on marriage of daughter, etc. Till date 12 different beneficiaries have availed the benefit under the scheme.

The Goa State Journalist Award Scheme 2015

The scheme is devised to encourage local journalists to exhibit their talents. Journalists of all registered daily and weekly newspapers published in English, Konkani or Marathi and private

sector electronic media in the State are eligible under this scheme.

The Goa State Photo Contest and Exhibition Scheme-2014

The scheme is aimed to encourage local youth preferably of Goan origin to exhibit their talents, gain confidence and eventually set up their own venture for self employment. The Department conducted Photo contest and prizes were distributed among the winners during National Press Day function.

Subsidy to purchase E-bike for Journalists

The scheme is notified to provide "Subsidy to purchase e-bike for Journalists". The scheme will benefit the journalists working in the State to travel from one place to another to collect information and gather news.

Financial Assistance for Film 2016

Financial assistance amounting to ₹ 242.86 lakh have been extended to 7 film producers since its inception till December, 2023. The scheme is being implemented through Entertainment Society of Goa.

FINANACE

Various services are made available on the Budget Portal www.budget.goa.gov.in, due to which, the Departments are able to process the budgetary proposals from any location. With this, the entire pre-budgeting as well as post-budgeting processes are totally in online mode, making the Budget division 100% digital and paperless.

The State has availed 50 years interest free loan to the extent of ₹ 400 crore from the Government of India under the scheme for Special Assistance to States for Capital Investment for 2023-24. Through this special assistance, the

Government has carried out various infrastructure development works in the State. In order to maintain fiscal discipline, Government has negotiated with various agencies and successfully reduced interest rate on loans to 8% from previous 13 % and above.

The Government has constituted a Data Analytic Cell (DAC) for compilation, segregation, and analysis of data generated by various Government Departments/ Agencies. It aims at making Goa a fact- driven State using the Data Management Platform (DMP).

Currently, data is being collected from first set of critical Departments such as Tourism, Planning, Statistics & Evaluation, Social Welfare, Electricity, Women & Child Department and Health Services and has been successfully analysed.

PLANNING, STATISTICS & EVALUATION

The Directorate of Planning, Statistics & Evaluation is entrusted with the task of conducting National level Censuses and Surveys wherein Goa is also participant. These censuses and surveys are conducted as per the guidelines and timeline of the concerned Central Ministries. Presently, the 11th Agriculture Census is in progress and the fieldwork of the 1st phase with the agricultural reference year 2021-22 is completed. which covers data primary characteristics of operational holdings/operational holders such as area operated, number & type of classification by holdings, of gender, social status, tenancy etc.

Chief Minister's Fellowship Programme (CMFP)

DPSE also implements CMFP which was initiated in the year 2021-22. The scheme is designed to provide valuable experience to youth interested in the multifaceted areas of research, is fostering the development of the State. The CMFP has witnessed huge success and has become popular among Goan youth. Based upon the interest created among the Goan youth, the Government has increased the sanctioned strength of Fellows from 10 to 20 candidates during the current year.

The scheme has proved to be advantageous to the Fellows in multiple ways. The Fellows have worked upon the thematic areas allotted to them which has largely benefitted them in their career growth, the reviews focused on assessing the progress made in the field of work assigned and the project status has give them a wide prospect in the thematic area.

Goa Corporate Social Responsibility Authority (Goa CSR Authority)

The Government of Goa created Goa CSR Authority under the leadership of Hon'ble Chief Minister in January 2021, with view to optimal utilization of the CSR Funds of Public and Private institutions for the welfare of the State. This Goa CSR Authority is registered with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, Government of India and the Registrar of Co-operative Societies, Government of Goa.

Initiatives of Goa CSR Authority.

 The Goa CSR Authority has organized first CSR Conclave, 2023 on 14th December, 2023 at New

- Durbar Hall. Rai Bhavan. Donapaula, Goa, with an aim of attracting Corporate Sector participate and support the State in Education/ Social/ Economic/ Environment/ Health and other initiatives, wherein more than 82 Heads / Representatives / General Managers / CEO of Corporates / Industries attended in person.
- Power Grid Corporation of India Ltd as part of its CSR contribution has released 2 installments amounting ₹ 1.76 crore towards "Supply project of Medical Equipment/ Instrument for Automation in Blood Bank, ALS nos.), **BLS Ambulances** (2 Ambulance (6 nos.) for Hospitals in Goa State". This initiative will reduce medical emergency response time and provide emergency care at the earliest.
- Foundation for Science Innovation and Development, (FSID), Indian Institute of Science (IISc), Bengaluru has partnered with Government of Goa to take up various activities to enable the industry to develop its capability in entrepreneurial (through startups and incubate companies), translational and transformational research, technology and product development utilizing the specialized skills, expertise, intellectual and infrastructural assets of IISc. As a part of this initiative Prof. Amaresh Chakrabarti, Chairman, Centre for Product Design and Manufacturing (CPDM), IISc, Bengaluru conducted a training on "A Flagship Program on design Thinking" on 19th January, 2024 for Senior Officers of Goa Government.
- The Government of Goa has a vision to clean rivers in the State on the lines of National Mission for Clean Ganga. The Government of Goa and Alpha MERS Limited came up with initiative to implement Alpha

- MERS river clean up technology in Goa to prevent movement of plastics into the sea. The project will benefit State to minimize the plastics on the coast and beaches and progress towards SDG goals and also improve the tourism brand value of the State.
- The Government of Goa in line with National agenda keeping fitness as a Prime Mover of State and National Development initiated "Chief Minister Certificate **Fitness** Programme," implemented by Green light Fitness to promote Fit Goa, Skill Goa and Inclusive Goa. The project will create awareness on fitness and various Physical activities that promote fitness, encourage indigenous sports and make fitness reach every school, college, Panchayat/village, etc

- Thaliyola Infotech Pvt from Delhi has set up Language Labs at Government College, Sanquelim and Government College, Margao to help in developing language skills.
